#### **No Bids for Tow Companies?**

According to the Lawrence City Charter, any tow company that does business with the city during snow removal must be selected by competitive bid. Section 10.32.140 of the charter states: "The chief of the police department ... is authorized to remove to some convenient place, through the agency or a person or persons in the employ of the police department, or by an independent

contractor selected in accordance with law on the basis of competitive bid... ." In other words, when it snows and the police department calls various towing companies to remove vehicles parked on the wrong side of the road, the list of towing companies it calls must have been previously selected by going through a competitive bid process so that favoritism cannot be dolled out to tow companies "friendly" with certain individuals in the city.

Anyone want to guess how many towing companies being used by the city of Lawrence actually submitted a bid and competed for the business the city so generously gives them? If you guessed ZERO, you would be correct. Maybe the City Council should spend a little more time trying to find out why tow companies are not bidding as required by law - instead of calling for department heads to be fired, and interfering with internal investigations in City

as noted previously, specifically addresses outcomes on a discipline-by-discipline basis. All discussion in this article should be assumed to share this caveat.

Sociologists and liberal politicians try to cover up or ignore genetic differences but, let's face it, half of our students are below average (more precisely, half of our students are below the median, but that distinction will be left for those taking statistics). Thus, with everything else being equal, i.e., home support, academic environment, and personal effort, innate ability will drive differences in academic achievement.

Home Support - A common reaction to the formula is: "Where is the 'per capita income' effect and where are the effects of other demographic factors taken into account?" The implication of the formula is that they don't matter one bit, except as they influence the factors that are actually included.

A wealthy family may be wealthy because the parents are high-achieving, highly educated individuals with successful careers or businesses. Such individuals may make it clear to their children the importance of academic success and hard work, and they may bring intellectual discussions involving four-syllable words to the dinner table every night. They may use their financial resources to ensure that their children are enrolled in an academic institution that reflects these values and sets high standards for achievement. On average, students nurtured by adults expressing and acting on these values will do very well academically.

This is not a treatise on parenting, but clearly the above factors can be present in an iron-fisted household will little or no love or emotional support. The children can rebel and attempt to punish the parents by failing in school and turning to drugs. Parents need to provide the right values in the right way ... what that way is, is an exercise for the reader. Nobody said child rearing was easy.

While wealth, on average, increases the likelihood that the last three factors in the formula are more conducive to good academic outcomes, it is neither necessary nor sufficient.

Poor parents, if they have the will and they understand the importance of these factors, can achieve extremely favorable outcomes. They often have handicaps that make success more difficult, but these rarely make it impossible. Setting the right values, being adamant about the importance of education, insisting on hard work ... all of these can overcome the disadvantages of poverty.

Just look at the example of the Cambodian family in Lowell whose members nearly died on a boat in the South China Sea while trying to escape Cambodia. They lived with other refugees in a crowded Lowell apartment and their daughter, who could speak practically no English when she entered 9<sup>th</sup> grade, graduated first in her class just four years later. Home support and personal effort made all the difference.

On the other hand, a family that hits the lottery for millions will see little improvement in academic outcomes if the parents do not succeed in raising the factors

that matter. So demographics is important, but only because, on average, it influences these factors. It should NEVER be considered a factor that cannot be overcome.

Several years ago the principal of North Andover's Atkinson Elementary School told the school's parents that MCAS scores (at the time, the lowest in the district) could not be raised significantly because of the demographic factors in that area of town. Some parents reacted quite badly to this pronouncement and insisted on higher standards. Within a short time the Atkinson School's scores approached the highest in the district while the scores of one of the schools in a wealthier area of town sank nearer the bottom. So much for demographics.

Quality of the Academic Environment - Notice that this factor has a "1" added. Really poor schools (mostly inner city) can contribute a negative amount to this factor – in the worst case nearly canceling out the "1" in the formula and making good outcomes nearly impossible. Alternately, if the school environment contributes nothing — i.e., it is neutral and has a zero value – the "1" allows the other factors to operate.

This is best seen in the case of home schooling. Clearly, the student doesn't attend the local public school or any other formal educational institution. Formal educational institutions contribute NOTHING. The parents/guardians substitute an extraordinarily high "Home Support" factor by not only providing the positive inputs previously discussed, but also by directly providing educational services in the home. Of course, they could do a poor job of providing these services, but experience shows this is rarely the case.

When a student's academic environment is provided by an institution outside the home, the question arises as to what factors influence its quality. The Beacon Hill Institute conducted a substantial research project in this area (Getting Less For More, Lessons in Massachusetts Education Reform) and found that the hundreds of millions of extra dollars spent in Massachusetts to improve educational outcomes since the early 1990s had little or no effect on measured outcomes. In fact, in some cases these funds were used to

support activities (e.g., greater athletic opportunities) that distracted from academic outcomes. The single factor that could be traced to improved outcomes was the high-stakes 10<sup>th</sup> grade MCAS test that <u>must</u> be passed to graduate. It, and it alone, accounted for nearly all of the improvement in Massachusetts' student outcomes.

High-stakes achievement tests that provide a meaningful quantitative academic standard are what mattered, not money. This is a case of the academic institution encouraging the other factors in the formula: Home Support (because parents want their children to graduate) and Personal Effort (because most students want to graduate or are fearful of the consequences of failure to graduate).

<u>Personal Effort</u> – Hopefully, nobody needs convincing of the importance of this factor.

So figure it out. Wealth has little effect except insofar as it encourages high expectations, high standards, and hard work. Taxpayer money also has little effect unless it is translated into these same factors.

History shows that monopoly institutions use their power to line their own pockets, which is why all you ever hear is, "We need more!" There is only one way to find out if more resources are really needed: Let the public institutions compete and see who translates the resources consumed in a manner that most effectively raises these key factors.

Without competition in education, we will never know.

In the meantime, parents should focus their energies on home support and on their children's level of personal effort, and simultaneously demand that their schools set high academic standards. If the schools do not respond, parents need to overcome this failing on their own – either through private schools, home schooling, or, at a minimum, by providing extra attention at home every day. No excuses.

#### **Home Health VNA Hosts Job Shadow Day for Gr. Lawrence Technical High School Students**

Lawrence, Mass. - Students from the Greater Lawrence Vocational Technical School spent the day on February 2<sup>nd</sup> at Home Health VNA's Lawrence office learning what exactly makes the agency run on a day to day basis.

Eight students from the Allied Health program at the school participated in the Job Shadow Day. Elaine Miller, Volunteer Coordinator for the agency's Home Health Partners Volunteer Program, worked with Valley Works to serve as a host for Job Shadow Day.

"This is a great opportunity for students to get a closer look at how our agency functions on a day to day basis," said Miller.

"They had an opportunity to hear from direct staff as well as those who work in our main offices. Students learned more about what makes home care different than other traditional types of health care."

The students who visited Home Health VNA were part of a group of more than 150 that visited companies throughout the Job Shadow Day.

The group visiting Home Health VNA had direct contact with staff from the Human Resources Department, the Vice President of HomeCare, Inc., and a Home Health Aide Manager. They also had an opportunity to hear from visiting nurses and therapists who worked out in the field.

"Home care is different than some of the other kinds we've seen," said Yazira Jimenez from Lawrence. "It's more challenging, with a lot of one on one with the patients."

Throughout the day they were able to ask questions and learn more about specific types of care the agency provides and the unique challenges that working in the home

"I didn't realize there were so many choices in home care," said Carla Tavarez from Lawrence. "There are a lot of people who go into the home, not just nurses. There's a lot of responsibility being in a patient's home and not in a nursing home where other people are around."

Home Health VNA is a not-for-profit agency affiliated with HomeCare, Inc. and Merrimack Valley Hospice. Together, the three agencies serve more than 80 communities throughout the Merrimack Valley and Southern New Hampshire. #### RAISE 'EM RIGHT™ Nap Insomniac

My daughter has attended a preschool program for the past two years and has loved going. She has made some great friends and talks to me about all the fun things they do in school each day.

The problem lately has become nap time. She says she "hates it." Otherwise, she has nothing but wonderful things to say about her day there. I have talked with the teacher and she reports that indeed my

daughter is quiet, but is wiggly on her mat and no longer seems to need the rest time. The problem of course is the other children need their rest. Nap time is for about one hour each day. I have told her to make the best of it. Any other suggestions?

There is no easy answer to this dilemma. Most states have a minimum rest time requirement for children in full day child care programs. You could talk to the teachers and see if it is available for her to look at books or do some other quiet activity on her mat for part or all of the rest time.


There may be other older children also experiencing this difficulty and perhaps they could be separated from the younger children who need their sleep.

Generally, teachers are open to suggestions and are willing to try to accommodate the needs of all the children as they grow and develop. If quiet activities are not available, another recommendation would be to teach your daughter some relaxation techniques. Challenge her to try to recall her favorite movie, scene by scene, as she rests. You could also suggest that she spend this time imagining herself doing something special with her friends or family such as going on a picnic, swimming at the beach, etc.

My child's preschool teacher does not feel my child is ready for kindergarten next year. My husband really wants to send him

with all the boys that are in our neighborhood.

Preschool instructors see high numbers of children over the course of a few years



wish they had sent them to kindergarten earlier. There are many positive reasons for allowing a child to remain in a preschool setting for an extra year. You and your husband should have a formal conference with your child's teacher.

Before you meet, ask the teacher to do observations of your son interacting with the other children. At the meeting take the time to discuss the observations and also have the teacher relay what the advantages and disadvantages of moving the child on would be. Make the decision after weighing all the information.


Help! We are living with a mega-slob. He is an eleven year old boy whose room is strewn with clothes and everything else imaginable.

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

### Clueless in North Andover

No, this is not about the school department's fantasy budget. There will be plenty of "good stuff" to report on that subject next month in The Valley Patriot.

This month we want to revisit trash. Early last month the North Andover Solid Waste Committee/Recycling Committee enclosed a copy of its latest flyer in the local daily paper.

And there on the lower front page of the newsletter was the story, "Does North Andover Need PAYT? The time for Pay As You Throw may be now."

The only expression I could muster at the time was ... Disbelief!!

It has been just six months since the town resoundingly defeated a trash fee/tax at a raucous town meeting of 3000 people and now proponents of the fee think the town should revisit the issue. (Here I will pause as you catch your breath or finish laughing.)

The article starts by saying we still have a *trash generation* problem – although North Andover significantly reduced its trash amounts this past year. It goes on to say that PAYT addresses the issue of *fairness*. By this the committee means that we all pay the same for trash removal whether we throw out ten bags of trash a week or only one. This, the committee seems to conclude, is unfair.

I can actually agree with the committee on this latter point. But if this applies to trash, should it not also apply to other services? For example, we all pay the same taxes to support the education of our children. Yet I have no children in the schools – and never had – so shouldn't I be exempt from

paying this portion of my tax bill? After all, for *fairness*, we should expect only those households with children in the schools to pay for the school budget. And, of course, the more kids you have, the more you pay.

That would be great for me. It would reduce my tax bill by thousands of dollars. Sounds *fair* from my perspective.

The article goes on to say "Unfortunately, PAYT was introduced to the taxpayers under very strained circumstances." I'll say! The school spending zealots tried to ramrod an unpopular tax/fee through town meeting and the people rose up and said "No way!"

Isn't it the ultimate hypocrisy that the same people who think that its OK for property taxes to pay for the operation of our schools also think that it's <u>not</u> OK for those property taxes to pay for trash removal?

Now let's talk about Global Warming. What, you say, does this have to do with trash?

There is another incredible article in the recycling flyer that implies if North Andover residents don't a) reuse items that have already been produced, b) recycle paper products and c) compost yard and food wastes, that this will contribute to Global Warming. And the article goes on to say this may lead to "more frequent and intense storms, flooding of low-lying areas, changes in regional weather patterns, and an increase in infectious diseases carried by pests such as mosquitoes."

Does anybody really believe that by *not* putting a few more cans or newspapers into your recycle bin every week, you will cause malaria to spread into North Andover? This is what the Global Warming alarmists want you to believe. They want to "scare you" into doing what "they" want you to do. It is all about control and their quest for absolute control.

Now, don't get me wrong, I am all for recycling. Before I moved to North Andover, I lived in Wilmington for 20 years. There I was a member of the recycling committee and volunteered many Saturdays to help run the recycling drop-off center. To me it made sense to recycle items such as glass and newspapers and maybe some plastics.

So a good recycling policy should be based on common sense, not some threat of Global Warming.

Too many do-gooders today treat Global Warming as a religion – and they do so because the science isn't there to support many of the dire predictions. Beware of those preaching such "religious" beliefs to the masses. Step back for a minute and use a little common sense to evaluate the world around you.

Remember, Al Gore is no scientist – but he did attend divinity school at Vanderbilt.
