In last month's race for the Mayor's office in Lawrence, Willie Lantigua (da chief) defeated David Abdoo. While we have some serious reservations about Lantigua's ability to manage the city of Lawrence, as well as the character of those insiders he has surrounded himself with, today is a new day.



Barack Obama has been center stage now for over two years. He has opined on everything from health care to automobile designs, pain medications, and executive salaries. Have we been listening? Do we know what we are being fed?

America's leftists, led by Obama, are slowly injecting collectivist narcotics, laced with sweeteners, into every orifice of our society. As we sample their prescriptions for America, we have to scrape away the honey so we can taste the poison we are being fed.

If we want to assess, in an unbiased manner, someone's true ideological leanings, we have to look at his chosen associates, appointees, and policies. We might also note the absence of any representation of specific political viewpoints; in Obama's case, there is a conspicuous absence of any defenders of property rights or advocates of a free market economy.

This kind of assessment or methodology works across the political spectrum. If we analyze Reagan, we will determine that he was an economic conservative, a supporter of free markets, and an anti-communist. If we apply it to Lyndon Johnson, we will find he was a progressive, New Deal liberal. Try it with Jefferson and we reveal his commitment to very limited government, private property, and individual liberty. Put Stalin to the test and we see his commitment to brutal authoritarian dictatorship.

So it is fair to put Obama to the same test. As his associates, appointees and policies are described below, just ask yourself: Would Reagan have such associations, appointments, or policies? John Kennedy? Franklin Roosevelt? Truman? Clinton?

William Ayres – In 1969 Ayres cofounded the Weather Underground, a communist revolutionary group that conducted a campaign of bombing public buildings (approx. 25 in total) during the 1960s and 1970s. Ayres, to this day, is proud of these activities and says his biggest failing was not to have done more. In 1995 Obama announced his candidacy for Illinois state senate in the home of Ayres and his wife, fellow-revolutionary Bernardine Dohrn. He has since served with Ayres on the Chicago Annenberg schools project and the board of the Woods Fund, a Chicago charity.

Rev. Jeremiah Wright – Obama's self-described spiritual leader who just happens to be anti-American, anti-Semitic, and racist. In addition to Wright's famous quotes regarding "the U S of KKK A," claims that the U.S. invented AIDS to commit genocide against people of color, blaming America for 9/11, and "not God bless America, God damn America," Wright also gave Louis Farrakhan a "Life Achievement Award" despite (or because of?) his virulent anti-Semitic and anti-American views.

Rashid Khalidi – Khalidi, a Columbia University professor who has worked actively on behalf of the Palestine Liberation Organization when it was labeled a terror group by the State Department, held a fundraiser for Obama's failed bid for a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Obama has also publically expressed support for Khalidi as reported by Peter Wallsten, Los Angeles Times Staff Writer, in his April 10, 2008 article in the LA Times:

CHICAGO — It was a celebration of Palestinian culture — a night of music, dancing and a dash of politics. Local Arab Americans were bidding farewell to Rashid Khalidi, an internationally known scholar, critic of Israel and advocate for Palestinian rights, who was leaving town for a job in New York. A special tribute came from Khalidi's friend and frequent dinner companion, the young state Sen. Barack Obama. Speaking to the crowd, Obama reminisced about meals prepared by Khalidi's wife, Mona, and conversations that had challenged his thinking. [emphasis added]

Van Jones (Green Czar) –Van Jones was an activist in STORM, Standing Together to Organize a Revolutionary Movement, "a group explicitly committed to revolutionary, Marxist politics whose points of unity were revolutionary democ-

racy, revolutionary feminism, revolutionary internationalism, the central role of the working class, urban Marxism, and Third World Communism." Van Jones was also co-founder of "Color of Change," whose racist mission "is to strengthen Black America's political voice." In October 2005, Jones said that, after the Rodney King affair in August 1992, he was a communist.

Mark Lloyd (FCC Diversity Czar)

- How can Obama appoint a communications diversity Czar who doesn't adamantly support the First Amendment protection of Free Speech? Here is what Lloyd had to say about his views on freedom of speech: "It should be clear by now that my focus here is not freedom of speech or the press. This freedom is all too often an exaggeration. At the very least, blind references to freedom of speech or the press serve as a distraction from the critical examination of other communications policies."

Lloyd also happens to be a big fan of Venezuelan dictator Hugo Chavez who is known for eliminating press freedoms in Venezuela. He praised Chavez's revolution, calling it "really incredible."

Cass Sunstein (Regulatory Czar) – Here is what Obama's Regulatory Czar said regarding the glories of taxation:

"In what sense is the money in our pockets and bank accounts fully "ours"? Did we earn it by our own autonomous efforts? Could we have inherited it without the assistance of probate courts? Do we save it without support from bank regulators? Could we spend it (say, on the installment plan) if there were no public officials to coordinate the efforts and pool the resources of the community in which we live?

Do not get up tomorrow (April 15th) and drape your house in black! For tax day is not a day of national mourning. Without taxes there would be no liberty.

Without taxes there would be no property. Without taxes, few of us would have any assets worth defending."

Carol Browner (Director of the White House Office of Energy and Climate Change Policy) – Immediately prior to her appointment, Browner was one of 14 senior leaders of the Socialist International Commission for a Sustainable World Society, a group that champions world socialism and "global governance."

Kevin Jennings (Safe Schools Czar) – Jennings believes that sexual orientation lessons should begin in kindergarten. And just when you thought it was safe to send your children to school ...

There is little excuse for these associations and appointments. Obama supporters try to minimize Obama's relationships with the likes of Ayres, Wright, and Khalidi, but other politicians don't have similar

associations. And other presidents don't make the conscious decision to place committed leftists into critical, decision-making positions having power over the economy, energy, government regulations, freedom of speech, the environment, and our schools.

The ultimate test of the socialist tendencies of our president is the degree to which he supports expropriation of private wealth, grows government spending, and cements government power. If the results of the previous tests were not convincing, the evidence here is overwhelming.

Just consider the federal government's take-over of the banking and financial services industry, the unconstitutional dictating of private salaries, the take-over of GM and Chrysler, the maniacal focus on government-run health care, and Obama's plan to impose a carbon tax through capand-trade.

The degree to which private property (and the rights to decide its use) is being expropriated by the government under the Obama administration is astounding. Here are just a few statistics taken from the Wall Street Journal, Oct. 26, 2009:

* The fiscal 2009 deficit resulting from government spending is estimated to be \$1.4 TRILLION

* In FY2009, Medicare and Medicaid spending increased 9.8% and 24.7%, respectively; the EPA's budget rose 126%; the Dept of Education's budget increased 209%; and energy programs increased 146%

* The budget of federal agencies increased, on average, 57% from 2008 to 2010.

* Democrat spending proposals for FY2010 amount to an annual increase of over 12%

* Proposals for spending through 2019 include \$3.4 TRILLION in NEW spending (as estimated by the CBO ... historically a gross under-estimate).

All of this happening when inflation is under 1% and while real family incomes were falling 3.6%.

There is little more to say. The evidence speaks for itself: Obama is not a duck ... but he is a real and genuine socialist.

We can meekly accept our fate and pay the consequences in lost freedoms and a substantially lower standard of living ... **OR** we can stop the madness beginning with the 2010 elections.

It is time to start fighting back.



Lantigua has absolute power in Lawrence

Few people can really understand the magnitude of the changes that are about to occur in the City of Lawrence with the election of State Representative Willie Lantigua (da chief). Not only did Willie win an overwhelming victory on Election

Day, but almost every one of his "slate" of candidates for city council and school committee won as well.

What this means is that Lantigua, at least in his first two years (of a four year term) has absolute power over Lawrence city government. That's a lot of power in the hands of one man.

As mayor, Willie will control all of city hall. He controls the hiring and firing in the city as well as promotions of city employees and every expenditure in the city budget. He controls the police department, the personnel department, the DPW, inspectional services, the city

assessors office, the tax collector's office, the hiring and appointment of all boards such as the licensing board, the planning board, the workforce investment board, even the Lawrence Public Library Board of Trustees.

The mayor also controls all city contracts, hiring of outside consultants, the water department, and the enforcement of all city ordinances. He also has the discretion to decide which city ordinances to enforce and which to ignore as previous mayors have refused to enforce a residency requirement and cherry picked which

parts of the charter to follow. And that's just his power as the duly elected mayor according to the city charter.

But, Willie will have so much more power than that when he takes office next

Because he also ran a slate of candidates for city council, (most of whom were victorious because of Lantigua's endorsements) the legislative branch of city government (which is supposed to provide the checks and balances of local government), will also be under the control of Willie Lantigua (da chief).

Winning in November with the help of Lantigua were Councilors: Frank Moran, Dan Rivera, Sandy Almonte, Grisel Silva, Modesto Maldonado, and Oneida Aquino. That's an almost guaranteed six votes out of nine councilors for whatever Lantigua wants to accomplish.

The City Council is in charge of passing the budget, passing and amending city ordinances and making changes to the city charter, as well as approving the hiring and firing of department heads and policies governing the size of buildable lots, the placement of new city buildings, and the sale of city owned land.

But that's not all ... not even close. When Lantigua takes office in January he also has a majority of the votes on the School Committee and will sit as the board's chairman.

With Superintendent of Schools

Wilfredo Laboy's job in limbo due to multiple investigations, Lantigua said before the election that he was going to replace Laboy and look for a new head of the Lawrence Public Schools. Something he will be able to do with total autonomy since the school committee will be squarely in his pocket. He will also control all school department policies, the hiring and firing of all school department personnel, where new schools will be built, who will be hired to oversee them, the construction of new school buildings and who will get those construction contracts, and the curriculum taught to school children in the classrooms.

If all this wasn't enough for one man to control, Willie Lantigua will also maintain his job as State Representative for the city of Lawrence. He controls all legislation coming out of the city and has tremendous influence over any legislation that would affect the city.

When he takes office in a two months, Willie Lantigua's combined salaries, (between his job as mayor and his position as the sitting State Rep.) runs somewhere in the neighborhood of \$170,000. And, since the state and municipal retirement system calculates a person's retirement from their highest three years of income, Lantigua stands to walk away from government service with a very hefty, lifetime paycheck.

Lawrence has a myriad of seemingly insurmountable problems facing its' citizens right now. The enormous task Willie has ahead of him in the next four years may mean he will earn every single penny of it. Just for starters Lantigua's burden come next January includes; a rise in crime, a \$10 million budget deficit this year (and a guarantee of more deficits in coming years), a housing crisis that has resulted in over 400 abandoned properties, two fire stations closed, ten firefighters laid off, racial tensions, the highest unemployment rate in the state, a crumbling infrastructure, a huge illiteracy problem, and a city charter that is clearly broken.

The one good thing about all this power

Lantigua alone will wield is this: under the current mayor and city council nothing productive is getting done. Council President Patrick Blanchette and his puppets on the council have thrown roadblocks in Sullivan's way and the war between the executive and legislative branches of city government have brought progress to a near stand still over the last two years.

And, under the current "leadership" of our elected officials in the city, finger pointing and passing the buck has been brought to an art form. The council micromanages the mayor's every move and then wrings their hands and whines about the mayor's lack of progress. Who you believe depends on who you supported in the last election but, the result is always the same. When the mayor manages to succeed at accomplishing something significant despite the council's interference, they climb over themselves to take the credit and bash the mayor along the way.

With one man controlling everything in Lawrence (similar to a mini-dictatorship) there is really only one person to blame or take the credit no matter what happens in the next two years, and maybe even the next four.

One thing for sure, a few years from now when you drive around the City of Lawrence, the conditions we observe (for better or worse) will be the success or failure of one man, Willie Lantigua da chief.

For the sake of the city, let's all hope that we will be looking at a bustling, thriving mecca of business, industry and culture, that is inviting to tourists and outsiders and safe for Lawrencians to live in and work in every day.

For as Lawrence goes, so goes the rest of the Valley.

Lantigua victory masterfully done – now the real work begins

The votes are in and Lawrence finally has met demographic expectations to attain its first popularly elected mayor of Hispanic descent.

We will not use the trite adjective of "historic" to describe State Representative William Lantigua's victory over District E City Councilor David Abdoo, as that has really been beaten to death.

What needs to be said, however, is that, in the face of accusations of all kinds of voter fraud and other electoral chicanery, kudos go out to Mr. Lantigua for his impressive victory over the first-term city

Mr. Lantigua was able to ultimately capitalize on a decade's worth of grassroots building by various Hispanic leaders in Lawrence, primarily Isabel Melendez, who strove to register any and all living, breathing Hispanic Lawrencians.

After Ms. Melendez came so close to being the first Hispanic mayor in Lawrence in the 2001 election, Hispanic leaders stepped up their efforts with the hope of capitalizing on the 2001 Melendez euphoria, albeit one rooted in defeat. Although the implosion of the Devers campaign in 2005 would put off that celebration for another time, the demographics were there for a Hispanic who could build the necessary effort to capitalize on the fact that a 70% Hispanic city finally reached the point of having more than 51% of its voters being of Hispanic background.

If you look at the numbers from this year's race, you really have to give Mr. Lantigua credit for his electoral accomplishment.

Four years ago, Mayor Sullivan was re-elected with 6,000+ votes to Marcos Devers' 3,900. This year, Mr. Abdoo pulled basically the same number (6,057) as Sullivan did, but Mr. Lantigua was able to layer an additional 3,100 votes on top of the Devers 2005 tally. No easy feat when one looks at the Lantigua vote being built one house at a time.

I always viewed the 18,000 or so Hispanic registered voters in our city as the equivalent of Cold War "sleeper" agents, waiting to answer the call when finally needed to act. And this time Mr. Lantigua pushed all the right buttons. Voters, registered for one reason or another over the years but were never really asked to participate fully in the process, literally were dragged from their homes to cast a ballot for Mr. Lantigua last month.

Rep. Lantigua himself on election day was walking predominately Hispanic neighborhoods and lighting the fire under his voters to get them to the polls.

As one who has always been a student of the mechanics of the election process, what Mr. Lantigua did, from a purely scientific perspective, was nothing short of incredible. If it was not for his intense, very personal, election day get-out-thevote efforts within the Hispanic neighborhoods, the result most likely would have been different.

On another front, the Lantigua mayoral success also led to the election, (for now until any recounts are completed), of six Hispanics to the City Council (out of 9 seats), including in District A as the replacement for Council President Patrick Blanchette, who lost in his bid to be mayor in the September 22nd preliminary election.

What will be most interesting about is the question of who will now be elected as the council president and run the legislative alternative to the Lantigua executive office. One thing you can say about Patrick Blanchette is he was able to set an agenda for the City Council and lead them in a single direction toward a common

One may not like what his goals were (roadblocks, obstructing Mayor Sullivan's progress and micromanaging the executive branch) – and I for one have serious issues with his ultimate goals and the style he demonstrated - but, again, from a purely scientific perspective, Mr. Blanchette displayed active leadership as a legislative leader during some very difficult times.

The new Council will have (as returnees) at-large Councilors Frank Moran, Roger Twomey, and District B Councilor Grisel Silva. Common sense would say that the council presidency should be Mr. Moran's for the asking, but I cannot see him placing himself in any type of leadership role where he would potentially clash with his good friend Mayor-elect Lantigua. On the other hand, if anyone would be capable of standing up to Lantigua over the next years, Moran may be the only one capable of doing so successfully.

Therefore, just who will be able to step forward and cobble together the necessary votes to hold the gavel for the next two years? Newly elected Dan Rivera? Former councilor Marc Laplante?

Whomever that person is, the committee appointments they make, including the chair and contingent of the all-important Budget and Finance Committee, will go a long way toward telling us whether this Council will be able to work constructively with Mayor Lantigua and his finance team, along with any resources from the state such as an audit team from the Department of Revenue, ... perhaps even a receiver, to right the city's financial ship.

With a \$10 million deficit one-third of the way through the fiscal year, Lawrence needs much more than the usual Mark Andrews smoke and mirrors and prestidigitation to get us in the black.

Right now, we probably are looking at substantial employee cuts from the lame duck Mayor Sullivan with the assent of the equally lame duck city council.

Time is of the essence. A plan needs to be in place by December 31 for the city to have a set tax rate and tax bills sent out to property owners.

Regardless, the mess that Mayor-elect Lantigua and the new city council is inheriting surely was not anticipated on the horizon when they announced their candidacies nine months ago.

The easy part – getting elected - is done. The hard part will come in early January when all the pieces are in place at City

The trifecta is complete

The era of the charismatic black man has been fulfilled for Lawrence residents. Three men of African or Caribbean descent are now their political leaders: the president, the governor, and now the mayor. Three elements are the reason why: charisma, ideology, and race.

This phenomenon is worth mentioning for three reasons: it is historical and unprecedented, it manifests demographic change, and it is something most people are frightened to mention publicly because of false accusations of racism.

To mention this historical phenomenon is not racism, of course, but a recognition of accomplishment within the democratic process.

The substantive point to mention, however, is not their race. Minority politicians are embraced by all segments of the political spectrum; conservatives rejoice in people like Alan Keyes, Justice Clarence Thomas, and Michael Steele. These three men represent a considerable shift to the left. "Change" for these three means not only racial change for leadership but ideological change.

The perfect storm for the political left has come about through a post-Bush era that has Wall Street crashing, jobs being lost, and people looking for some kind of change. If not at this moment then when will a socialized economy, abortion in health care, voluntary euthanasia, and same-sex marriage, become a universal reality? It's now or never, figures the left, for such fundamental "change".

This brings me to the charisma factor. The independents that decide elections don't care much about politics. It is the "it" factor, which no one can fully describe, but can be found in politicians of any race or ideology, that usually makes

the difference. Ronald Reagan had it. Bill Clinton had it. John F. Kennedy certainly had it. "It" is found in many dictators throughout history that promise fundamental change to the masses only to abuse their power. Natural charisma can be used for great good or great evil.

This particular "it" doesn't seem to include women. There have been great female leaders, but generally women seem to have a feminine kind of natural power that can make men melt and lead them to becoming better persons.

Despite the attempt of the past generation to androgenize the sexes there is still a masculine and a feminine charisma or "it" that most people recognize. When exploited by the media or by women themselves it can also lead to as much havoc as men's charisma can when abused. When Hillary cried in NH she got sympathy votes. When Ed Muskie did in NH he had to drop out of the race. Truth and beauty, wisdom and goodness, the head and the heart, the yin and yang, animus and anima - all ways of expressing the natural complementary of charisma that unites for the good of the whole.

Will this era of the liberal charismatic minority be an ongoing movement? Will voters reject the ideology once they've gotten a full taste of it? Will more conservative minorities make their mark in the near future? As history seems to indicate, much depends on not only timing, but charisma. Next election cycle for president, governor and mayor should be very telling.



Shawn Hansen's Lowell Devils Update

Up to par, the Lowell Devils sit with a record of 4-4-2-0 through Oct. 30.

Games looked at in the past month, on Sept. 20, 2009, the Lowell Devils torched the Bridgeport Sound Tigers 4-0. The Devils scored first in the game with 14:14 on the clock of the first period according to lowelldevils.com as Rob Davison knocked in his first goal of the season.

Ben Walter fled past two Sound Tigers defensemen assisting Davison who slapped a shot into the corner of the net. Matt Taormina then found Walter moments later when he scored on a power play goal with 3:11 in the second period. With only a minute left until the second intermission, Brad Snetsinger added a goal for the Devils advancing their lead to three.

Going into the third period with a 3-0 lead, Patrick Davis scored Lowell's fourth goal with 6:52 left in regulation.

The Sound Tigers did their best all night to disrupt McKenna's perfect game as they gnawed off 19 shots in the final period of play. Goalie Mike McKenna made 40 saves for his second shutout in three starts and Ben Walter iced in a goal and an assist as the Devils blanked the Sound Tigers 4-0.

A few days after Lowell washed away Bridgeport, the Springfield Falcons upset the New Jersey affiliate 4-3.



Down 2-1 at the beginning of the third period, the Devils scored twice within 39 seconds to take their first lead of the game, 3-2. Lowell twinned up the game on a power play after Vladimir Zharkovs misfired finding Tyler Eckford who fired it in for his third goal of the season. Alexander Vasyunov then made it 3-2 splitting the defense flipping in a backhander over the blocker of Devan Dubnyk.

Despite being shutout 10-3 in the closing period of the game, two former Devils helped the Falcons tie things up with 6:44 left in regulation.

Within the first month of AHL hockey, the Devils acquired Dean McAmmond and Matt Cohen. Cohen is a defensemen who was called back to Lowell coming from the Trenton Devils of the ECHL.

McAmmond shuffled up his cards last season playing with the Ottawa Senators and the New York Islanders, totaling five goals, 11 assists and 24 penalty minutes in 62 games.

The 22nd overall pick by the Chicago Blackhawks in the 1991 NHL Entry Draft, McAmmond has compiled 178 goals and 235 assists in 934 NHL games over his 16-year NHL career.

Cohen posted a goal and two penalty minutes in two games in Trenton. The 23-year old has appeared in eight games for Lowell, spending most of his time in Trenton over the last two seasons. In New Jersey, Cohen tallied 18 goals, 52 assists and 146 penalty minutes in 141 games being named an American Conference All-Star during the 2007-08 season. He hails from Yale University were he was a four-year letterman skating in 118 career games serving as team captain his senior year.

When the Boston Celtics came to the Tsongas Arena for an open practice, I got the chance to speak with some of the players about their thoughts on the upcoming season. As I sat courtside next to Boston sports reporter, Jackie MacMullan and her children, the Celtics were running team drills with rhythm and finesse. The number of mistakes made could be counted on one hand. There was one instance when Doc had to stop play to tell rookie Lester Hudson, "this is not the *expletive* playground!"

When the team was done practicing, Doc sent the starters out there and had them going up and down the court running various offensive plays. As the team gathered around center court and practice was coming to a close the team put their hands together and chanted in unity "Ubuntu!"

After practice most of the players were gathering their things, icing their knees, and getting ready to head on the team bus.

Paul Pierce, Rajon Rondo, Eddie House, Ray Allen, and Rasheed Wallace were shaking hands and singing autographs for the fans in attendance. The atmosphere after the intense practice was very family friendly as autographed t-shirts were shot into the crowd. Rasheed Wallace was throwing around a football with a member of the Celtics staff.

I asked Eddie House if this is the deepest bench he has ever played with, including the 07 championship bench: "We're expected to be, a lot of guys have something to prove as far as we want to be the best bench in the NBA.

In order to do that we have to go in there night in and night out and try to prove that with a chip on our shoulder. Because if we are the best bench in the league, it only helps our team that much more."

When asked if there would be an adjustment period for all the new players added, he replied: "We are synched up and ready to go. I mean a couple of guys still have to get their rhythm and the scheme of the offense but other than that I think we're going to be alright."

Don't expect the Celtics to be worried about nagging injuries either, according to Ray Allen: "I've never looked at it from an injury standpoint. The injuries are a part of the game but you don't want to talk about it. Just keep playing hard and get better every day. We're kind of looking for our angle to become a better team." When asked about his own physical health and the depth of this year's team, he said: "I love the way I feel! I'm in a great position and in great shape." And on the depth of the team: "I feel good, I mean we have Rasheed Wallace and Marquis Daniels who were starters on NBA rosters last year, coming off the bench for us," Allen replied.

Lester Hudson had this to say on what he thought his role might be this season: "I think I am a great player and I know it within myself. I will be making the open shots and playing great defense." When asked what was the worst hazing he had gotten after Rasheed Wallace had interrupted with some humorous expletives that cannot be written Lester said: " Before a preseason game against the Toronto Raptors at the Garden they told me I had to sing happy birthday to Paul Pierce and Doc before the game in front of all the fans." When asked how he felt during it he replied, "I was shook up and nervous, I have never done anything like that before and I can't sing, so they got me right there."

All that can be left to say is that the unity and depth of this team is going to be a force to be reckoned with in the NBA. Although the Lakers are reigning champions, I would be clutching my old Kobe Bryant No. 8 jersey and praying to old Jack Nicholson if they think they are due for a repeat. After the impressive opening night win in Cleveland, something that hadn't been done since 2004, the Celtics set the standard as the team to beat.

Capuano Challenges Coakley on Death Penalty

Congressman Mike Capuano, Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, today called Martha Coakley's rationale for supporting a pro death penalty position "absolutely wrong" and said it demonstrates that "she is out of step with the progressive values of the Commonwealth."

"The race for Senate is about succeeding Ted Kennedy, "Capuano said.

"He would have never supported this position. Ted Kennedy understood that being a U.S. Senator is about being a leader not a lawyer."

Coakley supported a position before the Supreme Court that would limit federal review of state court decisions, which opponents say could make it harder for defendants on death row to challenge their sentences, even when, as here, they lacked effective counsel or other possible safeguards against wrongful execution.

"Ms. Coakley claims her duties as AG compelled her to be involved in this case," Capuano continued. "That is simply not


true. AG's in surrounding states did not participate and Massachusetts should not in Massachusetts. She is not required to sign on in support of a case involving a death sentence for a developmentally disabled individual in the state of Alabama."

"The foundation of Ms. Coakley's position is that reaching finality in a case is more important than due process rights. That is the same position that George Bush and Dick Cheney took and it is exactly why their terror detention policies have been successfully challenged at the Supreme Court. This view is probably why she has supported George Bush's PATRIOT Act, and I have consistently opposed it."

BOXFORD

Through the Looking Glass

Boxford's Special Town Meeting fit into one evening on October 27, 2009. New England towns typically have an Annual Town Meeting each spring. Special meetings are held when something, well, special comes up and can't wait until the next annual meeting.

Boxford has had a de facto Biannual Town Meeting since 2004, with one in spring and one in fall. The reasons vary, but the increasing numbers of warrant articles advocating welfare state social engineering initiatives have greatly increased the length and divisiveness of these meetings.

The main event this fall was Article 6 which sought to subdivide and restrict the uses of the Haynes land, the 75.5 acre parcel bought two years ago with CPA money. Subdivision here means allocating specific uses to specific sections of the land and fossilizing those allocations with land use restrictions which "may be enforced by injunction or other proceeding, and shall entitle representatives of the holder to enter the land in a reasonable manner and at reasonable times to assure compliance." This is stern stuff from MGL Chapter 184 §32.

The three allocations were "open space" to 36.2 acre Parcel A, "recreation" to 25.9 acre Parcel B, and "community housing" to 13.4 acre Parcel C. No money was sought for any improvements. Proponents of the article termed its actions "designation," perhaps thinking this opaque term sounded benign; I found it oddly Orwellian. The article was sponsored by the CPA Committee with the hearty approval of the Haynes Land Advisory Committee.

Passing Article 6 would presage expensive proposals such as \$5,000,000 athletic fields which would be controlled by the Boxford Athletic Association or BAA and twenty subsidized condominiums proposed by the Housing Partnership (HPC) and CPA Committees. The condominiums would be built and sold by a developer supposedly at no cost to the town.

The BAA had promoted Article 6 by emails to its membership and documents on its website. They represented a positive vote as supporting fields but not housing. I thought all this misleading. It is true that most affordable housing restrictions are granted by the developer of an approved project to the municipality or other agency. But a restriction "in any way limiting or restricting the use or enjoyment of all or any portion of the land for the purpose of encouraging or assuring creation or retention of rental and other housing" can be executed; I see nothing stopping the Selectmen from doing just that if Article 6 passed and

preventing any future change of use.

Article 7 on the warrant would empower the Selectmen to convey the housing land to a private real estate developer, presumably for free. Its separation from Article 6 leads me to wonder if our politicians are most obtuse or clever.

They are most obtuse if they thought Article 6 could pass with a simple majority as someone opined at the earlier Moderator's forum; it was on the warrant the previous fall and failed to get the needed two-thirds majority. They are most clever if they secretly thought to stifle debate on Article 6 through smashmouth parliamentary techniques.

Here's what happened. After a forgettable half hour presentation by the Town, I started my eight minute presentation. I noted that many of the same committees and people responsible for the land's overpriced purchase were now proposing to construct athletic fields in the drainage area for Parcel A and Butman Pond. The few acres of dry land were reserved for an incongruous housing project. I noted the Conservation Commission wouldn't likely approve the athletic fields project despite the Haynes Committee's nebulous opinions. If Article 6 passed a housing development contract would be let "pending article 7." Oops.

This drew a Moderator's rebuke though I hadn't discussed Article 7, just spoke its name. Next I got into the not so free nature of the housing development. The room erupted in a cacophony of "Points of Order" from the left wing of the auditorium and warnings from the Moderator to talk about Article 6 and not about Article 7. Now neither article actually proposed a housing project; one would arise from their mutual passage. It made no sense to me or most of the room to delay discussion of housing. But, like Tweedledum and Tweedledee, the Moderator and housing supporters just seemed to know that housing could only be discussed in Article

Floundering about, I analyzed town employee salaries which the Town had also discussed. An evenly distributed 37% of Boxford town employees are residents dispelling the guest worker image promoted by the HPC whose misleading statistics are baseless.

After I spoke, the HPC suggested that perhaps we could discuss housing. The debate now thoroughly poisoned, the Moderator agreed. I then had the dual satisfactions of finishing the housing discussion and seeing Article 6 fail.



Judge Kathe Tuttman stated in her ruling against DiAdamo that "The plaintiff's contentions that the discovery sought is relevant and that his underlying claim has merit, however true they may be, do not provide "good cause" for relief from the stay required by GL c.231 s.59H. Further, the plaintiff has not demonstrated that he will be unfairly prejudiced by the stay." While we always knew that Billy DiAdamo's daddy was fighting his battles for him in court and that Carmine was really the driving force behind this frivolous lawsuit, we are shocked that he would be so careless as to admit that under oath. The lawsuit does continue and we continue to spend loads of money defending it. But we would rather pay money to lawyers than reveal





Identity Theft: preparation is the best defense

Identity theft is an extremely serious crime; people are facing greater attacks on their personal and financial privacy than ever before. In fact, it's the fastest growing crime in the United Sates with nearly 10 million people becoming victim to the crime last year, according to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).

Identity theft occurs when personal identifying information, such as your name, Social Security number, credit or debit card number, or even bank account number, is stolen and used without your knowledge or permission. There are many ways your personal information can be stolen, including; telephone solicitations and emails that ask you to verify personal information for a trusted source, like your financial institution. personal information can come in many different forms. Here are some of the most common:

Telephone Solicitations: The telephone

is a popular way to get information out of people. They pretend to call and ask for donations to a good cause or try and sell you a product or service. Their appeal can be tailored to your reaction. Often times they try and make you feel guilty about not donating or buying. If you are interested, your best response is to ask them to send you the information in the mail. This will give you an opportunity to think about, research and review the offer. Never give out your personal information to someone who calls you unsolicited. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it most likely is.

Shoulder Surfing: Criminals try to spot calling card and personal identification numbers while you're using an ATM or public phone.

Dumpster Diving: Thieves rummage through trash looking for bills or other paper that includes your personal informa-

How life insurance can protect your home

You and your family have worked hard to acquire your home, a rental property or other real estate holdings, and you qualified for that mortgage thanks to your income level, excellent credit rating and financial history.

But what would happen if you — the primary income producer or even as half of a dualincome partnership — suddenly died? In some cases, Term insurance is convertible to permanent life insurance, without showing proof of insurability

Permanent insurance plans, such as Whole Life, are pricier than term products, but give you the benefit of building cash value. A portion of the premiums you pay for permanent insurance coverage builds tax-deferred cash value each year. With Whole life, you are insured for

Permanent life insurance also allows you to customize a plan by adding optional riders. And there is a guaranteed death benefit, generally free from federal income tax.

What you need to know about reverse mortgages, Part IV

Now that we have seen what a reverse mortgage is: Is it for everyone? Many older people remember a show years ago, called "The 64,000 Question". As we have seen in previous articles, there is a lot to look at. You know that the party or parties must meet the age requirement of being over 62 years old. One case, of many that are going on, we should look at. The husband was under 62 years old and the wife was over 62 years old. The mortgage broker persuaded the parties to transfer the property from a joint ownership to the wife as an individual owner. The wife however was sick and they needed the money for her sickness. The parties agreed to the transfer of the property and got the reverse mortgage.

However, the wife got even sicker and she had to move into a nursing home. She never returned to her home as she passed on. There was not much equity left in the residence home since it was used for her medical bills. As the rules of reverse mortgage are when the last owner of the residence move out and never returns, the property must be refinanced, sold or foreclosed. The husband did not have the funds or credit to refinance the house, and there were no children, so the property would be foreclosed and the husband must find new living quarters. Also, the rules state that all upfront costs, fees, and interest through the years of the mortgage all become due at the time the last owner moves out. These fees could not be paid or refinanced by the husband so he lost the house, and had to move out.

Another case was brought to my at-

tention by a reader of my articles and asked me was I in favor of the reverse mortgages. The reason they asked the question was that their friends had taken out a reverse mortgage and were moving into an apartment, but the children could not afford to refinance the house because of the amount of money that was owed. They had to let it go into foreclosure and the children bought a smaller home which they could afford even though they wanted to own their parent's home. These above cases happen many times, as the use of these loans are exploding, as Lenders who shoulder almost no risk, push them to the growing ranks of retired baby boomers especially for spending on vacations, new cars and more.

As stated in earlier articles, reverse mortgages can be valuable as a last resort for seniors who want to stay in their homes and have significant equity but need money to supplement income or banish an existing mortgage payment. With a reverse mortgage they can trade some of that equity for a lump sum and monthly pay outs. But as seen in this article, those loans can be terrible for customers who don't understand the complicated rules governing them and how quickly high fees and interest rates can balloon. They can end up stranded in their homes without any remaining equity to cover unexpected costs later in life.

Lawmakers and regulators are getting worried about these loans, In fact. Senator

Claire McCaskill, Democrat-Missouri, who is pushing for reverse mortgage industry reforms, says "The people who are making these loans and advertising them so heavily to seniors are on cable

television get the rewards but escape the risks that come with them. It's going to be the sequel to the sub-prime mortgage mess". Also, John Dugan, head of the office of the Controller of the Currency at an American Bankers conference in June of this year said, "Risks that contributed to the collapse of the subprime mortgage market also are a concern in the sale of reverse mortgages." A recent Consumer Reports investigation has found more cause for concern: "Loan bailouts have soared. The annual sum of reverse mortgages taken over by a federal insurance fund has more than quadrupled in four years, from \$81.3 million in 2004 to \$381.3 million in 2008, according to Consumer Reports analysis of more than 500,000 loans over two decades.

Taxpayers, in fact, are now being tapped to subsidize reverse mortgages for the first time. Usually insurance premiums paid by borrowers have covered bailouts of mortgages by the funds.

The payouts to lenders occur under certain circumstances such as when the eventual sale of a borrower's home doesn't cover the money owed on the loan.

Now the Department of Housing and Urban Development says that \$798 million in taxpayer's money must be budgeted in the next fiscal year to cover potential losses that won't be covered by the premiums.

As stated earlier reverse mortgages can be appropriate for seniors yet "transparency and consumer protections are needed" said Senator Herb Kohl, a Wisconsin Democrat and chairman of the Senate Special Committee on Aging.

Both Kohl and Senator McCaskill

quoted earlier in this article, released a government report in June of this year that said some lenders falsely market reverse mortgages as "lifetime income" and sell mortgages coupled with other financial products such as annuities even though Congress banned so called cross-selling

The National Consumer Law Center has in fact stated that reverse mortgages may be the next "subprime curse." The Center has said that some of the same U.S. lenders that helped drive the real estate boom with loans to home buyers who could not afford the payments are now targeting senior citizens.

Brokers who are given financial incentives to sell the loans may be making misleading claim's, according to a report titled "Subprime Revisited" released October 6, 2009 by Boston based National Consumer Law Center.

This writer is of the opinion that this mortgage should be looked at closely as it is not for everyone. It should be used by people who need money and have no other means of obtaining these funds but have equity in their home. If they have children, they must undergo counseling to fully understand the complexities of this

Late-night snacking can sabotage weight loss efforts

If you're trying to slim down, you already know you need to cut calories. The results of a new study suggest that when it comes to losing weight, the timing of your meals and snacks may be just as important as the number of calories you consume.

Published in the Sept. 3 issue of the medical journal Obesity, the study provides the first concrete evidence linking meal timing and weight gain.

Until recently, most scientists believed that weight loss was a matter of simple mathematics: In order to lose a pound of body weight by dieting alone, you must consume approximately 3,500 fewer calories than your body needs to support itself at your current weight and activity level.

Researchers at Northwestern University challenged this theory. Using laboratory animals, they demonstrated that eating during normal sleeping hours promotes more weight gain than would be predicted by caloric intake alone.

Translated to human terms, this means that eating a slice of leftover pizza as a midnight snack could cause you to gain significantly more weight than if you ate the same slice of pizza at 3:00 in the afternoon.

The scientists' interest in the connection between late-night eating and weight gain arose after noting that nightshift workers, whose schedules

force them to eat at times that are in conflict with natural body rhythms, tend to be more overweight than their day-



shift counterparts. The researchers suspected that simply changing the timing of food consumption might influence weight gain to a greater degree than previously thought.

To test their hypothesis, the researchers fed two groups of mice a high-fat diet. Mice in both groups were allowed to eat as much as they wanted for a period of 12 hours each day.

While one group of mice was allowed free access to food only during normal rodent feeding times, the mice

in the other group were offered unlimited access to food only during their normal sleeping hours. There was no significant difference in the amount of physical activity performed by the mice in the two groups.

Although the mice in both groups ate roughly the same number of calories in each 24-hour period, those that dined during their normal sleeping hours gained more than twice as much weight over the six-week study period as those that ate during the hours they were normally awake.

The mice that were allowed ad lib access to food during their normal sleeping times experienced a 48 percent increase in body weight, while those that were provided ad lib access to food during their typical active hours experienced only a 20 percent increase in body weight.

Based on their findings, the Northwestern University researchers speculate that nighttime eating in humans may disrupt the body's biological clock, known as the circadian rhythm, which governs daily cycles of feeding, activity and sleep.

Eating at inappropriate times appears to trigger a chain reaction of hormonal and

metabolic events in the body that ultimately leads to excess weight gain.

While a midnight raid on the refrigerator can sabotage your efforts to slim down, eating breakfast is associated with weight-loss success. Although some dieters skip the morning meal in an effort to cut calories, scientific evidence suggests that people who eat breakfast each morning tend to be thinner than those who don't.

In a study published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, researchers at Vanderbilt University found that when dieters ate breakfast regularly, they lost significantly more weight than those who routinely missed the morning meal.

The study included 52 moderately obese women who were placed on a calorie-restricted diet and randomly assigned to one of two groups. The women in both groups consumed an equal number of calories each day, but one group ate breakfast, while the other did not.

Women assigned to the breakfast-eating group lost an average of 19.6 pounds in

three months, while those assigned to the breakfast-skipping group lost an average of 13.6 pounds. The women who ate breakfast reported experiencing significantly less hunger throughout the day.

In addition to eating fewer calories at lunch and dinner, the breakfast-eaters were less likely to engage in mindless snacking behaviors, including plundering the pantry before bedtime.

If you're determined to slim down, cutting back on the number of calories you consume is a great place to start. To make the most of your weight-loss efforts, it's important to remember that when you eat may be just as important as how much you eat.



No Benefit Increase this Year for Social Security

The recession and economic turmoil has claimed another victim, Social Security recipients. This year, elders will see no cost of living adjustment in their checks this January, because of the low growth in consumer prices.

Each year, social security and supplemental security income benefits are adjusted annually to reflect an increase in the cost of living as measured by the Consumer Price Index prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The purpose of the annual cost of living adjustment is to ensure that the purchasing power of elders is not eroded by inflation.

On October 14th, President Barack Obama asked Congress to legislate a second round of \$250 economic recovery payments to Social Security recipients in 2010. This year's stimulus bill (the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, or ARRA) included those payments, which went out to all Social Security beneficiaries in the summer. The President is now urging Congress to authorize a repeat of that program for the coming year, citing continued economic hardship among the Social Security population. The \$250 figure is equivalent to approximately 2% of the average annual Social Security retirement benefit. It is estimated that the cost of this proposal is \$13 billion. This is the White House's first ARRA extension request. The announcement came on the heels of the news that there will be no costof-living adjustment (COLA) in 2010, given the country's negative inflation rate.

"Older adults struggling to make ends meet in this recession will be directly aided by this relief, and we hope the expenditure of these payments will have a stimulative effect on the economy, as well," said Rosanne DiStefano, Executive Director of Elder Services of the Merrimack Valley, Inc. "Given the lack of a cost-of-living adjustment in 2010 for Social Security recipients, this one-time payment will be especially helpful to those living on a fixed income," DiStefano said.



Election 2009 – A Call For Change

The Election is over and the voters decided to place 3 new faces on the Lowell City Council – displacing two incumbents from the majority faction of the last two years (a third incumbent chose not to run for re-election). As one of the new faces, I am grateful to the voters for placing their trust in me. The other new faces are Franky Descoteaux and Patrick Murphy.

Together with the returning incumbents - Kevin Broderick, Edward "Bud" Caulfield, Rodney Elliott, William Martin, Rita Mercier, and James Milinazzo – the new Councilors will have to come to grasps with the economic reality and do their best to keep the financial house order in the face declining state revenues that could very likely result in further local aid reductions.

We will also need to do what we can to grow the commercial base in the City by making it more attractive for businesses to move to Lowell or to expand in Lowell. This will lead to Economic Development will create or bring more skilled jobs to

We also need to support the City Manager in the reorganization of the City's Inspectional Services. This is an area that was already understaffed due to budget cuts when it was further ravaged by scandal that resulted in the firing of the Plumbing and Gas Fitting Inspector.

The new Council will begin its work when it is sworn in at 10am on the first Monday in January. Before the City Council can get to work on the goals and initiatives that each Councilor may bring to the table, it must first select a Mayor.

In Lowell's Plan E form of government the role of the Mayor, other than chairing the Council and School Committee, is largely ceremonial. The Council votes for one of their number to be Mayor. The role typically goes the Councilor who has served the longest, but has not vet served as Mayor. However, any Councilor that can gather the minimum of 5 votes can be the Mayor for the next two years.

The jockeying for position begins soon after the election. Rodney Elliot, the Councilor who has served the longest without having been Mayor, has already removed his name from consideration. The next likely candidate would be James Milinazzo if he chooses to seek the posi-

While selecting the longest serving Councilor who has not been Mayor is typical when that Councilor is among the "majority" on the Council, others have been selected when that is not the case. History has taught us that nothing in the Mayor's race is for certain until the votes are cast on Inauguration Day. Stay tuned and we will see if the outcome is expected or unexpected.

Chelmsford resident receives overdue Purple Heart on Veterans Day

On Veterans Day, Congressman Niki Tsongas presented Sergeant Stephen J. Kinney, a retired member of the Army National Guard and a North Chelmsford resident, with the Purple Heart he earned for his sacrifice and bravery as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Sergeant Kinney was wounded in an IED explosion on November 14, 2004 while conducting a combat patrol in the area between Balad and Mushadiyah, Iraq.

Sergeant Kinney did not immediately seek proper medical care because others were more seriously wounded.

In fact, Sergeant Kinney continued to serve on cordon and search missions in

While the military eventually concluded

that Sergeant Kinney was disabled by the injuries suffered on November 14, 2004 and would be unable to continue his military service as a result, they were slow to issue him a Purple Heart.

Sergeant Kinney contacted Congresswoman Tsongas' office in July to request her assistance in receiving the Purple Heart he deserved.

Following inquiries by Tsongas' staff, in August, the Army awarded Sergeant Kinney the Purple Heart for wounds received in hostile action in the course of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Congresswoman Tsongas presented Stephen Kinney with his Purple Heart at a ceremony in North Chelmsford last



METHUEN - New Charter Commission - Methuen voters have established a charter commission and elected nine members to study and make recommendations on changing the way the city government operates. Ironically, many of those who were pushing for the commission were/are also advocating a maximum of one term for any official for life. What makes this ironic is that those who most strongly advocate life time term limits are current and former elected officials themselves who run year after year instead of practicing what they preach and term limiting themselves. I did not support the Methuen charter commission and I do not support term limits of any kind at the local level. The reason the same people run and get elected over and over in Methuen is because so few citizens participate in local government as it is. Putting more term limit restrictions on who can serve in local office will only further deplete that pool of interested activists. The Valley Patriot covers 23 cities and towns and of all the communities we cover, Methuen has the most solid structure of local governance. Sure, there are things that can be improved in any city charter and I encourage the new commission to look at every possible change and consider every idea (including NOT changing the charter). My fear, however, is that tinkering with a charter in Methuen will result in the same mess Lawrence is in from their charter change in 1983.

STATE/METHUEN – COAKLEY'S DOMINO EFFECT – The Valley Patriot has learned that if Massachusetts Attorney General Martha Coakley wins the special election to fill Ted Kennedy's US Senate Seat, Methuen State Senator Steve Bad-

dour is already gearing up a run to replace her as the state's Attorney General. Insiders at the state house and in Boston are predicting an easy Baddour win, which will leave his State Senate Seat open. Now, sources in the Manzi camp are saying the lame duck mayor (who is term limited out after this term) will be running for Baddours seat if that happens.



of replicas of existing Web pages to try to deceive you into entering personal, financial or password data. Criminals use email to link consumers to phony Web sites that ask users to "confirm" their account information by entering it into an official-looking online form. Suspects often use scare tactics, such as threats to close accounts, to get consumers to respond. Go directly to a company's website instead of using the link provided in the email.

Spyware: Spyware is a type of program that watches what users do and forwards information to someone else. It is most often installed when you download free software on the Internet. Unfortunately hackers discovered this to be an effective means of sending sensitive information over the Internet. And, they discovered that many free applications that use spyware for marketing purposes could be found on your computer, and attackers often use this existing spyware for their malicious means.

Once they have their hands on your information, identity thieves can commit everything from check and credit card fraud, to financial identity theft, criminal identity theft and identity fraud. They can

rent an apartment, obtain a credit card, or establish an account in your name and you might not even find out about the theft until you review your credit report or a credit card statement and notice charges you didn't make; or until you're contacted by a debt collector.

There are some important steps you can take to help protect yourself:

- Shred credit card statements, solicitations and other documents that contain private financial information.
- Safeguard your Social Security number. Never carry your card with you, or any other card that may have your number, like a health insurance card. Also don't put your Social Security number on your checks. Your Social Security number is the primary target for identity thieves because it gives them access to your credit report and bank accounts.
- Cultivate a relationship with a community financial institution, so they can help you should you become a victim of identity theft. Take advantage of online banking services which give you quick access to your accounts, making it easier to spot any fraudulent activity.

- Never provide your financial account information, password, or Social Security over the phone, or in response to an unsolicited Internet request, if you did not initiate the contact yourself.
- Review credit card and financial statements carefully to make sure you recognize the merchants, locations or purchases listed before paying the bill.
- Don't leave a paper trail; take ATM, credit card or gas station receipts with you and never just toss them in the trash.
- Be suspicious of emails asking for personal information and be selective when providing your email address. Never click on links provided in an email you think is fraudulent

If you know, or even think, you've been a victim of identity theft, it's imperative you take immediate action:

- Report the fraudulent activity to your bank, your credit card companies and any other financial institutions you work with.
- Contact the three consumer reporting companies, Equifax, Experian or TransUnion and have a fraud alert placed on your credit report. This will help stop thieves from opening any additional ac-

counts in your name.

- Close any accounts that you know, or even think may have been tampered with or opened fraudulently.
- File a complaint with the FTC. This will help law enforcement officials track down identity thieves and stop them.
- Contact the local police or police in the community where the identity theft took place and file a report.

While a fortunate few can resolve their problems quickly, many identity theft victims spend hundreds of dollars and countless days repairing the damage to their name and credit record. Consumers victimized by identity theft can lose out on job opportunities, or be denied loans for education, housing or cars because of negative information on their credit reports.

Equipped with the knowledge of how to protect yourself and take action, you can make identity thieves' jobs much more difficult. You can also help fight identity theft by educating your friends, family, and members of your community.



NBC, Thursdays at 8:00pm
Why, when something seems so right,
can it go so wrong? I had such high
hopes for NBC's "Community" starring Joel McHale from E! Television's,
"The Soup." Joel's snarky ways and dry
sense of humor on "The Soup," are not
only hilarious but spot-on as he ridicules
countless programs not worthy of air time.
I now wonder how he would rate his own
sitcom in light of its lame premise and
lackluster cast.

"Community" follows a group of misfit community college students who, for one random reason or another, have landed at the fictional Greendale Community College. A study group is formed and from there, the members band together to battle the daily grind of their social and educational responsibilities. The group comes together just about as well as oil and water with no cohesive link whatsoever. The likelihood of any of these characters befriending one another in such a setting is as likely as this show making it for another season.

To add to McHale's comedic celebrity, the show also features Chevy Chase who seems only to bring an odd, past-your-prime, sense of humor that's neither funny nor clever. The remaining cast of students are generally new to the scene and don't bring any more wit to the plot than the more seasoned actors. The ramblings, fumbles and nonsensical banter of not only the students, but also the bizarre faculty, could easily be considered insulting to any respectable community college out there.

Sitting through an entire episode of "Community" was akin to being a mem-

ber of the Peanuts gang listening to the, heard never seen, mufflings of the Peanut parents. Certainly the writers are to blame for the fragmented and forced script which includes innumerable politically incorrect comments that are intended to come off edgy but rather end up sounding foolish and insensitive. However the actors, too, must take responsibility for their amateurish interpretation.

The biggest problem with this show is that it is simply not funny. They seem to be trying to use a lot of cheeky humor that is poorly delivered and even more so poorly received. It's as if they are dishing lines that are part of an inside joke that "you had to be there" to appreciate. I am such a fan of Joel McHale that it pains me to say that I find his latest endeavor to be just plain boring. I often think that a new show has the right to go through several weeks of growing pains before it gets a good groove going.

I am not prepared to write "Community" off completely but, to date I don't see a lot of potential. I would love to see more of Joel, but I am afraid he is going to need to find a new prime-time outlet or better yet, stick with "The Soup" and stand-up. Why mess with a formula that works so well.



Irish celebrity

Jack Doyle, County Sligo

Ballymote, County Sligo has produced a variety of famous celebrities. I have mentioned a few in previous editions of the Valley Patriot, but I have neglected to look into the life of the man that was the founder of Celtic Football. Oddly enough, he was a Marist Brother, yes, the same

family of Brother's that teach at Central Catholic High School in Lawrence, MA.

Brother Walfrid, (Edward Kerins), was born in Ballymote, County Sligo, Ireland in the year of May 15th 1840. Walfrid was born of John Kerins and Elizabeth Flynn. He studied teaching and in 1964 he joined the Marist Brothers. In 1870 he moved to

Scotland and taught at St. Mary's where he was appointment headmaster in 1874. He was also one of the founders of St. Joseph's college in Dumfires.

In 1888 he founded the Celtic Football Club as a means of raising funds for the poor and deprived in the east end of Glasgow. He continued his fascination with Celtic football after he was sent by his Religious Order to London's East End, where he organized football matches for "barefoot children of Bethnal and Bow." The charity of Brother Walfrid was named "The poor Children's dinner table."

The following letter explains the sentiment of the Marist Brothers as written to the "Irish in Britain" website in 2006, following the dedication of a statue of Brother Walfrid: "Dear Friend, Walfrid took this name when he became a Marist Brother. He was not a priest. His idea was to raise money to feed the poor in the East End of Glasgow. He did not try to start a little Ireland.

He preferred Celtic with a K. Scots, Irish, Welsh and Cornishmen are all Kelts. He did not want a sectarian team to oppose Rangers. Those who took over the Club, made money from it, neither Walfrid nor the Marist Brothers did. Glasgow Celtic offered money to bring players from other clubs. They wanted to

It is fitting that the finely sculptured image of him outside Celtic Park was paid for by the supporters, not by the owners. In the end the Archbishop of Glasgow was invited to give it God's blessing. The idea of inviting all the Marist Brothers in Glasgow did not occur to the club, which is not a charity like the Marist Brothers

> world wide Congregation is.

Brother Walfrid was also responsible for guiding a dozen or more young men to the Marist Brothers, to help the education of the poor and needy, not always the same thing. The founder of the Marist Brothers did not want his young men to be teachers only,

or even Catechists,

only. Other teachers and priests could do that. He wanted his Brothers to accompany their pupils, at a time where there was little if any education in the country areas round St. Etienne, not far from where he started with two young men and taught them to read and write, living with them and doing manual work with them. From these seemingly hopeless beginnings, the Petits Freres de Marie have gone to more than 80 countries.

Saint Marcellin Champagnat, who was a Marist priest, saw the need for Brothers, and in April 1999 Pope John Paul11, proclaimed him publicly in St. Peter' Square Rome, as a man to be, not just honored, but imitated. He was a priest who was not afraid to get his hands dirty. After all, he was the son of a farmer in a small hamlet, called Rosey, near St Chamond, a few miles from Lyons. It is in this spirit we remember Walfrid, our Marist Brother from Ireland."

Politically active in the City of Methuen

Methuen voters spoke up at the polls on Nov. 3. Well, the 29.91 percent of city voters that came out.

According to re-elected Central District Councilor Phil Lahey, the candidates heard the voters' message loud and clear. Incumbents are just as vulnerable in Methuen as they are nationwide.

Lahey himself felt a challenger nipping at his heals, with "know-nothing" candidate David Lavallee picking up 793 votes for third place behind Lahey's 1,082.

"Our opponents both pulled a pretty darn good vote," said Lahey during his post-election interview on Methuen Community Television. Lahey's vote total was second to fellow incumbent John "Jack" Cronin's 1,129, while Fadi Chahine pulled up the rear with 587 votes. "I think really what it says is we have a lot of people in Methuen that are not happy. I think it sends a message not only to me and Jack but I think to all the incumbents, including the mayor, who didn't exactly run away with it

"People are a little upset with the incumbents and I think it's up to us to show them that we can do, maybe, a better job."

Lahey was right on the money with his take on the situation, as Mayor Bill Manzi found out after facing his toughest opponent in three election cycles.

Manzi beat challenger Al DiNuccio 4,437 votes to 3,954 – a difference of 483. That 53-47 percentage victory was much tighter than his 70-30 win over Ellen Bahan in 2005 and 66-34 split against Kathleen Corey Rahme in 2007.

Playing the confident role throughout the campaign, Manzi shed his cover postelection, admitting that he knew it would be a tough fight all along.

"It's a year where incumbent mayors throughout the country had difficult political times," said Manzi at MCTV. "... Honestly, I'm delighted with the margin - a six-point win and we're eager to get back to work."

Getting back to work means dealing with a revamped City Council. While

six incumbents found a way to hold onto their seats, three challengers - including two former council members and a West end newcomer – are now being fitted for chairs in The Great Hall at the Searles Building.

With Ken Willette term-limited out from his At-Large Council seat (he topped the school committee portion of the ballot) Joyce Campagnone and Corey Rahme duked it out for the final spot behind winner Steve Zanni (4,695 votes) and runner-up Jennifer Kannan (4,592). As numbers were called out at city hall and the outcome was becoming clearer, many in attendance seemed shocked that Campagnone beat out Corey Rahme for the third At-Large seat, 4,193-3,824.

Also taking out an incumbent on election day were Pat Uliano in the East and Hajjar in the West.

Uliano's victory came at the conclusion of a bitter campaign against incumbent Joe Leone, who many say owes Uliano for his successful runs the last two election cycles. The two butted heads on the campaign trail this time around, and Uliano's supporters won out 1,513-1,410 for the second spot behind Larry Giordano's 1 573

Campagnone and Uliano weren't alone in their surprising wins.

Hajjar came out of nowhere to unseat current council chairperson Debbie Quinn in the West. Jeanne Pappalardo topped the ticket again with 1,714 votes, while Hajjar eked out a 112-vote victory over Quinn (1,306-1,194) for the runner-up spot, followed by Ed Guy in fourth (1,139).

"I think it was that (the voters) are looking for somebody new and then somebody who had a message of hey 'it's time to run this like a business'," Hajjar said at the MCTV studio. "I think that message resonated with people, and I also think it was a good time in that I had a lot of people say that they wanted change."

HEATED CAMPAIGNS

While change was wanted, it didn't mean the voters wanted everything they were offered.

Two of the four city council races, as well as the mayoral race were volatile –

Leone-Uliano in the East, Lahey-Cronin-Chahine-Lavallee in the Central and Manzi-DiNuccio fighting for the corner office

While the East and mayoral races were obviously heated, the mud slinging in the Central got the most exposure. From posts on the Politically Active Facebook page to a radio debate on Tom Duggan's "Paying Attention!" program on WCAP 980-AM, Chahine, Lahey and Cronin were at each other's throats over the last month of the campaign, with Chahine going for the jugular in a last-ditch effort to unseat the incumbents.

It appears that Chahine's tactics failed him miserably in the final tally.

"I wasn't real pleased with the campaign this year," said Lahey during his TV interview. "I thought it got a little bit negative. I thought it got a little bit personal. I'm glad it turned out the way it did.

"This is probably about the fourth or fifth election I've been in and the first I didn't enjoy."

SCHOOLING THE FIELD

Term-limited out of his city council seat, Willette opted to run for school committee. Nervous of the outcome heading into election day, Willette had nothing to

fear. He topped the ticket, garnering 4,119 votes.

Following Willette for the other five spots on the committee were Barbara Grondine (3,939), Robert Vogler (3,913), Gary Marcoux (3,766), Evan Chaisson (3,763) and Ken Henrick (3,487).

CHARTER ME THIS

The residents of Methuen voted 4,351-2,458 in favor of reviewing the City Charter. The nine members, who were elected out of a field of 32 candidates, to make up the Charter Commission are Dennis Dizoglio. Joe Pappalardo, Uliano, Vogler,

Maureen Donovan, Ken Bourassa, Cronin, Dorothy Kalil, Barbara Grondine.

PUPPY LOVE! with Kate Whitney

Remember: routines and habits are good for your dog

Well let's see...by the time this article goes to print we will have had our first snow, some great Patriots games, and lots of rain and wind knocking the beautiful leaves from the trees. The days have grown shorter and colder. I'm fortunate to have the ability to bring Dash and Honey to work, but they certainly know how to make me jealous when they are all curled up, deep in a cozy nap, while the rest of us are busy at work. They love their nice comfy bed in my warm office, with some nice background music, what a life. With that said, I want to talk about two things I absolutely love: dogs and sleeping! Sleep is something that most of us probably don't get enough of; maybe this article will give you and your pup a better chance at getting some.

I don't know about you, but my dogs sleep in my bed. I have a queen size bed, but by the time Dash and Honey are done sprawling out, there is not much space remaining for me. Not to mention that my legs are all twisted around dog bodies. I don't mind though...as long as my babies are happy, so am I. The best experience I've had with dogs in the bed was when I had my most recent foster puppy, Callie. She was a little lab mix, about 12 weeks

old and loved to cuddle. She would curl up by my neck or burrow under the covers and just poke her little nose out. A bed with three dogs in it is quite crowded, but sooo worth it! If you do let your dog sleep with you, make sure that it's on your terms. Always invite your dog up and make sure he knows you are the pack leader. I know that having pets in the bed can get pretty messy, especially with all the rain we have been having, so here's a tip: put a large sheet over the comforter so that dog hairs, paw prints, and dirt collect on that. It's much easier to throw a sheet in the wash than a huge comforter!

For those of you who prefer to have your dog sleep in a crate, that's perfectly fine too. Dogs are den animals and most of them enjoy having their own space to curl up in as long as it's done properly. Make sure that the crate is a happy, soothing, safe place for them. Never use the crate as a "time out" spot. If you do, the dog will associate the crate as someplace where she goes when she is bad and it will get confusing. If you have a wire crate, I suggest covering the back, and two sides with a dark sheet. Leave the front door open and free of a cover. By covering the three sides, it will provide less of a cage and more of a den feel for your dog. Also, make sure you put lots of comfy sheets,

blankets, beds, etc. in the crate. I like to put a nice plush bed and also some blankets. I've noticed that dogs love to push the blankets around and "decorate" how they wish. Why not give them the ability to do so?

Let's talk about beds. Dogs are all very different; and so is their preference for what types of beds they prefer. One thing is certain: price doesn't matter to your dog. You could get your dog an extravagant Gucci dog bed, but that would mean as much to her as a simple bed from the dollar store. The best thing you can do is get a couple of different beds and let her decide which is her favorite, play a little "Goldie Locks" routine. I've done this with my dogs and it helps. I put their favorite bed in the spot where they would lay the most and the other beds they didn't like so much, I scatter around the house just in case they want to lie down somewhere and not be on hard wood floors. I would also recommend putting a sheet around your dog's bed. This way you can easily take it off and wash it. The linens vou use should be washed at least once a week. Do the look, touch, and smell test. If you wouldn't want to lie down on your dog's bed what makes you think your dog does? Also, make sure the size is appropriate for your dog. Don't get a skimpy bed if you have a larger dog. When your dog is stretched out, her extremities should still be supported.

I prefer the beds that have a zipper so the cover can also be taken off and washed. And get the beds that are supportive and well padded. Stay away from the rinky-dink lumpy ones. Use your head and provide sleeping arrangements that you would like to have. Some dogs might prefer to sleep on the floor, but at least give them the option of a nice comfy bed.

Have you ever noticed your dog having a dream? I have and it really is funny to watch. Sometimes I find myself laughing out loud....I'd give anything to know what they are dreaming about! Some signs your dog is dreaming: whining, legs moving, nose twitching. Next time you notice your dog having a dream, enjoy the moment and know that your dog is deep in sleep.

If your dog is restless and unable to settle down, try taking her outside again; she might have to potty even if she was just out a few minutes ago. Also, if you have a fireplace, please make sure the dog's bed is far enough away from the fireplace to prevent any accidents or to produce too much heat, thus making your dog uncomfortable. Do not put the bed near a window or door. Drafts can cause your dog to be uncomfortable.

I hope these tips allow for some sound sleeping...for both you and your furry friend!

Court to uphold "human sacrifice channel"?

Members of the United States Supreme Court had no shortage of hypotheticals on hand earlier this month as they wrangled with the First Amendment and the question of whether its free speech protections extend to images of animal cruelty.

Justice Samuel Alito mused aloud, "Suppose (human sacrifice) is legally taking place someplace in the world. I mean, people here would probably love to see it. Live, pay-per-view, you know, on the Human Sacrifice Channel. They have a point of view they want to express. That's OK?"

Citing the evils of Adolf Hitler, Justice Antonin Scalia asked, "Can you keep him off the screen?" Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg brought the status of "snuff films" to the table.

The case currently before the Court questions the constitutionality of a decades-old statute passed by Congress in an effort to eradicate the market for "crush" videos and videos depicting illegal dogfighting. Crush videos star faceless women in high heels stomping on small animals for prurient appeal.

But the law is broad, extending beyond fetish videos to outlaw any audio or visual recording "in which a living animal is intentionally maimed, mutilated, tortured, wounded or killed," if the act violates the law in the place where the recording was made, sold or possessed. The statute's text makes exceptions for works of "serious religious, political, scientific, educational, journalistic, historical or artistic value." But those terms are subjective, leaving the door open for the prohibition of unintended works, such as political videos used by animal rights groups in the fight against animal cruelty or, say, gladiator films.

In 2004, Robert Stevens of Pittsville, Va., was charged with selling videos depicting animal cruelty, a violation of interstate commerce laws.

He was sentenced to 37 months in prison and immediately appealed. The appellate court overturned his conviction on the grounds that "research and empirical evidence in the record before us simply does not support the notion that banning depictions of animal cruelty is a necessary or even particularly effective means of pros-

ecuting underlying acts of animal cruelty."

Judging by statements thus far from the justices, it doesn't sound as though the high court is about to reinstate a poorly written law that does little to serve its purpose. If so, Stevens will return to his "Dogs of Velvet and Steel" business, unrepentant and unpunished.

But at the core of this case lies the fact that Congress, in writing this law, didn't do enough. They failed to target the inhumane acts and those who engage in them, instead focusing on the sale of depictions of such acts. Stevens received a harsher sentence for selling dogfighting videos than did Michael Vick for funding and participating in an illegal dogfighting business, for viciously killing dogs.

Why not write a law that works to criminalize this depravity and severely punish the Vicks who bankroll and popularize it, thereby making these videos possible?

Might happen.

Justice Stephen Breyer, in addressing the

ambiguity of the statute's exceptions, asked, "Why not do a simpler thing? Rather than let the public guess as to what these words mean, ask Congress to write a statute that actually aims at those frightful things that it was trying to prohibit."

Good idea. Woof!

"GoToMyPC" trumps "Go to Saloon" if H1N1 Breaks Out in Merrimack Valley

The other night while I was listening to the news, I heard that Clorox Company's stock price was approaching its ten year high. It turns out that the reason for the high is a worldwide fear of the H1N1 virus. More than ever, people are purchasing bleach and disinfecting wipes to help combat this illness.

It's no wonder that Clorox profits are going through the roof.

The irony of the situation is that I heard this while I was swabbing down light switches, door knobs, and anything else I could think of that could become a breeding ground for this virus in my own home. If Clorox made beach towel sized wipes, I'd have cleaned myself and my family.

As we all wait to see how this virus plays out, and wait even longer for the H1N1 vaccine to become available, it's a good time to reflect and thank our lucky stars that most of us were not living in the Merrimack Valley ninety one years ago. My father was only 6 years old, and living on Cross Street in Lawrence, during the year the world experienced the deadliest pandemic ever.

The Great Influenza Pandemic of 1918, also known as the "Spanish Flu", lasted from March 1918 to June 1920. Some estimates I have seen peg the infection rate between one fifth and one half of the

world's population. Worldwide mortality estimates range from a low of 20 million deaths to upwards of 100 million, making the Spanish Flu the largest pandemic in history.

Nearly 700,000 Americans died during this pandemic. More people died in a single year of the Spanish Flu than in four years of the "Black Death" Bubonic Plague from 1347 to 1351.

Closer to home, the outbreak had devastating effects on the citizens of Lawrence. Ted Tripp, a North Andover resident, has researched the flu. He found that despite measures taken by the Lawrence Board of Health, Lawrence was hit much harder than other towns because of its crowded conditions. At the time, Lawrence was estimated to have nearly 10,000 people per square mile.

When you consider the land that the mills, the Merrimack River, and even the cemeteries, occupy, that figure was understated. This intensely crowded population made Lawrence a perfect area for the pandemic to spread.

On September 26, 1918, the Lawrence Board of Health closed all public and private schools and theaters in an effort to stop the spread of the virus. The Board was unwilling however, to close the city's "saloons," allowing people to still mingle in public.

The Lawrence History Center documented that the outbreak resulted in the

largest number of deaths in the history of Lawrence. Over 2,000 Lawrencians died in 1918 (compared to 1,391 in 1917 and 1,280 in 1919). To combat this mysterious and deadly epidemic, the city took dramatic steps. In addition to closing schools and theaters, a Tent City was established to quarantine those suffering from influenza. As the adults of Lawrence battled this illness, Lawrence children probably skipped rope to this old rhyme:

I had a little bird, Its name was Enza. I opened the window, And in-flu-enza.

As we take great steps to disinfect our lives in preparation for the H1N1 virus, let's remember that Americans, and Lawrencians, have experienced pandemics before. H1N1 will have to be extraordinarily severe to do the damage to Merrimack Valley residents that the Spanish Flue did ninety one years ago. If the pandemic does take a turn for the worse, schools will close, theaters will shut down, and yes, maybe even "saloons" will close this time.

RAISE 'EM RIGHTTM

"Raising a Reader"

My four year old son is showing an interest in learning how to read. What are some simple steps I can take to help him along?

Read, read, read. Read to him constantly and model reading by having newspapers, magazines, and books in your home. Visit the preschool section of your library and let him check out ten books each week that he has chosen. (If your library allows, have him sign up for his own library card and use it.)

Set aside time daily for reading aloud. Reading to him as part of the bedtime routine is a great idea. Not only because it becomes a habit, but since it will help calm him down before he goes to sleep.

When reading aloud to him, let him turn the pages. At times let your fingers follow under the words so he sees that your eyes are going from left to right on the page.

You needn't do this excessively; a few pages here and there will make the point. This will also help your son keep his eyes focused on words you are reading and connects the written word to the spoken word in your child's mind.

Studies have shown repeatedly that

what makes children into readers is being read to- so read, read, read.

Recently, I started working as an assistant in an infant/toddler child care center after school. This is my first real job (I'm 16) and I love it, the babies are so much fun! I want to do my best, but I feel like I have no clue about what babies are supposed to be able to do. I mean stuff like sit up, roll over, that kind of thing.

I constantly repeat myself when talking to my five year old. This even occurs when giving him simple directions, such as telling him it's time to put on his jacket. What's the best way to get and keep his attention for simple daily tasks?

First, make it a habit to refer to him by name at the start. For example, instead of saying, "Put on your jacket" always begin with "Jason" and then state the behavior you expect. Secondly, break the tendency to call to him from a distance, such as from across the room.

Stay At Home Dads

At Home Dads and Marriage: When the Rush Hour Starts At Home

"My wife came home shortly before 7 p.m. dragging in a cold after another stressful day of which there have been many lately," says at-home dad Roland LaScala of Wooster, OH. "The kids

were just finishing eating because I stalled dinner to wait for my wife and then gave up and fed them, another common occurrence. She needed to crawl into bed, but instead sat on the couch in the family room like a zombie, and the kids were all over her screaming. I got protective of her and yelled at the kids and then felt guilty that I yelled at them." One major threat to any at-home dad's marriage happens around dinnertime. Just when you

need to unwind from your day, your wife is also ready to relax. When you both have a long day and you meet at the door without a game plan, the results are often disastrous.

At-home dad Josh Collins of VA, who works four evenings a week as a part-time tech support rep, also gets his evening routine thrown off if his wife arrives home late. "I get a little irritated if Judy gets home after 4:30, because I usually need help occupying (or supervising) Caitlin (4) and Kevin (3 months) while dinner is prepared. If Judy is home late, dinner can be late, which makes getting to work more stressful. However, if Judy is home early, I get an unexpected break that helps me unwind before having to dash out."

These two dads needed a plan. If you have more than one child, this might mean splitting them up between the two of you. Roland LaScala found that this strategy worked for his family. "On normal days, my wife is walking through the door and I am trying to get dinner on the table. Generally she will have one of the kids come with her into the bedroom while she gets changed and I will have the other help me set the table. That's her way of relieving me at the worst time of the day."

When your wife gets home, don't hand the kids off to the wives the minute they get home. This way your wife gets a breather. Karl Ochsner of Scottsdale, AZ, notes of an at-home dad friend who passes his children the minute his wife comes through the door. "This is very unfair to both parties. The kids are not a ping-pong

ball. My wife's work day takes a toll on her too. In our household my daughter is in the stage where she wants me to do everything, take her potty, dress, etc, where it plays a toll on giving me any freedom."

In talking with at-home dads the last 10 years, I have found that it takes several months to a year to get used to the role reversal when you become an at-home dad. To speed up this transition, it is crucial to communicate with each

other on how you will share the responsibilities. By dividing the hours after she gets home between the two of you, you each get some alone time at least a few evenings a week.

The more you set ground rules beforehand, the easier it will be for the two of you and for your children. Peter & Caroline Steinberg of Virginia came up with a unique but effective way to make their first year easier. Before Peter left his job as a social worker, he and his wife simply drew up a contract of what they expected of each other. The contract included discipline, laundry, bedtime and even doctors appointments. Caroline notes, "When we sat down and drew up the contract it forced us to think of how we value the household chores and duties. We ended up talking it all out that night and it worked great." Peter agrees, "It didn't turn into an argument...it made us think of the things I do anyways, That's the social worker in

No paperwork is recorded so your personal information remains yours. These treatments can help with stress, anxiety, or sleep disorders. The DAV's National Communications Department's DAV News Service just released information regarding a new way to access VA suicide prevention assistance. The VA and Lifeline have joined together to offer online chats for veterans who are in need of emotional support.

This online anonymous chat with a VA trained counselor is available every day from 4:00 PM until 7:30 AM (EST). In

addition to use by veterans, this service is also available to family and friends of veterans. This website is: www.suicidepreventionlifeline.org/veterans.

If the distress the individual is feeling is urgent the counselor will immediately transfer the individual to a hotline professional that can provide crisis intervention
