



# Getting ready for future challenges

The City Manager has begun to reorganize city government. The first change was to replace the Building Commissioner as the beginning of restoring integrity to the City's Inspectional Services. The Manager appointed Rosemary Cashman (former Tyngsboro Town Administrator) as Interim Building Commissioner while a search is conducted for a new Building Commissioner that should be completed within 3 months.

The City Manager has also appointed Henri Marchand as the Assistant to the City Manager after the City Council restored funding for the position. One of Henri's roles will be to seek out greater efficiencies in City government. In addition to addressing complex constituent issues, he will research CitiStat tools for gathering and analyzing data - again with an eye towards achieving more effective and efficient City government. Henri will begin his new job on February 8th.

As a result of a motion passed by the City Council, the City Manager will be establishing the Neighborhood Improvement Advisory Committee comprised of representatives of all the established neighborhood groups and other stake holders. The committee will meet periodically to discuss the issues that need to be addressed throughout the City, prioritize the issues and bring them to the attention of the City to be addressed. The committee's mission will be to focus on issues that can be addressed with existing City ordinances and resources. The committee

should have its first meeting in February.

With the release of the Governor's budget in the last week of January, the FY2011 budget development process begins. While the Governor's budget projects both Chapter 70 school aid and local aid at 2010 levels, local taxes would still have to be raised to cover the increased utility, health insurance, and compensation costs that occur even without negotiated raises. Indications from the Legislature are that this scenario may be too optimistic. Either way, we have to be ever vigilant with City spending to minimize the burden on our residents who are still feeling the pain of the economic downturn.

With the above support in place and with the exception of the FY2011 budget development, our focus needs to turn to

economic development. We need to work to make Lowell a place that is attractive for businesses to create new jobs or for businesses to relocate to the City. We need to have an attractive environment for any offshoot of University research to incubate and grow in the City.

With the redevelopment of the Hamilton Canal District under way and without detracting from those efforts, we need to look beyond the JAM area - both physically and in time. Just as the old adage implores us not to put all our eggs in one basket, we must not rely on any single path to success. We must explore other paths and in some cases create new paths. We must continue our efforts until a time when there is full employment in the region.

# Congress Struggles to Create Jobs ... Right!

It always amazes me how our Congress seemingly struggles to accomplish something as simple as "creating jobs."

Actually there is no need to create jobs. There are many more jobs than people.

For example, just walk around your house. Are there no jobs to be done?

Or go to Lawrence and see all the jobs needing attention: Litter to be picked up, buildings to be painted, potholes to be filled, food to be prepared, children (and adults) to be educated, cars to be repaired, snow to be shoveled, ....

Go into any business and ask the proprietor if there are any jobs he would like done. The answer would be the same, "Of course! I would like to do more product development, improve efficiency, increase marketing, open new branches, etc."

So why doesn't she hire more employees to perform these tasks?

The answer is very simple: The increase in after-tax profits resulting from adding employees to perform any of these jobs is either negative (net profits will decrease) or is estimated to be so small as to not be worth the associated risk.

The bottom line: If adding an employee (or multiple employees) reduces your expected profits or offers a less favorable risk/reward ratio than other investments (e.g., stocks, bonds, or going to the movies), you would be crazy to offer these new jobs.

You are not crazy and neither are business executives or entrepreneurs.

While not always successful, everyone seeks to maximize his returns while minimizing risks. Expecting business decision makers to do anything else would be the height of idiocy ... a goal only Congress

Let's think about the profit/return/risk calculation that business decision makers need to perform.

If adding an employee is considered, the increase in resulting revenues and the uncertainty or likely variability of that increase (the risk) must be estimated.

Making these estimates is often very difficult, but whether the estimates are the result of careful calculation or arise from mere guesswork, the estimates are made nevertheless.

The next step, calculating the cost of the added employee, is much easier and can usually be performed with much greater precision. It starts with salary and associated business overhead costs (office space, support staff, supplies, necessary travel costs, etc.). These are the objectively necessary, business-related costs associated with the new employee.

If there were no other costs, the profits/ rewards for hiring this extra employee would merely require subtracting these costs from the estimated increase in profits and then evaluating whether those likely profits justify the associated risks.

Unfortunately, here is where the government comes to help. Nearly everything the government does reduces the attractiveness of hiring extra employees.

First, let's acknowledge the positive contributions of government. To the extent that government protects individuals and businesses from acts of force and fraud, protects private property rights and enforces contracts, it creates a business climate that minimizes risks and permits the greatest confidence in business calculations. Such an environment rewards investments and thus encourages job creation.

Clearly protecting us from foreign threats, including threats from rogue terrorist groups, is a necessary element of creating a positive economic climate.

Thus, the costs of an effective police force and courts to determine guilt or innocence and adjudicate contracts are appropriate ... as are the costs associated with deterring our enemies and killing them when they are not deterred.

Everything else government does destroys jobs.

Every dollar taken in taxes reduces the rewards associated with creating additional jobs.

But the damage doesn't stop there. Those tax dollars are used to add regulations that increase business costs (pensions, health insurance, sick days, overtime, family leave, unions, ...) and thus diminish the likely rewards associated with adding new employees.

But the damage doesn't stop there. The ever-present threat that Congress or some regulatory agency will impose additional regulations, results in increased business uncertainty and greater risk, and thus leads to a reduced willingness to invest and create jobs.

But the damage doesn't stop there. Taxes increase the costs incurred by your suppliers and thus increase your costs and decrease your profits ... again, fewer jobs.

But the damage doesn't stop there. These unnecessary taxes reduce the resources your customers have to purchase your products and thus reduce your sales, reduce your production efficiencies, and decrease your profits ... even fewer jobs.

It should be understood that the private sector jobs that do exist today were created (and persist) with these tax burdens and regulatory risks. Therefore, on average, they pass the risk/reward test in the

current environment.

The last job offered by each business just barely passed the reward/risk test. The next job considered by each business, the one not created, just failed that test. Thus, each business can be considered to be operating "on the margin" ... with a reduction or increase in its job count dependent on the slightest increase or decrease in the tax/regulatory burden.

So the recipe for creating new jobs is obvious. All Congress has to do is reduce the burdens outlined above. Every time this is done, businesses will recalculate the reward/risk equation for that next job and then start hiring new employees until the reward risk calculation again dictates that they cease and desist.

That is why President John F. Kennedy proposed that taxes be cut substantially in December 1962. He knew that the economy would expand and jobs would be created. While these tax cuts were not passed until February 1964, after Kennedy was assassinated, they reduced the unemployment rate by over 35% in less than four years.

In 1981 Reagan, with the support of Congress, passed the Economic Recovery Tax Act (ERTA) which reduced marginal tax rates across the board by 25%. The prevailing unemployment rate was reduced by over 50% from a peak of almost 11% early in Reagan's presidency to an average rate of 5.25% in 1989.

The Joint Economic Committee of Congress in 1996 wrote: "High marginal tax rates discourage work effort, saving, and investment, and promote tax avoidance and tax evasion. A reduction in high marginal tax rates would boost long term economic growth, and reduce the attractiveness of tax shelters and other forms of tax avoidance."

Even President Clinton's Council of Economic Advisers in 1994 pronounced "It is undeniable that the sharp reduction in taxes in the early 1980s was a strong impetus to economic growth."

The lesson to be taken away from this is that encouraging job growth is not rocket science. The necessary prescription is both simple and obvious. Our congressmen, while possibly deficient in the brain department, are sufficiently endowed to former this out.

They spend their time convincing us that they feel our pain while tightening our thumb-screws. The truth is that they neither feel our pain nor do they care. All that matters to them is that they maintain their power and their status. Their goal is to maximize tax revenues for their disposal, NOT to improve our standard of living.



# Chaos in Lawrence: \$35M Bailout for Lantigua Team

If Governor Deval Patrick has his way, the City of Lawrence will be able to borrow \$35 Million to pay for their (to date) \$24.5 million deficit. House Bill 4421 will allow Lawrence to borrow the money which would be backed by state taxpayers and have no fiscal control board, no receiver and no oversight. State Representatives David Torissi, (D) North Andover, Barry Finegold (D) Andover and Willie Lantigua (who also serves as mayor) all support the bill.

Lawrence Mayor Willie Lantigua is also the Lawrence State Representative in the legislature and serves on the powerful Ways and Means Committee. He will be able to vote on the very bill that will give him a \$35 million loan to spend as the mayor of Lawrence.

### No Infusion of Capital?

Last month Governor Deval Patrick told the Valley Patriot that the help he and the state would be giving to Lawrence would not be financial but would help Lawrence become more accountable with the millions of dollars Lawrence spends every year.


"I will say that what we are looking at in Lawrence is not an infusion of capital," he told a Valley Patriot reporter. "it's getting at some reforms that make sure that they get on sounder fiscal footing and management so that this sort of thing doesn't happen again."

Governor Patrick is now lobbying heavily for the \$35 million loan for Lawrence at the state taxpayers expense. All the while Lantigua has been using his power as mayor to settle political scores, which will cost the city millions in unemployment compensation, lawsuits and contract labor disputes.

### The Hit List

So far, Lantigua has fired Myles Burke, the city's Inspectional Services Director, tried unsuccessful to fire Planning Director Mike Sweeney, and fired Mary Lou Nichols an office manager at the DPW. He demoted Deputy Chief Mike Driscoll and promoted his campaign manager Sgt. Melix Bonilla to be Deputy Chief.

He also targeted Recreation Director Linda Schiavone but withdrew her name from the council agenda after reaching a secret deal with her to stay on until June and then retire on her own. Lantigua refuses to disclose the terms or the details of that deal. Coincidentally, Burke, Nichols, Sweeney, Driscoll, and Schiavone, all openly supported Lantigua's rival Dave Abdoo in the mayors race last November.

The former Council President refused to set the city's tax rate at his last meeting in 2009, meaning Lawrence has yet to send out property tax bills in 2010. That missing revenue has resulted in millions of dollars in deficit spending since January 1st.

Because Lantigua chose to lay off Mike Sweeney and other city workers he will be paying unemployment to at least a dozen employees as well as those he plans to hire to refill those jobs. According to postings in Lawrence City Hall, Mayor Lantigua has since posted the jobs of employees he has laid off, in violation of state law.

If HB 4211 passes, State Representative Lantigua, who also serves as mayor of Lawrence, will be in charge of spending that \$35 million.

### No Cash Flow

Lawrence has been deficit spending since January because City Council President Patrick Blanchette adjourned the '08-'09 City Council session without setting a tax rate and sending out the property tax bills. As of the date we went to press (February 4th) the tax rate in Lawrence under the new council has still not set a tax rate or sent out property tax bills.

This means the City of Lawrence has no cash flow while continuing to pay for police, fire, dpw services and other city functions.

According to Mayor Willie Lantigua the city's deficit has climbed from \$9.5 Million in early December, to \$17.5 million by the beginning of January, to \$24.5 Million by the end of January. Lantigua says he inherited the budget mess and shouldn't be penalized for prior mismanagement. But Lantigua's new acting Economic Development Director, Patrick Blanchette was chiefly responsible for the city's financial crisis.

Interference/Lack of leadership
In the last two years, the Lawrence City

Council has raided the school building construction account, the cash reserve account and refused to raise fees, permits and fines, contributing to Lawrence's dwindling cash flow.

The city has been hit with massive cuts in state spending in the last two years. At one point Lawrence took a \$10 million cut in state funding. Mayor Sullivan restructured the budget to bare bones with no layoffs in city personnel, but further cuts in state aid, a lagging economy, and a burst in the real estate market have all lead to Lawrence's financial demise.

In addition to all that, Lawrence has not held a stable Budget and Finance Director in the last eight years. This was due to city councilors abusing their authority and threatening city workers with their jobs if they did not comply with political demands.

Former Budget Director John Griffin resigned after a few short months in the budget position, telling The Valley Patriot that it was constant interference and dirty politicking by Council President Patrick Blanchette that lead to him resigning. Griffin said at the time that he was constantly being harassed and bullied by Blanchette and other city councilors to sign off on expenditures or change budget numbers to suit their political agenda.

Former Comptroller Jim Limpiris told the Valley Patriot in May of 2007 that Council President bullied him into making expenditures he felt were "illegal." According to the city charter, the Council President has no authority over the day to day operations of the city and only has the authority to officially act when at the council table.

Limperis says that on several occasions he refused to sign off on city expenditures that he found contained "very suspicious activity" and fell under the category of "excessive spending." According to emails and memos obtained by The Valley Patriot in 2007, Limperis refused to sign off on non-union raises. He also questioned how the city could legally give raises to non-union workers when no money was available in the city budget and while collective bargaining was still in progress with the city's 22 labor unions.

That's when Council President Patrick Blanchette sent an email to Limperis demanding that he not question the expenses, stating:

"Again, the city council voted to appropriate money in the form of a transfer. No other questions should be asked. Let's stop with the games and leave our difference at the door. Unfortunately I think titles are going to some people's heads. Even though signatures are needed - it does not allow for people to be obstruc-

tionists. Also, no need to involve someone from DOR (Department of Revenue) in this city matter. Let's keep our issues in our own house."

Limperis says that during the entire seven months he was comptroller, he routinely experienced harassment and interference from Blanchette to approve expenditures he felt were "illegal" because there was no funding source for Blanchette's appropriations.

# Lantigua's New Economic Development Director?

Former Council President Blanchette has not only mismanaged the finances of the city of Lawrence but has also mismanaged his own personal finances. In early 2009, the IRS put a tax lien on Blanchette for his refusal to pay approximately \$9,000 income taxes over a period of three years. To date, Blanchette has not paid his income taxes.

At the time Blanchette failed to pay his taxes he was making \$70,000 as a conciliator in the industrial accidents Board in Boston, \$17,000 as the city council president, had a free cell phone, blackberry, an out of state travel budget to go on junkets, free health insurance and contributions to his pension.

Blanchette does not own a property, is not married and has no children.

Lawrence Mayor Willie Lantigua has named Blanchette to be his acting Economic Development Director and will be largely responsible for spending the additional \$35 million Deval Patrick is going to let Lawrence borrow with the backing of your state tax dollars.

# Conflicts of interest

Lawrence's new mayor Willie Lantigua appointed Blanchette to a city job in violation of a state law that prohibits elected officials in local municipalities from taking city jobs in the communities they served for at least six months after leaving elected office.

# Mass General Laws Chapter 268A. states:

"This section shall not prohibit an employee of a municipality with a city or town council form of government from holding the elected office of councilor in such municipality, nor in any way prohibit such an employee from performing the duties of or receiving the compensation provided for such office; provided, however, that no such councilor may vote or act on any matter which is within the purview of the agency by which he is employed or over which he has official responsibility; and provided, further, that no councilor shall be eligible for appointment to such additional position while a member of said council or for six months

# Whistle Blower files complaint alleging Ethics Violations by Mayor Lantigua

February 4rth, 2010 State Ethics Commission Mr. Scott Cole 1 Ashburton Place Boston, MA 02108

Dear Mr. Cole:

I am filing a formal complaint against William Lantigua, Mayor of the City of Lawrence and State Representative for the Sixteenth Essex District - City of Lawrence. I firmly believe that Mayor/ State Representative William Lantigua has violated a number of sections of the Massachusetts General Laws (M.G.L.)under chapter 268A Conflict of Interest Law, specifically sections 23 (b)(2) and section 23 (b)(3).

To wit: in March of 2007, State Representative William Lantigua filed an affidavit with the Essex Probate & Family Court regarding a family court matter in which he was the defendant. His ex-wife, the Plaintiff, was seeking a motion for wage assignment of his State Representative's salary and seeking help with their daughter's college expenses.

Signed under the pains and penalties of prejudice, State Representative William Lantigua's affidavit to the court, contends in part,

"I have helped...[my ex-wife] in many ways, including assisting her efforts to get a job with the City of Lawrence Police Department, where she is currently employed."

State Representative Lantigua, of

course, represents the City of Lawrence and has considerable interaction with the Police Department in his role as State Representative and enjoys influence and the perception of influence to direct funding from state sources to the Police Department and the City of Lawrence.

It appears clear that State Representative Lantigua used his position and influence as a State Representative to secure a job in the Lawrence Police Department for his ex-wife. Additionally State Representative Lantigua's actions directly benefitted himself and his personal financial situation. By increasing the income of his ex-wife, State Representative Lantigua eased the burden on his own purse. The better off financially she is, the lower the financial burden on Representative Lantigua to provide financially to his ex-wife and their child.

M.G.L. c. 268A, section 23 (b)(2) states in part, "No current officer or employee of the state...shall knowingly, or with reason to know...use or attempt to use his official position to secure for himself or others unwarranted privileges...which are of substantial value and which are not properly available to similarly situated individuals."

Additionally M.G.L.c. 268A, section 23 (b) (3) states in part, "No current officer or employee of the state...shall knowingly, or with reason to know...act in a manner which would cause a reasonable person, having knowledge of the relevant circumstances, to conclude that any person

can improperly influence or unduly enjoy his favor in the performance of his official duties, or that he is likely to act...as a result of kinship..."

By using his status as State Representative to secure his ex-wife a public job in the same city he represents as a State Representative, William Lantigua knowingly and purposefully acted in a manner to violate M.GL. c. 268A and to further shaken the public's belief in our elected officials and in the lic employment system.

Indeed his attorney in this court matter, Attorney Richard D'Agostino, also at the time an attorney for the City of Lawrence, submitted a pleading contending:

"Defendant Lantigua has helped...[his ex-wife] in many ways, including assisting [her] endeavor to gain employment with the City of Lawrence Police Department, her current employment position. Such help has assisted Mr. Lantigua and [his ex-wife] in providing for...[their] best interests." [Emphasis added]

I trust the State Ethics Commission will investigate this matter and inform me and the good people of the Commonwealth of your findings.

# Baker says Lawrence Bailout must include Receivership

For the last several weeks radio talk show host Michele McPhee from 96.9 FM talk has made it her personal mission to force Willie Lantigua to resign from his State Rep. seat while also serving as the city's mayor. McPhee has also ramped up her efforts to stop House Bill 4421, a \$35 Million bailout with state taxpayers money. "Not one more penny for the city of Lawrence without a receiver and a fiscal oversight board," McPhee told her listening audience.

"This is outrageous," she continued. "As a Rep., Slick Willie Lantigua sits on the House Ways and Means Committee which means he gets to vote on a bill that will give Lawrence \$35 Million and then, this same guy will get to spend that money as the mayor of Lawrence. This has to stop."

Lowell State Rep. Tom Golden (D), appeared on the Paying Attention! Radio Program on 980AM, WCAP and told radio host Tom Duggan that he opposes HB 4421 unless there is someone appointed by the state to oversee the way those funds are used. Shrewsbury State Rep. Karyn Polito (R), called into the show and expressed her outrage that cities and towns across the state are facing monumental cuts in their budgets, laying off teachers, police and firefighters and closing libraries while Lawrence continues to get millions of dollars that they've proven they can't manage. Mayor Lantigua says that Lawrence currently has a \$24.5MIL budget deficit with no end in sight.

Candidate for Governor Charlie Baker appeared on Michele McPhee's program and said he strongly opposes Democrat Governor Deval Patrick's bill to give Lawrence another \$35 Million with no oversight.

Andover republican Jamison Tomasek, who is running against Tucker in the fall says he believes it would be "irresponsible" to spend state taxpayers dollars on a bailout for Lawrence after city officials have mismanaged the billions of dollars they have already received.

# Lantigua Attorney likens firing of city workers with invasion of Normandy, (huh?)

According to the Lawrence city charter, city attorneys work directly for the Lawrence City Council, not the mayor.

When these lawyers are asked to ap-

pear before the council, city councilors expect that, under the law City Attorneys Charlie Boddy, Ann Randazzo and Rick D'Agostino will be giving them legal advice about the legalities of the decisions they are making. Since the inauguration of Willie Lantigua (da chief), however, Lawrence's

"You know, this whole situation has now boiled down to leadership. There is nothing pleasant about these experiences. There is always a personal and emotional side to all of this, but this is the dark side of the leadership. This is the tough

> side of the leadership. This is not about cutting ribbons and taking photo opportunities, this is about making the tough decisions to get the city back on it's feet.

The chief executive wants his own team and he submitted that to you for your support. You have to give him that right.

You know, on June 5, 1944, the night before operation overlord, the supreme allied commander, Dwight Eisenhower, wrote two letters that he held in his pocket, one letter was regarding the failure of the operation on June 6th in the invasion of Normandy. The second letter, was regarding the success of the operation of the invasion of Normandy.

However, those letters spoke of the dark hours that General Eisenhower wrestled with, when he had to make the decision that he knew, either success or failure, would bring casualties. The success or failure of the city of Lawrence and the state breathing down our necks will, also, require casualties and that is where your leadership role, as well as that of the Mayor's, must come forward. Thank you."

# Is it time for a finance control board?

Is it time for Lawrence to have a Finance Control Board? That is the current issue up for debate in our community and at the State House. Just before the clock struck the start of the New Year, Governor Patrick filed legislation that would re-chart Lawrence's journey through its current fiscal mess.

In order to combat what was then calculated to be a \$17 million deficit, the governor's bill, House 4421, not only would allow the city to borrow \$35 million through a bond issue but also would create a fiscal overseer who would work along side the Mayor and the City Council to balance the books by January 31, 2011.

The city would be limited to using \$17.5 million in this current fiscal year that ends June 30, and the other half of the monies in FY2011. If the books are not balanced by that date, and the overseer reports to the state that the city is unable to achieve a balanced budget and fiscal stability, the state would have the option – but not be required – to abolish the overseer and establish in its place a finance control board.

The borrowing is predicated on the bonds getting sold. If no investors want to purchase a bond issue from the city, that has the lowest bond rating in the state, then Lawrence would have to go right to receivership.

At this point in time, many are asking whether the city should skip the overseer process and go right to the creation of the Finance Control Board. "Why should we delay what is inevitable?" they say.

The city has been under critical scrutiny by the state for quite some time. Two years ago this month, the state Department of Revenue issued a scathing report detailing the numerous shortcomings of the Sullivan administration in its fiscal (mis)management. As the city took no action on most of the thirty suggestions in the 2008 report, the city once again faced deficit ruin in mid-2009. And yet again, they city did virtually little to address that problem in time to balance the budget by December 31, 2009, thereby preventing the issuance of tax bills.

Here we sit. Deficit in hand and no way to solve it short of hefty borrowing, departmental restructurings, massive layoffs, union givebacks, and general chaos in the city that could threaten public safety and the protection of our citizens. But to date Mayor Lantigua has yet to submit a plan as to how he will handle the deficit. The Mayor needs to hire the most qualified budget director available, a task that has been neglected to date while extracurricular political vendettas have been pursued. He himself needs to step forward and pitch his vision for how he plans to solve this mess. He cannot rely on his hired guns, the legislative delegation, or the state bureaucrats to pitch the sale.



If Mayor Lantigua fails and a Finance Control Board is needed, the city would not cede total control as would be the case with a receiver. Instead, the board would consist of five members – the mayor, the city council president, and three designees of the state, one of whom would be a Lawrence resident. The state could control the board with its appointees yet the mayor and council would have some input in, but not control of, the management process.

Opponents say that this is a reasonable step to take, especially when all the other surrounding communities, which have balanced their books by making tough choices, are looking at the financial mess and the special treatment Lawrence will be receiving with no carrots or sticks to worry about.

Since the inception of the Lantigua administration four weeks ago, the deficit has reportedly grown to \$24.5 million. The Mayor is asking the public to take a leap of faith to allow this administration a shot to balance the books on their own with the generous infusion of \$35 million. But unless the Mayor has the trust and confidence of the people, it will be doubly difficult for him to succeed here or on Beacon Hill





# 'Together We Tax' – Year in Review

In "Year in Review, Part 1" (January Valley Patriot), I noted how 2009 was riddled with spending and tax plans of ultra-liberal Gov. Deval Patrick, most notably his insane proposal to increase the gas tax by another 19 cents per gallon, and grant drivers licenses to illegal aliens. His motto must be: "Together we tax."

Locally, 2009 brought a package of financial gymnastics from school committee members George Moker, Dave Bjork, Anne Donahue, Anne Blythe, and Eric Zadina who added more than \$222K to the salary base for the school teachers. Anyone notice the economy when handing out taxpayer money?

Yes, despite various changes in contract language, elimination of some stipends/ salaries, reductions in retirement special accounts, etc., whatever, etc., the committee still added more than \$222,270 to the town's salary base cost moving forward. And, according to a document the Valley Patriot received from Director of Finance and Operations, Terry L. Wiggins and Superintendent Carol Jacobs' office, the spenders also agreed to hike that number to \$276,725 next year, and then a whopping \$408,158 salary increase outlay the following year.

Too many numbers? Bottom line: average teacher salary increases are 3.08%, 3.72%, and then 5.29%. Not exactly in step with the spirit of prop 2 ½, as it sets up a "ticking time bomb" (their own words), of doomsday deficits in our future.

I must ask (at least) one more time: is anyone up for just keeping what we have and freezing all taxpayer salaries for a year or two until we can get back on our feet? Now that's a warrant article I would love to see. (But given our history, heck, it would probably fail. Unless there's a secret ballot vote, folks in this town will yes-to-death almost every spending increase rather than subject themselves to the ridicule and scorn from their neigh-

So, while I had desired to continue the year in review (it will have to wait 'til next month) due to an interesting thing that happened on the way to writing this column..

According to an e-mail to the chair of

the Board of Selectman by Deputy Fire Chief Rusty Ricker, president of Central Fire Company, Inc., Central Fire Company has purchased two used ambulances with the hope of giving them to the town.

Deputy Chief Ricker, in his e-mail, spells out that Fire Chief Albert Beardsley "is aware of our efforts." Hmm. An apparent contrast to later statements attributed to the chief, but rising above that pettiness for the moment (who is running the department, Mr. Ricker or Mr. Beardsley, and who knew what, when, and do we really care?), it will be interesting to see the financials of what it costs to own, maintain, equip, certify, insure, and most importantly staff the ambulances.

I love the idea of having multiple ambulances in town. But, if having ambulances in town is such a critical project, why did the Chief apparently have such a big disconnect and apparently contribute to the delays in citing an independent ambulance service (at no cost to the town) at the Erie station on North Street this past year?

As the simple clerk for Erie (the guy who takes the meeting minutes), I have found myself at a loss as to how paperwork for such a seemingly innocuous project as citing an ambulance in town could continually get delayed and 'lost'

Final note for this month: a financial plan has been promised, and it needs to be validated independently by multiple outsiders. (Remember, the big dig was projected at \$3 billion. It cost in excess of \$22 billion and at least one life.) If the town is going to accept such a magnificent gift, let's first decide what this gift will cost us.

Finally, I mistakenly referred to the Special Education Parent's Advisory Council as a political action committee in a prior column. They constitute a wonderful, dedicated, spirited, organization dedicated to protecting and providing for their children, but they are not a political action committee.



### City gains \$65,000 from auction of used equipment

Mayor James J. Fiorentini today announced that as a result of the City's second online auction of used equipment, the City has gained over \$65,000 in revenue. The Mayor indicated that this was several times more than the City would have obtained under the former non-online auction method.

About a year ago, the City instituted the practice, for the first time, of auctioning off property online. The City uses a private company known as "govdeals". The property is posted online and bidders from throughout the country and, indeed, throughout the world, are allowed to bid on surplus equipment. The City has been recognized as an innovator in obtaining maximum value for surplus equipment. The City has been written up in the Wall Street Journal and noted on Boston television stations for use of online auctions to

generate revenue.

The Mayor said that, based upon the results, the City would continue to auction its surplus materials online and the City would continue auctioning materials off by this method.

Mayor Fiorentini said that it was imperative in these times of fiscal crisis that the City continues to be innovative and use every tool available in order to hold

"Online auctions of surplus material are just one way of using every possible innovative method to hold down costs.

"At this time of continued fiscal crisis, we intend to tighten our belts, streamline government and be as innovative as possible so as to balance our books without asking our residential real estate tax payers to pay more."

# Belvedere Road assessments fixed

John McCormack

In last April's Valley Patriot I discussed the "triennial revaluation" of real estate assessments which Boxford had just completed. This revaluation was complicated by state mandates to increase surplus land values and decrease the number of construction quality

Surplus land is lot area in excess of the minimum required. The old value was \$4,500 per acre; the new value was \$10,000 per acre. Most taxpayers were scarcely affected; the median holding is less than a tenth of an acre. My property includes a lot of surplus land and almost nine acres is occupied by a National Grid power corridor and an underground thirty-inch gas pipeline. The area resembles the swath cut through the woods adjacent to Route 213 opposite the Loop shopping area in Methuen. I believe its appearance and possibilities of nuisance trespass and future eminent domain takings make it a detriment; the town now says it is worth \$70,000 or so and I should pay \$800 per year for the ownership privilege.

Construction quality grades determine a factor which multiplies the basic construction cost of your home and is supposed to account for material quality differences and construction difficulty. Fancy homes range up to grade 10, an average home is grade 5. When values dropped in 2007 the factors for grades 5 and below were drastically dropped. grade 6 was lowered slightly and the rest were raised. My house is a grade 6 Modern/Contemporary. The two contemporary homes in grade 6 and one in grade 7 of the five sold in 2007 were downgraded for the revaluation. The result was


the square foot replacement cost for all contemporaries had to increase to match the assessments with the sale prices of those sold

The result of this for me was a perfect storm of land and building assessment increases which raised my tax bill nearly 20% while others of similar value saw 5% decreases. I applied for abatement and received a small de-

crease. I decided to appeal the abatement to the Appellate Tax Board.

The ATB is a state agency which hears appeals on many types of state and local taxes. Appeals are heard as Formal Procedures or Informal Procedures. The Formal Procedure involves discovery, rules of evidence, and lawyers. The next stop after the Formal Procedure is the Massachusetts Appeals Court. The Informal Procedure is relaxed, somewhat like small claims court, has limited appeal rights and generally doesn't involve lawyers. The Formal Procedure is too expensive for most claims so

left. I was the only Boxford appellant. The Chairman of the Board of Assessors explained that any reduction is of little value after three years so most people don't bother.

Another downside to the Informal Procedure is that no explanation is given for the ATB decision. I lost. The letter simply stated "The decision is for the appellee" which was the town.

So what happened? The taxpayer has to prove the assessment is too high; like an NFL booth review, the town's assessment is correct unless conclusive contrary

in the ATB's ambit. The FY 2010 assessments are out now and hint at a "Pyrrhic defeat" where I lost my battle but the war isn't going so badly. Belvedere Road was a prime example in my appeal. Eleven homes, all grade 6 contemporaries, and one sold in 2007 was downgraded to grade 4. The ten unsold had flat assessments even as other similarly valued properties dropped 5%; the sold property's assessment dropped nearly 8%. Reports from Department Heads were submitted on Friday afternoon with details of the meetings with each candidate. All reports were very positive. At 6pm

on Friday, the 29th, the Board of Selectmen held a special meeting and in a 5-0 vote, offered the position of Town Administrator to Michael Gilleberto.

Michael Gilleberto was notified following the meeting and accepted the offer. A contract is being drafted and will be ready in the coming weeks. ### **LAWRENCE - A Fraud on the Public**

When the Lawrence City Council met last month to decide on Mayor Lantigua's firing of three city department heads, they were met by dozens of Lantigua supporters lining up to speak at public participation to help the mayor make his case.

They were also greeted by half a dozen Lantigua supporters holding signs that read "24.5 MILLION DEFICIT" and "Sweeney and Burke must go." A week earlier, Lantigua had fired Planning Director Michael Sweeney, Recreation Director Linda Schiavone and Inspectional Services Director Myles Burke. Under the city charter, the city council must approve the firings by a 2/3 majority.

A quick look at the crowd assembled at the meeting looked as though residents of Lawrence came to city hall with their hand made signs to pressure city councilors to support Lantigua's firings. But a closer look at the individuals holding the signs told a different story. You see, the hand made signs being held by Lantigua supporters were really Martha Coakley signs from her failed senate campaign. Lantigua endorsed Coakley and ran her Lawrence campaign out of his Essex Street headquarters. These were not just average citizens coming to city hall to express their opinions on their own, as the city council and the public at home was lead to believe. They were Lantigua operatives who had been "encouraged" to show up in support of the mayor's actions. During the meeting I overheard Dorothy Incropera from the Mount Vernon Neighborhood Association, asking the sign holders what their sign meant and why they wanted Sweeney and Burke to be fired. "I don't know," one of them told her. "I was just asked to come and hold a sign." For the record, Linda Schiavone, Myles Burke and Mike Sweeney all supported David Abdoo in the last mayoral election. The council voted to fire Burke, not to fire Sweeney and Lantigua himself withdrew the name of Schiavone.

### LAWRENCE - About those signs During the contentious meeting where

Lantigua was trying to get Sweeney and

Burke fired he came to the microphone and announced for the first time ever that Lawrence's deficit was not \$17.5 Million as he had previous told us. Lantigua told the council that he had received a call from the Department of Revenue at 3pm that day saying that the real deficit was \$24.5 million. Over and over he repeated that these were not his numbers "this comes straight from DOR." Here's the kicker, as Lantigua is making this announcement for the very first time (by his own admission)

behind him with signs that said "\$24.5 Million deficit." So here's my question to Willie Lantigua (da chief): if DOR just told you at 3pm that day that the deficit was NOW \$24.5 million, how did all those grassroots residents in the audience know about the new number before the meeting to put it on their signs? As a side note, Lantigua had reached a deal with Linda Schiavone and withdrew her name from the hit list but coincidentally all those random citizens holding signs that night knew about the deal too. "SWEE-NEY AND BURKE MUST GO" was what the signs in the hall read that night. How did they know enough not to put Linda Schiavone's name on their "home made" signs?

LAWRENCE - Lantigua's Campaign Finance Reports - As of the day we went to print the City of Lawrence has still not set a tax rate or sent out the 2010 tax bills which is why the city of Lawrence is deficit spending. Mayor Willie Lantigua can blame former Mayor Mike Sullivan and Planning Director Mike Sweeney for the growing debt but if we use his formula, the deficit was \$9.5 Million when he took

> office. Now it is \$24.5 Million. So, if Mike Sullivan and Mike Sweeney are responsible for the \$9.5 Million deficit, that means Lantigua and his Economic Development Director Pat Blanchette (who, as council president never set a tax rate in December) is responsible for the other \$15 million in deficit spending. After all, if Blanchette and the '08-'09 city council did their jobs and sent out the tax bills by January

first the city would be collecting property taxes and would not be deficit spending at the current rate.

LAWRENCE - Leaking public information? – Sources in city hall say that Lantigua Chief of Staff Lenny Degnan has been bullying employees and threatening retribution against anyone who "leaks" information to the Valley Patriot or anyone else. Degnan and former councilor Pat Blanchette are so paranoid about where the "leaks" are coming from, that they have had several staff meetings to strategize how to track down the whistle blowers. Several of our confidential sources in the Lantigua administration say Degnan and Blanchette have also ordered IT employees to spy on emails and compile a list of every email that has been printed

out or copied to another computer, which is illegal from our understanding of the law. I find it fascinating that public servants who are doing the public's business with

the public's tax money is taking such great pains to conceal public information from the PUBLIC. At least one Internet Technology worker has resigned over the bullying.



# Ask the reverse mortgage guy!

Q- Why is there so much bad publicity surrounding the subject of reverse mortgages? – Billy P, Lawrence MA

A – Prior to 1989, reverse mortgages were not federally regulated and some lenders took advantage of seniors. After the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) created the FHA product known as a Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) these abuses were largely stopped.

Q – I'm curious about those late night TV ads for reverse mortgages. What's that about? - Anne, Salem NH

A – It's about capturing your name, address and phone number so the info can be sold to a call center sales operation that will hound you for the next six months to do a reverse mortgage. In my experience, there is nothing of any value on the CD or video tape received from these sources. Find an experienced reverse mortgage professional locally to educate you to the pros & cons.

Q – How do we find a "preferred" reverse mortgage lender? – John, Lowell MA

A – The term "preferred" is a marketing gimmick used by internet based sales companies that sell your name, address

and phone number to phone bank salespeople. There is no such thing as a "preferred" list. The National Reverse Mortgage Lenders Association (NRMLA – an industry trade association) does publish a list of members (who pay \$1,500 or more per year for membership and a listing on their web site). However, there is nothing "preferred" about them that I can determine. Even HUD is not helpful with their list of FHA lenders because HUD's list fails to show everyone in every market. Your best source is to ask for a referral from your attorney, financial advisor, or a close friend who has completed a reverse mortgage.

Q – Can we get a reverse mortgage through AARP? - Bob, North Andover MA

A – No. Some people mistakenly refer to reverse mortgages as "AARP reverse mortgages" but there is no such product. While it is true that AARP does sell products to seniors (like health and disability insurance), they do not offer nor do they endorse anyone who offers reverse mortgages.

Q – Mom and Dad are applying for a government backed reverse mortgage. Am I responsible for the debt when they pass away? - Mildred, Lawrence MA

A – If they are doing a HECM, there is

no personal liability for the borrower or heirs. The loan must be repaid, however. The heirs may apply for a conventional loan to cover the amount due, sell the home or simply turn it over to the lender.

Q – Aren't all reverse mortgages the same? – William & Sarah, Methuen MA

A- No. Reverse mortgages fall into three different general categories: (1.) single-purpose loans, offered by some state and local government agencies as well as nonprofit organizations, (2.) federally insured loans, also known as HECMs, and (3.) proprietary reverse mortgages, which are private loans backed by institutions or companies that have developed them. HECM loans backed by FHA are the most common and the type we refer to in this column.

Q- Should we have our own real estate lawyer when we do a reverse mortgage? - Gwen, Andover MA

A – If you are doing a government backed HECM reverse mortgage, hiring your own attorney is optional. It is an added expense and loan documents will not be changed in any way. If you are doing a proprietary (non-government) reverse mortgage, hiring your own attorney might be advisable especially if you are doing a "jumbo" loan on a high value property. However, many real estate

attorneys are not widely experienced in reverse mortgages. Make certain you retain a specialist.

Q – How is the amount I receive determined? Could I get more money from a different lender? – James, Andover MA

A - The amount depends on the age of the youngest borrower, the interest rate, the maximum claim amount (lesser of appraised value or \$625,500), the amount of the monthly servicing fee, and the length of time that you will be receiving payments – for a fixed period or for as long as you live in your home. The older you are, the larger your payments are likely to be. There could be a difference among lenders due to fees and costs. You should check several sources.

with the consent of all parties involved. How You Can Fund Your Plan

Once a buy-sell agreement is in place, the next challenge is funding it. Where will remaining partners get the funds to purchase the business interest in question? There are a number of available options:

\* Pay Cash - If sufficient funds are on hand, cash may be used to purchase the business interest in question. However, using savings that were earmarked for future ventures could endanger the long-term goals of the business.

\* Take A Loan - If cash is not readily available, funds could be borrowed. The downside is that the extra expense of loan repayments may put a strain on cash flow and the debt increase may negatively affect the company's credit rating.

A buy-sell agreement funded by insurance may be structured in a number of different ways to suit particular needs.

It's best to consider your options now while you're still in the position to direct your business. Speak with your partners and your family, as well as your legal and tax advisors and your insurance agent. If you're like most business owners, your business and your family are the two most important things in life. You don't want to gamble with the future of either one. A buy-sell agreement funded by insurance is a convenient way to put your business affairs in order while protecting your family's interests. It can give you the peace of mind you need to focus your energies on the continued success of your firm.

# Tolerating Cold Symptoms May Hasten Recovery

No matter how healthy you strive to be in the New Year, you're still likely to succumb to the common cold every now and then. Like it or not, most of us can expect to catch two to four colds annually.

Although more than 200 different coldcausing viruses have been identified to date, the symptoms they cause are remarkably similar. An infection with any one of the pesky microbes can result in fever and body aches, accompanied by roughly a week's worth of sniffling, sneezing and coughing.

If you're determined to keep your suffering to a minimum, you may turn to an over-the-counter cold formula for relief. With dozens of brands and hundreds of different formulas on the market, there are plenty to choose from.

Nonprescription cold remedies typically contain some combination of antihistamines, decongestants, cough suppressants, fever reducers and pain relievers. While many of these concoctions can make you

feel a little more comfortable, it's important to remember than none of them can stop the infection itself.

Over-the-counter drugs don't speed healing or recovery, either — they merely mask the symptoms of infection. Even worse, some of these medications actually hinder the body's ability to rid itself of the cold-causing virus, prolonging the illness in the process.

When the respiratory tract is invaded

by disease-causing microbes, the immune system is activated to defend the body in a number of ways. Most of the troublesome symptoms experienced during a cold are



caused by the defenses of the immune system, rather than the virus itself.

In healthy individuals, these respiratory symptoms are helpful, and perhaps even essential, in overcoming the illness. Trying to suppress the symptoms with medications may be counterproductive, since it disables the immune system and interferes with the body's ability to protect itself from infection.

When cold-causing viruses invade the body and latch onto tissues in the nose, throat and

lungs, they trigger the release of inflammatory compounds that attract white blood cells to the site of infection. As part of the immune system, these cells are programmed to attack, destroy and engulf disease-causing germs.

After the white blood cells have completed their mission, they begin to pile up by the millions in the respiratory tract.

The runny nose that accompanies a cold may be annoying, but it's what removes these spent cells from the sinuses and nasal passages, along with microbes, mucus and other byproducts of infection.

Taking an over-the-counter antihistamine designed to "dry up" nasal secretions can cause these substances to accumulate in the sinuses, increasing the risk of developing a sinus infection.

If you develop a cough, it's a good sign that your body is working hard to keep your lower respiratory tract clear so you can breathe easily. Coughing is a natural, protective reflex that allows you to expel secretions from your lungs.

Taking a medication designed to suppress your cough isn't always a good idea. The resulting buildup of mucous secretions can increase the risk of devel-

# The Big Decision

Making the decision to place someone we love in a long term care home can prove to be a difficult one. We so often hear negative things about nursing homes and so little about the positive. Frequently I am asked by people feeling torn if they are making the right choice.

While I cannot answer that for them, I can offer some advice. If you find yourself constantly worrying about your loved one and it is negatively affecting your well-being, then I say you are moving in the right direction. You need to sit down and write out a list of pros and cons for keeping your loved one home versus placement. Remember to ask yourself questions of a wide variety. Everything from safety to health and emotional wellness should be covered. Do you have a support system in place? If you become ill, who will be able to fill in for you? When it is all written out in front of you, it can help make the choice much clearer.

Once you have concluded that placement is needed, the work can really begin. You will want to start by talking it over with your loved one and explain the reality of the situation to them. This is not always an easy task, as they will come up with all kinds of excuses and try to convince you that they are fine. We must remember this is going to be a very emotional time for them. While they most likely have been slowly losing their independence over time, they will have a hard time actually hearing that they need help. Our current elderly population grew up in an era when nursing homes were more of an institution and the people in them were called patients. They most likely will have memories of visiting their relatives in those settings and think that this will be their fate as well. Resident rights were unheard of back then, and advocacy help was not available. Times have changed, and for the better. Now there are many regulations in place to ensure their well-

The next task is to put together a list of potential homes. Keep in mind that you will first want to check out the homes closest to where you and your loved one live. This will help them continue to feel connected to their community. Convenience of location will help you be able to have more frequent visits. More than likely they will rediscover old friends living there as well. Consider the size of the nursing home as well.

While some residents do just fine in a larger home, many often feel a true sense of belonging in a smaller home. This can also make it easier for them as well as yourself get to know the staff well.

Tour the homes on your list personally. Did the staff greet you with a smile? Look around for cleanliness-- floors, walls, and furniture. Hallways and resident areas should be free of clutter. Residents should be clean, well groomed and dressed appropriately. Watch for facial expressions with the residents as well as staff. This can speak volumes. Does the staff interact

with the residents, or do they just seem to be going about their routine? Does the staff answer call lights in a timely manner?

Often the biggest mistake I see people make is choosing a home with the prettiest décor, carpeting and chandeliers. While it is a nice thing to have, it will not guarantee quality of care. Question what services can be provided such as audiology, dental, vision, rehabilitation as well psychological support.

Check out the activity calendar and see if it offers a wide variety of groups. A well rounded activity program will have low, moderate and high functioning group activities. Often people look for highly visual large groups and forget that a meaningful activity is based on individual needs. It could mean a cup of coffee and reading the paper for some to playing games or large social groups for others. What is important to your loved one? Will their needs be met?

Once you decide on a home make sure you are mentally prepared for the transition. This is when the guilt can consume you if you aren't prepared. Remember that this can be a great act of love, and yet it will be one of the hardest decisions you make.

Your loved one will have many emotions especially when the reality sets in. They will often have a lot of anger over their loss of independence and can try and make you feel guilty for what is happening to them. Do not take it to heart, and remember that change is always hard for us and even harder on the elderly. Be supportive, patient and most of all a good listener for them.

Once they are ready to move in, making their new room feel homelike will help. Placing items of sentimental value to them will often help them feel more at ease. Family pictures, a favorite bedspread and perhaps their favorite chair from home will help. Be sure to bring a decent amount of comfortable clothing and personal items as well. Often the first few weeks will most likely be the hardest emotionally.

Give things a little time, and you will see new friendships start to develop. They will become involved in the life of the home. Get to know the staff well. Often families will tell me how their loved one never had such a big social life. They express how much relief it is to not have to worry constantly and find themselves enjoying visits so much more.

Every Family situation can be a little different. Things have changed in long term care and it can be the right choice for you loved one. If you have any questions regarding long term care, many resources are available. If you have any questions, I would be happy to help you.

oping pneumonia.

Having a fever can make you uncomfortable, but it's an excellent way to rid yourself of infection-causing viruses, which typically thrive at normal body temperature. Even slight elevations in body temperature create an environment that is too warm for these germs to survive, much less reproduce.

You can think of a fever as the body's way of "pasteurizing" the blood, similar to the process used to kill microbes in milk with short bursts of relatively high temperatures. A fever also kicks your immune system into high gear, accelerating the production of germ-killing white blood cells.

A higher body temperature causes your heart to beat faster, speeding the delivery of blood and nutrients to the site of infection and hastening the removal of cellular debris and toxins. Higher body temperatures also speed enzymatic reactions,

whether they're involved in killing germs or repairing injured tissues.

As long as you're healthy, there's no real danger associated with running a low-grade fever, and there's no real need to take a fever-reducing drug. In fact, letting a mild fever run its course may shorten the duration and the severity of your cold by killing more of the viruses responsible for the infection.

Recovering from any illness, including a simple cold, takes time. Over-the-counter cold medicines might make your symptoms a little easier to tolerate, but they won't help your body heal any faster.

# Snow birds going south for the winter leaves cancer patients in need

### Drivers Wanted for cancer patients to get treatments.

(Weston, MA) – Sometimes the biggest challenge in cancer treatment is getting there. Thankfully, the American Cancer Society is here to help with a committed group of individuals who drive patients to nearby treatment centers to get the care they need. But according to the Society, many volunteer drivers have headed south for the cold weather months, leaving many cancer patients without rides to the treatment they need now.

"There is a great need for people to help by picking up cancer patients from their home and transporting them to their nearby treatment centers," said Lynn Basilio, Area Director for Health Initiatives with the Society.

The American Cancer Society is currently seeking volunteers from every town in Eastern and Northeastern Massachusetts to drive cancer patients to their treatment appointments. "If you have a car, and even one hour once a month, you can make a real difference in someone's life by becoming a driver," explains Basilio.

A cancer patient who needs radiation therapy might require between 20 and 30 trips to the clinic within six weeks. A patient receiving chemotherapy might report for treatment weekly for up to a year. Treatment can make a patient feel too sick to drive. In many cases, a patient is driven to hospitals and clinics by relatives or friends, but occasionally they need to seek alternative transportation. That's where Road to Recovery, an American Cancer Society community program, helps.

Volunteer drivers receive simple training and an orientation from the American Cancer Society, and are asked to volunteer for at least one hour, one day, once a month

The Society matches drivers' availability with the needs of patients who call.

"Some volunteers say driving patients is one of the most rewarding jobs you can do," said Basilio. "Sometimes a driver will have the opportunity to bring the same patient several times, get to know them, and be able to offer support. For patients who have no family in the area, volunteer drivers really make a difference."





Cahill prepared a nasal airway for insertion. Within 2 minutes, Ambulance 2 arrived. Ff. EMT Morgese determined that a piece of meat was obstructing the patients airway almost completely. He radioed the ALS Paramedic unit en route describing the nature of the life-threatening obstruction. The ALS Paramedic unti arrived momentarily and they were able to employ specialized equipment to clear the airway, whereupon the patient was intubated and transported to L.G.H. by Ambulance 2. Thanks to their rapid response, assessments and accurate application of appropriate life saving techniques, the patient recovered

consciousness within minutes of arriving at the hospital and the tube was removed. Andover Fire/Rescue is proud to recognize these five professionals.

I am a huge fan of ABC's Wednesday night line-up of "Modern Family" followed by "Cougar Town." Both shows have entered the scene with a funny take on family dynamics in the here and now. My immediate focus is on "Cougar Town" simply because I love Courtney Cox and I have found myself looking forward to the show week after week.

In this mid-week mood booster, Courtney Cox plays Jules, a 40- something divorcee, who is optimistically getting her life back on track post-breakup. She is pleasantly surrounded by a group of friends (sound familiar?) who are her support system, social outlet and comic relief as she re-introduces herself into the scary scene that is dating. Her frantic, yet endearing, persona is over the top yet perfectly offset by the sarcastic and comfortably confident nature of her ensemble cast.

Former host of the Tonight Show Jay Leno premieres his 10:00PM prime-time talk show that was promised to revolutionize television as we know it. If revolutionize meant creating and executing one of the worst television disasters since Cop Rock then, congratulations, you won Mr. Leno and NBC! But, unfortunately Webster doesn't allow definition rewrites too often so we stick with the original meaning which they failed to define with content. The Jay Leno Show was a ratings disaster as Conan O'Brien, left with the job every comedian aspires to obtain from the first day they hit the stage of The Giggle Shack, became the fifth host of Tonight Show since its conception in 1954. I might as well start a little further back so that you can make an educated decision when we conclude.

A Brief History Of The Tonight Show Steve Allen hosts a local show called Tonight on New York's WNBT in June 1953. The show went national in 1954 where Allen did the show live and featured jokes, music and sketches with guest stars. Allen was replaced in the Summer of 1957 by Jack Parr where he turned the emphasis of the show to talk and interviews. Parr hosted Tonight for 5 years. Enter Johnny Carson. The man, the myth, the legend, who revolutionized (using the word in its proper form) the late night talk show. At first the show ran almost 2 hours from 11:15 to 1:00AM. Then 90 minutes and then finally, in 1980, to one hour. Carson, along with his sidekick, the late, great and local Ed McMahon and his band leader Doc Severinson, went on to host the tonight show for nearly 30 years. When it was time for Johnny to say goodbye a major history changing decision was to be made. Who would take the reigns of one of the most beloved nighttime rituals in bedtime history? Two men were considered for the job. Frequent Tonight Show guest and fill-in host Jay Leno or David Letterman, the man who had been following Johnny from 12:30 to 1:30 for years with Late Night. After much campaigning (and back-stabbing on Leno's part... read the 1994 book The Late Shift or see it's 1996 HBO adaptation about the late night wars between NBC, Leno and Letterman) the show ultimately fell in the hands of Jay Leno leading Letterman to flee to CBS leaving his Late Night chair to the relatively unknown Conan O'Brien. And now the lightning round... In September of 1994 NBC announces that Leno will retire in 5 years leaving The Tonight Show in the hands of Conan O'Brien. In 2007 Jay Leno announces that he may stick around a little longer and so lights the fuse to the powder-keg that will soon follow. July 2008, NBC announces Leno's departure and Conan's start date.

Summer of 2008, Leno refuses to retire altogether and speculation mounts as to where he will go. December 2008, speculation becomes reality. Leno will stay with NBC as they fear having to compete with him on a nightly basis on another network. Leno will host a revolutionary (there's that word again) show for NBC. A five night-a-week, primetime talk show that had everyone scrabbling including this writer (see A Couch With A View - May 2009). June 1st 2009, Conan officially begins duties as the fifth host of

Those of you who reside in Methuen, MA, went to Methuen High School or UMass Lowell may recall a guy named Erik Corbett. If so, you may want to tune into ESPN and watch the Winter X Games, as you may see a familiar face or hear that familiar name.

Erik Corbett, 30, grew up in Methuen, MA. Erik played many sports while at Methuen High School. Following his junior year Erik transferred to a school in Vermont. This is where Erik learned to love the mountains and its surroundings.

Erik returned to the Merrimack Valley area where he attended college and was a 2005 UMass Lowell graduate. He now resides in Glen, NH, and was in a car accident in January of 2000. Erik suffered a spinal cord injury which was caused by two broken vertebrae, a broken arm and shoulder blade. Although suffering these injuries, he still lives a full, normal life. He drives a truck and lives like everyone else. He has not allowed his disability to take over his life. He is a very inspiring individual.

Erik never complained nor did he allow his injury to stop him from doing what

he loves best, competing in sports. Erik now competes in the Winter X Games in Aspen, CO and during the summer he competes in wheelchair races.

Due to the accident that Erik was in, he had a difficult time getting back on regular skis and keeping his balance, but that did not make him give up on what he loves to do best, which is to stay in sports and enjoy the mountains. He discovered Monoskier Cross. It is a single ski with a bucket to sit in. Monoskiing is a sport that gives people with a disability the ability to still compete. Corbett competed along with 11 other disabled individuals for the chance to move forward to the Winter X Games.

This was Erik's 3rd year competing. This past weekend Erik qualified for the Semi's in Monoskier Cross and came in 5th place, which will air on ESPN. When Erik is not competing, you can find him in New Hampshire where he works as a program director for Ability PLUS, at the New Hampshire ski resort, Attitash. Erik helps other people with disabilities who want to learn to ski. He has worked at the ski resort for a few years and enjoys what he does.

thereafter. Any violation of the provisions of this paragraph which has substantially influenced the action taken by a municipal agency in any matter shall be grounds for avoiding, rescinding, or canceling such action on such terms as the interest of the municipality and innocent third parties require."

Blanchette, who lost the mayor's race when it was learned that he refused to pay

Tax Lein on (then) City Council President Patrick Blanchette. Blanchette failed to pay his income taxes for three years and dodged the IRS until they put a tax lein on him. The IRS sent a wage garnishment letter to Lawrence City Hall to withdraw payemnts from his city council paychek but the letter was "lost" by someone in city hall. An investigation by the Lawrence City Attorney's office has never uncovered who was responsible for "diverting the letter.

three years worth of income taxes to the IRS was legally responsible for the city's budget according to the city charter. When he left office on Monday, January 4th, Blanchette left the city with a \$17.9 million budget deficit, did not set a tax rate or balance the budget as required by law.

### Keeping the seat open for himself

Fired Economic Development Director Thomas Schiavone was denied a contract

by Blanchette two months ago after nine years on the job. Blanchette not only voted against Schiavone to get the job but as the council president he lead the charge to stop Schiavone from getting the contract. Other members of the Sullivan team say they plan on taking legal action against the city and have already retained lawyers to represent them in a lawsuit against Lantigua.

### Blanchette/Councilors took while services were being cut

At the same time the Lawrence Police Union, Fire Union and laborers unions in the of Lawrence were taking furloughs, facing layoffs and losing benefits, Patrick Blanchette and the Lawrence City Council raised their own pay. In the six years Blanchette has been president of the council he has raised the city council pay from \$5,200 per year (times nine councilors) to \$15,000 per year with a \$2,500 bonus for the council president himself. The Lawrence City Council also had free cell phones, blackberries, an out of state travel allowance to go on junkets, free health insurance and payments into their pensions.

Three city councilor fought during the last budget cycle to cut the council's pay and reduce their own budget, but Blanchette and his Budget Committee Chairman Grisel Silva buried it in committee and the proposal never saw the light of day. During the subcommittee discussion Silva said she would not support a cut in the council's pay because she "could not afford to take a furlough".

Since then Lawrence has laid off essential personnel, reduced benefits for city workers, cut staff, become slow to pay vendors doing business with the city, closed two fire stations, is down to one food inspector and the city council has yet to reduce their own pay, perks or their budget ... even under the new council.

### Over their Heads

Two years ago the Lawrence City Council was so bogged down with petty squabbles and political agendas that they were incapable of passing the city budget. After three months of stalling a budget vote, (then) Mayor Sullivan had to go over their heads and get the city budget Certified by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue without a vote of the city council. Councilors had violated so many policies and procedures while trying to hold up the Sullivan budget that Sullivan had the legal footing to go over their heads, in effect rendering them irrelevant. City Councilors vowed revenge against the Sullivan administration for putting an end to the dog and pony show that included screaming fits, degrading members of the public from the council table, berating city employees and wild accusations about conspiracies.

### No End in Sight

Even if the Lantigua administration in Lawrence gets the \$35 million loan, that will only go to pay for the current operating deficit in city expenses. A new budget cycle will begin July 1st, if the new city council passes a 2010-2011 budget on time. That budget will include additional cuts in state aide, increases in pension and unemployment payments, raises for union and contracted employees, a lagging economy, a decrease in local property tax revenue and the expense of repaying a \$35 million loan that the state is allowing them to borrow.

Lowell State Representative Tom Golden (D), Lowell, and several other state representatives on Beacon Hill have already said they oppose giving Lawrence a state backed, \$35 million loan to cover operating costs in the current city budget unless there is an oversight board and a receiver to control the money Lawrence's mayor will be allowed to spend. Several reps. have predicted that this would be "bailout 1" for Lawrence as the economic prospect for Lawrence's financial future "is going to get worse before it gets better"

Governor Patrick and officials at the Department of Revenue say that if House Bill 4421 is passed without a receiver or fiscal oversight board, Mayor Lantigua and the Lawrence City Council will have until January of 2011 to get their fiscal house in order or face full receivership.

But some state officials like Karyn Polito (R) Shrewsbury, say that is too late with the financial crisis in the state getting worse every day and the deficit in Lawrence becoming insurmountable to the point where Lawrence is no longer solvent.

Mayor Lantigua has yet to name an economic team or present a spending plan to manage the city's finances, nor has he revealed what he would do with the \$35 million if the legislature passes the loan



Another source of tension for at-home dads and their working partners is lack of intimacy. While you may have thought that with the new arrangement there would be less craziness in your lives, it

can still be exhausting for both of you. This on top of the fact that she or both of you may be lacking sleep by getting up at night to check on the children or to breastfeed, leaves little time for intimacy. At-home dad Joe Finkelstein said, "Our 9-month old son, Will, is still breastfeeding, there's usually two long breastfeeds at night and then she's pooped. I get resentful sometimes that there is little time and energy on her part for any intimacy."

Ted Pena of Syracuse, NY, offers tips on increasing intimacy. "We will take day trips in the van just to get an hour or so that we can talk to each other. Or even talking over the phone when the timing is right. I imagine that we both believe that as the kids get older this will change a bit. We have found a baby-sitter so that we can get one or two nights out a month... but that still leaves the everyday time that a couple of any age needs to recharge their relationship."

Bob Jackson of Denver, an at-home dad for seven years, says, "The first 18 months after having a child your wife may be so overwhelmed that the only thing she can say "no" to is sex. Don't worry, intimacy will return, and you will slowly start to reconnect as the kids grow older and demand less attention from you. "The circle does come back... it's just that when you are in the middle of it, you just can't see it because you are just so friggin

mad." He recommends regular doses of exercise, and taking regular breaks for yourself.



America's VetDogs Veteran's K9 Corps Being a proud supporter of police, military and fire K-9, I was totally thrilled as I read what this organization was all about. America's VetDogs is an organization that provides service dogs to our disabled veterans. Guide Dog Foundation for the Blind started their organization in 1946. However, with an aging veteran population and more and more military personnel returning home with life changing injuries and disabilities, they realized they needed to provide additional resources for these veterans. This organization decided not only to offer guide dogs for the blind but they wanted to be able to help disabled veterans with service dogs.

Service dogs help provide an injured or disabled person with the freedom to live an independent lifestyle. Most people with service dogs are able to gain employment, go the store, travel, and basically live a traditional every day life as much as possible. The dogs help give this person the confidence needed to transition back into society.

The Need to Generate Awareness for America's VetDogs:

When a massive 7.0 magnitude earthquake struck Haiti near the capital of Portau-Prince on Tuesday, January 12th life not only changed for every man, woman and child on that island, it also changed for all the animals.

Family pets, livestock, wildlife and strays not only lost their homes they lost their owners, their shelter, and their food supply and clean water. These animals were left to literally fend for themselves.

# Canine Rehabilitation & Hydrotherapy at Good Dog Aquatic Fitness

Buddy, Buddy, Buddy ....everybody loves Buddy. He is your typical happy go lucky, friendly and cuddly golden retriever. Like most goldens Buddy loves to play ball, go for walks and sit and beg for treats. Buddy is one of my dog clients and it is very common to see us running around Hickory Hill having play dates with all the other dogs in his neighbor-

However in late September of 2009, Buddy's owner JoAnn Cooperstein noticed Buddy was limping on his right front leg. After a series of tests and a second opinion the conclusion was Buddy had premature closure of his distal ulna

Basically, what this means is one of the bones of a two-bone segment may grow at a slower or faster rate than the other bone. This will cause a disruption in the growth pattern making one bone to overlap or to not grow long enough to connect properly with the other bone.

Once the diagnoses came in, there was no question Buddy was going to have to have surgery to straighten his leg.

This is referred to as distal ulna ostectomy and distal radius ostectomy. To put it simply...the vet shortened the joint in Buddy's leg to help it grow properly.

This required Buddy to rest and relax and to wear a cast for the next six weeks. Once the cast was removed it was time for

As a pet owner your nerves are always a little on edge after your dog goes into surgery. Will the surgery help, was it successful, is there permanent damage, will he recover and most importantly what do I do now for my dog? These are all common questions that swirl through the owners mind. But what does one do next?

HYDROTHERAPY...ves, Canine Rehabilitation Hydrotherapy is the next step in the recovery process. When JoAnn was telling me about the surgery I immediately said "No worries after his cast is off go to Good Dog Aquatic Fitness. It's a complete rehabilitation center for canines and it is located right in North Andover." I gave her their brochure and website and recommended she speak to her vet about a referral. Buddy has now started his treatments at Good Dog.

But what is Hydrotherapy? Hydrotherapy is the use of water to help pain-relief and treating illness. This is mostly used for pre or post surgery recoveries. The mission for Good Dog Aquatic Fitness is to provide skilled rehabilitative services in a dog-friendly environment. Their goal is to assist in a speedy recovery and to improve the overall quality of life for your dog. They offer hydrotherapy in a heated spa, specialized exercises in a doggy gym and canine massage.

Luis Carrillo, owner and Certified Canine Rehabilitation Practitioner develops individual curriculums for each dog to include conditioning programs to build strength, endurance and increase mobility and function, while reducing pain and inflammation.

But why are treatments done in water? The benefits of swimming and moving in water on the canine body is that the water supports and lessons stress on the joints, and encourages freer movement which helps the Canine Rehabilitation Practitioner work more effectively with the dog.

Who should inquire about treatment? After consulting with your veterinarian, a client will seek canine hydrotherapy for reasons that include geriatrics and arthritis, paralysis and other mobility issues, pre and post surgical rehabilitation, injury prevention and rehabilitation, helping obesity, dysphasia, increasing body awareness, balance and coordination, and to help fitness and muscle development.

How long are the treatments? Well, that depends on the type of treatment needed but on average the sessions are approximately 45 min and the dog may need to 4-6 sessions.

It's been a long winter and everybody misses Buddy!

# Tips for pet safety, please use common sense

This month I wanted to talk about pet safety

I had a very unfortunate experience driving back from work a few weeks ago. It was nighttime and as I was traveling home through side streets I noticed some

stopped cars and commotion up ahead. There was a lady standing in the middle of the road, I could tell immediately that something was not right. I suddenly saw a little dog running towards me and another, a black ball of fur, motionless in the middle of the road.

Whenever I see a dog running in the road, my reflexes take over and immediately put my car in park and I jump out.

I ran over to the frightened little dog and scooped him up. Thank god he was safe; unfortunately I couldn't say the same for his little friend. I then had to tell the owner,

a woman who came running down her driveway after the two dogs, that one of her dogs didn't make it. Her sream sent chills through my body and stuck with me for the rest of the night. Having to tell someone that their dog has passed away is something I never want to have to do again, and I hope none of you ever have go through that. So why am I telling you this true story? I want to remind you how important safety is. It is something that

always has to be in the front of your mind. If you have kids, you know you are always looking out for them, safety is first. Well the same should go for your dogs. Make sure they are secured each time you open the door. If you have a fenced yard, check and make sure all doors and gates are closed and locked. One mistake can lead to a terrible accident, like the one mentioned above. So please, remember safety at all times. Also, if you ever come across a situation like this, don't panic. If you have a towel, blanket, or sheet in your car, put that over an injured dog before you pick it up. When dogs are scared, they might lash out so always remember to protect yourself first. If you are uncomfortable helping, call for help.

Make sure your home is safe place for a pet. Although your dog appears to be very smart, he is about as smart as a toddler.

He's going to be curious and explore, and he needs you to make sure that nothing he can get into will harm him. Something to think of: expect the unexpected. Something that has always made me nervous when I go to other people's homes is when I see a dog jumping on a glass door. Maybe he wants to go out or come in, but jumping on a door, especially glass, could lead to trouble. Train your dog to not jump but instead ring a bell or bark if he wants to go out or

Please make sure that your dog is prepared when he goes outside. He should

always have on his collar and ID tag. In addition to wearing a collar, my dogs are microchipped. This is another great way to protect your dog. If he runs off or gets stolen, a microchip can't fall off or be taken off by someone. If you take your dog for a walk, please make sure to put some type of reflector on him and on you. I can't tell you how many times I've passed people walking their dogs and I can barely see

them! Wear reflecting clothing and carry a flashlight.

Some foods that you should NEVER feed your dog: chocolate, grapes, raisins, fruit pits, rotten/moldy food, chicken/fish bones, or fat. Keep an eye out for signs that a dog has eaten something poisonous. Signs include vomiting, drooling, difficulty standing, seizures, or having difficulty standing.

Make sure to keep certain flowers and plants away. Things like poinsettias, azalea, and daffodils should not come in contact with your dog. Of course don't let your dog near antifreeze, fertilizers, pesticides, paint, bleach, or medications. When you clean your toilet remember to put the seat down! You wouldn't want to have cleaning solution in there and have your dog go take a drink.

Some dogs like to "counter surf." This means they put their front paws on the counter and look around for anything they can grab. If your dog does this, be very careful about what you leave on the table. Pens, food, glass, etc. should all be kept in safe places. Also, be careful of the stove. If he smells something yummy cooking on the stove, make sure he doesn't decide

to "surf" up there or else he's in for some very painful burns on his feet. To protect your dog, keep him out of the kitchen while you're cooking. That is a sure way to avoid accidents.

Lots of dogs like to chew cords. Keep computers, lamps, vacuum cleaners, etc. unplugged when not in use. That way if your dog decides to chew the cord, they won't get electrocuted. Dogs can choke on lots of things. The best idea is to make sure your floor is clear of "stuff" like toys, shoes, food, bags, cans, etc. I've decided that in the near future I am going to take a dog CPR class. Look online to find out when there is one near you. I want to be prepared if anything ever happens.

I hope you find these tips helpful! Safety is very important not only in our lives, but also for our dogs. I hope you and your four legged friends have a very happy and SAFE February and beyond.



# From the Desk of Methuen Mayor William Manzi

#### William Manzi

Thanks to the Valley Patriot for giving me an opportunity to outline some of the priorities for our city. In the next few months there will be some pretty exciting things happening. Here are just a few.

Methuen High School - Our Building Committee has worked hard and diligently to move this process forward. On our current schedule we should be prepared to present schematic design to the Massachusetts School Building Authority at their May meeting. If approved by the M.S.B.A my Administration will present to the community a finance plan that will detail how we will pay for this renovation/ expansion. For Methuen, and especially for our students, there is not a more important project. Our high school is an "open concept" school, with little or no separation between classes. Due to its age our science labs are badly outdated, and despite its size the changing nature of how we educate our children has presented us

with space problems as well. The City has been told that our accreditation is at risk due to this infrastructure, and we need to modernize it now. Our Building Committee has made it quite clear to our design team that we are looking for cost effective solutions that emphasize classroom in-

struction. On that basis we will produce a schematic design that emphasizes instruction and the creation of an infrastructure that allows our school administration to create the best environment for learning. The entire Building Committee deserves our appreciation, but I would especially like to thank the Chair of the Committee Suzanne Lamoureux. Without her leadership this process could not have come this far as quickly as it has. She has given countless hours of her time, and has made sure that we have stayed focused on the



goal at hand. Thank you Suzanne! Our Building Committee meetings are on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month in City Hall, and the Building Committee has a page at the City's website at www.cityofmethuen.net

The Budget - The Governor has filed his budget

recommendations, and they contain some relatively good news for our City. Governor Patrick has recommended that general local aid be level funded, and that Chapter 70 (school aid) be increased so that each community in Massachusetts be brought up to "foundation" level. This proposal is better than most expected, and it is my hope that the Legislature will find a way to at least keep the local aid portions of the Governor recommendations intact. Level funding the city side of local aid still presents us with huge problems with

fixed expenses going up substantially, but the Governor has also filed pension legislation that would help cities and towns by extending the full funding schedule to 2040. That should help by dropping our annual contribution substantially, allowing us to put more resources into maintaining critical services. The Governor is to be commended for looking to help municipalities. I urge all those concerned with the maintenance of those services to lobby your legislators to keep the Governor's local aid recommendations intact.

We continue to work on economic development projects as well as city infrastructure, and I hope to bring some good news on both fronts in future columns here at the Valley Patriot. # Methuen's Residency Enforcement Policy

The Methuen School Committee votes every year at a public meeting against offering a school choice program within the district. Therefore, it is critically important to review and strengthen the current district policy relative to investigating, identifying and removing any out-ofdistrict student not presently authorized to attend our public schools. It is also practical and cost-effective to seek out tuition reimbursement from those families that are directly and legally responsible for sending their out-of-district students to our schools in the first place.

This policy mandates that every family or individual that is sending a student to the Methuen Public Schools must provide proof-of-residency documentation to their school site administrative office by September 1st of each new school year. The current list of acceptable documentation that families of new student enrollees are required to provide will also serve as the necessary documentation for all remaining students attending our public schools. In order to save costs for both the district and the families and individuals sending students, the Superintendent shall develop a method to allow families and individuals to return residency documents along with other information normally required every summer before a new school year begins.

The Superintendent shall send out a timely notice every summer warning parents and guardians relative to the residency enforcement policy. The notice shall provide a brief summary of the goals of

mandatory proof-ofresidency documents; highlight a deadline of September 1st every year for the submission of acceptable copies of documents to the school site administrative office where a student is assigned; and give prominent publication to the legal and financial penalties associated

with violations of the policy, including the issuance of tuition billing statements and the exact dollar amount for a full school year of tuition. The acceptable documents shall reflect a recent three-month window of time to ensure that submitted documents are relevant, accurate and valid.

Each school's administrative office shall receive, review and maintain proofof-residency records for every assigned student. Any family failing to provide the acceptable and authorized documentation by September 1st shall be reported to the Superintendent for follow-up investigations. The Superintendent shall send out written warning letters to these families, informing them of the requirements of the residency enforcement policy to submit proof-of-residency documents or else be obligated to pay full tuition billing statements. Parents and guardians shall have the right to appeal the warning letters and the submission of full tuition billing

the policy; enclose a list of acceptable and statements to the Superintendent, but only

insofar as to confirm proof-of-residency. In the event that parents and guardians acknowledge that their student is attending the school system as an outof-district student, they will be given one business week to remove that student from the school system or automatically

be responsible for paying the tuition bill for the full school year. The Superintendent shall provide an annual written report to the School Committee at the first meeting of September that provides a total number of students for which families failed to provide sufficient documentation, and gives an overview of his/her efforts to send out warning letters and tuition billing statements.

The Superintendent shall also establish a hotline for the purposes of allowing for confidential calls regarding out-of- district students not currently authorized to attend our public schools. This hotline shall be advertised on the school district channel and website, and shall be included in the Superintendent's summer notice to parents and guardians. The Superintendent shall provide a monthly report to the School Committee based on the following tracking information:

1) How many calls were made to the hotline providing concrete and verifiable information (vehicle identification, specific bus stop, etc?)

2) How many calls with concrete and verifiable information were investigated by the Superintendent or his/her designated party?

3) Based on the results of the investigation, how many students were found to be in violation of the residency rules?

4) If an investigated case is found not to be in violation of the residency rules, the Superintendent or his/her designated representative shall provide a written summary of how the investigation was conducted without identifying the complainant or compromising the privacy of any party being investigated.

Upon final approval of the residency enforcement policy, the Superintendent shall take every reasonable step to promote the policy language and goals via the school district channel and website, through notices and flyers sent homes to parents and guardians, through outreach to PTOs and other school based organizations, and through official press releases to area media outlets.

The main goal of the residency enforcement policy is to ensure that every parent, guardian and student is abiding by the School Committee's vote not to participate in school choice within the district. A direct and positive result of this residency enforcement policy may be an overall cost-savings to the district and a subsequent reduction in class sizes, which should be encouraged and welcomed by all staff, faculty, parents, guardians and Methuen taxpayers.

Methuen residents packed the Mann

Orchards cafe to hear these elected and appointed officials discuss the difficulty of dealing with skyrocketing healthcare and pension costs and offer ideas on fixing the process and avoiding similar pitfalls down the road.

Residents also had the opportunity to take the microphone to ask questions and interact with the panel.

There was no sugar-coating by anyone in the building, and that's just the way we like it.

This process is about being open and not hiding from the constituents that put you in office. Most of Methuen politicians seem to understand that. However, there are still some that seem to be caught up on petty issues or unresolved grievances with other officials that they can't seem to understand this is about the community and the people living in it – not their own insecurities or grudges.

There is hope that those individuals will see the past for what it is, and move forward to better the community we all live in. If that doesn't happen, nothing – despite all our best intentions and efforts – will get the job done.

That's why we at Politically Active are in the works to expand our live-remote forums to cover the most important issues to Methuen and the State.

# The Quiet Man Cottage

The village Cong in County Mayo is where much of the Quiet Man movie, starring John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara, was filmed. (Anyone that's over fifty years of age can remember this award winning movie.) Situated in one corner of the village, the quaint little white Irish cottage with its Irish laced curtains is a tourist's

As you enter the cottage you are taken back to the memories of many an Irish country men and women; of a time when Ireland was run by the church and men ruled the land. While inside the cottage I could see the bedroom door where John Wayne echoed the words, "There will be no locks nor bolts between us Mary Kate only those in your mercenary little heart". The furnishing of the home was that of vintage Ireland with everything set in the kitchen with its open fireplace.

Most of the props from the movie were still there, the old bicycle that was used by Barry Fitzgerald, the old kitchen table with the cups and saucers still in place, memories of a long gone era. You can hear "Isle of Innisfree" (the move's theme song), echoing through-out the building as you take in all the memories of the past.

About fifty yards past the cottage is a small bridge spanning a river where you can spread your legs out and be in County Mayo and County Galway at the same time. I did.

Also, there is an authentic famine house nearby and the ruins of an old abbey right in the town. Adjacent to the abbey, you will find a path along the river where you can stroll through one of the loveliest forests in Ireland. And, best of all, a short



distance outside the village is magnificent Ashford Castle, perhaps the most dramatic castle in Ireland.

I was astonished by all the Irish history around this little village. Ashford Castle dates from the 12th Century, and you are permitted to stroll around the grounds to get a feeling of what Ireland was like hundreds of years ago. \*Cong Abbey founded in the early 7th century, by Saint Feichen, the abbey was destroyed by fire in the early 12th century. Turlough Mor O'Connor, High King of Ireland, re-founded the abbey circa 1135. His son Rory O'Connor, the last High King of Ireland before the Norman Invasion, constructed new buildings and also lived the last 15 years of his life at the abbey, dying in 1198. The monastery adopted the Augustinian rule some years later. \*Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia. Thanks to the people that sent me emails concerning my column. Keep them coming.

# Advice for our veterans from the American Legion

Congratulations to Scott Brown, our newest United States Senator.

And to Martha Coakley for a good campaign. But even more so to the 2 million plus citizens who went out and voted. Our system continues to work.

Keeping the glass half full, I prefer to think that the real winners are the citizens of Massachusetts who spoke their mind, no matter which candidate they voted for.

But all does not end with this or any election. There are many issues on the table for the US Congress. One major issue for veterans is that of VA benefits.

The American Legion web site reports that: The consensus was clear Jan. 20 when Rep. Bob Filner, D-Calif., hosted a roundtable discussion in Washington with The American Legion and about 40 other veterans service organizations: the staggering backlog of VA disability claims and appeals must be substantially reduced in 2010.

"Beyond that, our key issues cover a spectrum of concerns," said Steve Robertson, director of The American Legion's Legislative Division. "We're addressing - as we always have - the welfare of all veterans." While the claims backlog is the Legion's top legislative concern, it has other priorities as well, including calling upon Congress to work with VA on health care for women veterans, timely access to quality rural health care, and homelessness among veterans and their families.

"Our agenda doesn't end there," Robertson said. "We favor enhancements to the new Post-9/11 G.I. Bill, such as expanding benefits to those in vocational schools. That should be part of the package, as well as some financial tweaks and enhance-

The American Legion is also pushing for more veteran's employment opportunities and training in a time of serious economic downturn. The Legion sponsored or co-sponsored 100 job fairs for veterans last year and continues to press for legislative changes that would facilitate the hiring of more veterans.

In a written document given to Filner's committee before the roundtable session, The American Legion outlined a proposal that would allow VA to bill Medicare and Medicaid for the health care of veterans enrolled in those programs. Robertson said the Legion is also urging Congress to continue and expand long-term VA health care for veterans.

In his written remarks to Congressman Filner, Robertson stated, "Mr. Chairman,

Also included is a list of documents you will need to provide the service officer.

Last but not least, current Legion events will be broadcast on the internet. More American Legion events and activities than ever before will be streamed live on www.legion.org this year. The Commander's Call at the 50th Annual Washington Conference kicks off the schedule on March 2 from Washington, D.C. Also new this year will be live webcasts from American Legion Boys Nation and portions of the 92nd National Convention from Milwaukee.

March 2, 8:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m. (EST). National Commander Hill and some of the nation's top elected officials are scheduled to address Legionnaires during the Commander's Call portion of the conference.

The American Legion National Oratorical Championship University Place Conference Center, IUPUI Campus, Indianapolis April 11, 10 a.m. (EST). # DAV helps prepare for death and its' aftermath

Death finds most of us unprepared. I write this column with a heavy heart; I have just read of the untimely death of one known throughout the veteran's commu-

Though not a veteran herself, Barbara DesRoche was probably familiar to anyone who went to a DAV meeting, visited, or attended a function at the VFW or American Legion. Our condolences go out to her family and loved ones. We are sorry for their loss. Though this article is not directly about her, it is directly about the topic of death - preparation for it, and the VA's assistance with its aftermath.

Normally I begin the year discussing documents needed to prepare for the inevitable, this year other subjects took precedent. Now is a good time to revisit this issue. This column will be in two parts. This month will deal with paperwork needed, next month will cover the benefits and burial rights the VA can supply.

To access benefits your survivors must have access to your paperwork. It needs to be in a secure location, one safe from fire or theft. If a safe deposit box works for you then your loved one needs to know the location of the key; they may also need to be a signature on said box.

The following is a list of important documents that should be completed

and made available for your loved ones.

Veterans all know that they need to have their discharge papers (DD-214, DD-215, or for World War II veterans a WD form) in a place accessible to whomever will handle matters once the veteran is deceased. These papers as well as a copy of the veteran's marriage certificate, birth or adoption papers of any child, and/or the veteran's birth certificate are necessary to establish eligibility for veteran benefits, survivor benefits, and/or dependent benefits. Any award letter given by the Veterans Administration should be kept with these papers.

The award letter shows whether a disability rating has been established, whether it is service-connected, and the percentage of disability. Different or additional benefits may be available for service-connected veterans.

There are other documents that should be considered when compiling and considering end of life issues.

Advance Directives The Department of Veterans Affairs uses this umbrella term for two types of documents, the "Durable Power of Attorney." and the "Living Will". Many VA facilities stock these papers so ask for one when you go to your next appointment, or check with the social worker for assistance. They will even help in filling out these papers.

According to the VA, the Durable Power of Attorney for health care is used to appoint a person you trust to make your health care decisions when you are unable or unwilling to do so. Remember, these documents are only activated and used when the person for whom it is written is unable to make his or her own decisions. Changes to these documents can be made at any time.

The VA states that its Living Will "lets you state in advance what kind of care you would want or not want if there comes a time when you cannot make these decisions for yourself". Decisions regarding life support, under what conditions one wishes ones life maintained, or not maintained, etc. are all matters that someone may need to decide for you one day. It is better to have your wishes on record than to trust in a stranger, or the court to make these difficult decisions for you

Check with your State as the above documents may be called by other names. or contain slightly different information. A good source is the VA's own Web site: http://www.va.gov. Additional information can be obtained at: http://www.myhealth. va.gov.

One important piece of estate planning that is often overlooked is the obituary.

Many veterans, especially combat veterans, are adverse to discussing wartime experiences, and with good reason.

Do not push unless you are 100% sure that pushing is the correct method, you may make a bad situation worse by insisting someone who is not ready to remember do so. Not all experiences blur with time. I have seen too many WW11 veterans open up; one can see the horror they witnessed by looking in their moist eyes. Your intent is to find out how they wish to be remembered, not open old wounds.

Ask them to write something down about their life, their educational background, work experience, etc. sometimes mundane experiences make the more difficult ones easier to recount. Also remember to ask about any service organizations they belong to. And when the veteran passes contact that organization (DAV, VFW, Am Legion, etc.).

These organizations normally attend the wake and/or funeral, will perform a ceremony (with the families approval), and in many cases bestow a certificate or other memento to the family.

Please consider these matters and these documents. Life is unpredictable it is always better to be prepared.

Next month we will focus on the compensation and burial benefits due veterans or their survivors.

is clearly at the heart of this family. Bob lives in Stoneham, Massachusetts with his wife Eileen and their three daughters: Riley 16, Shannon 15 and Karrin 13. Bob had planned on attending a special event honoring Medal of Honor recipients that was to be held on September 14th, 2001. We all know how devastating September 11th turned out to be that year, and the event was rescheduled until later in October. Bob says he was deeply moved by the patriotic speeches, and one in particular about the ongoing plight of our homeless veterans caught his attention. He fell asleep that night thinking about it.

When he awoke the next morning he suggested to his wife that they should host their annual Saint Patrick's Party at a hall instead of their home and charge a fee to donate to the homeless veterans. His wife agreed, and she was thrilled to not have to do the dishes and all the clean up. That is when his vision came to life. Bob went to the Montvale Plaza in Stoneham, Massachusetts, and explained what he

was doing. The staff there thought his idea was great and told him to expect about a hundred people. The hall that could hold three hundred was filled to capacity, and he raised \$10,000. The year following the start of the war in Iraq Bob moved the growing fundraising event to the Burlington Marriott. He then filed for nonprofit status making the "Ahern Family Charitable Foundation" official. During his second and third years he was raising \$40,000 and selling out the 500 seats. By the 4th year he once again had to find a larger hall-- the Quincy Marriott. Now in its ninth year, attendance reaches six hundred and is a jacket and tie or military dress occasion with dinner and dancing as well as guest speakers. This year Bob has two Medal of Honor recipients being flown in to speak at the event: Tom Kelley, Secretary of Veterans Affairs who served in the Vietnam War and Tom Hudner who served in the Korean War. They were both in the Navy.

Each December Bob also hosts a
