Welcome Back Chief Solomon

Love him or hate him, Methuen Police Chief Joe Solomon may not be a saint, but he is certainly not the demon he was made out to be by The Eagle~Tribune and others when he was fired in 2008.

Solomon has been painted as a thief, a corrupt police chief and a danger to the people of Methuen.

In fact, the daily paper published a spate of stories, questioing every expense Solomon oversaw as police chief, even spinning for their own purposes, his purchase of a pretzel while on a conference for the Weed and Seed program. Even a Methuen councilor jumped on the bandwagon, making accusations of corruption against the chief that he later admitted under oath was unfounded.

After more than two years of having his reputation destroyed and his credibility called into question, losing his badge, gun and paycheck, and being the subject of a smear campaign by the Eagle~Tribune, nearly everything that was alleged against Chief Solomon turned out to be nothing more than a political

Joe Solomon and the Methuen Police Department deserved better. The people of Methuen also deserved better.

Solomon has certainly made mistakes as chief and obviously. his political involvement contributed greatly to his own missteps and his eventual termination by Mayor Manzi.

But, Civil Service saw through the smears, rumors, speculation and political attacks that had very little to do with what the facts showed at the end of the day.

Now, Civil Service has returned Joe Solomon to duty as Methuen's head Law Enforcement Officer saying that, yes. Solomon deserved a reprimand and a suspension for his actions but that they did not rise to the level of being fired under the law.

Mayor Manzi has an exceptional point on this. He says it's wrong for judges in Boston to micromanage the hiring and firing decisions of a duly elected mayor. And on moral grounds he is correct. Mayors in every community ought to be able to hire and fire their own department heads without interference by outsiders.

However, that's not the system in place for dealing with civil service employees. Arguing how the system should work and how unfair the process is, however, does not absolve the city from following that process and adhering to the Civil Service laws currently in place.

We welcome back Joe Solomon as police chief in Methuen. We hope that with his return, the animosity by fellow officers, city councilors and members of the public can be left in the past as he now must administer the Methuen Police Department.

And we hope that both Solomon, his supporters and his detractors will cease all hostilities from here on in, move the city forward and tackle the crime problems in Methuen, especially the Arlington Neighborhood.

The taxpavers deserve nothing less.

I have read and reviewed many other city council rules of participation for the public and fellow councilors. All these cities do not allow the "pep-rally" type atmosphere that we see here in the Great City of Lawrence. It's embarrassing to me as a citizen of Lawrence that there is such a lack of control and enforcement of the rules as they apply to the members of the public. Any person who decides to view a council meeting should not be allowed to bring in and display signs, banners, placards etc. Nor should they be allowed to demonstrate approval or disapproval with clapping, booing and cheering etc. The decorum of these meetings is unprofessional at best. I don't recall these types of actions being allowed with the past council, please explain what has changed.

Another observation I have is before the public participation begins, you state very clearly that the audience, when at the podium shall address the council as a whole. Do not single any one councilor out during your time at the podium. However when Mr. Lantigua is speaking, it appears these rules do not apply. You tend to just sit and grin while this is happening

in front of you. It's unfortunate that when folks are at a loss of intelligent verbal expression, that they have to resort to verbal abuse of one another. I've see this happening from the podium and within the council members on more that a few occasions.

As a freshman in High School I joined with concerned citizens and organizations across Massachusetts to file legislation in 2009 that would outlaw devocalizationthe cruel practice of cutting a dog or cat's vocal cords just to stifle their voices.

There was a lot of opposition to this bill by special interests that profit from devocalization, but we overcame it. A few times a week I would travel to the State House after school, alone or with other advocates, and talk to legislators about the importance of passing this bill.

One legislator who stood out as an ally is State Representative Barbara L'Italien. She was one of the first Representatives to sponsor the bill, and was an avid sup-

Massachusetts has the rare opportunity on November 2nd to reign in state government by voting Yes on Ballot Question 3, thereby reducing the sales tax from 6.25 percent to 3 percent. 

Show your I.D. to vote: protect the process


How can "We the People" ensure that the democratic principle of "One Citizen, One Vote" is followed unless we show that we are indeed the registered voter? Our future as a Republic demands no less than a fair and honest voting process. Show ID to Vote seeks to elevate the discussion regarding proper identification and voter fraud.

A bipartisan citizen's initiative called "Show ID to Vote" has been created in Massachusetts to address fraudulent voting across the USA. Through increased awareness it seeks to improve the integrity of the vote in the upcoming elections this November and beyond. By simply suggesting that voters voluntarily Show ID when Voting, they are helping people to better understand the issue of voter fraud. At the same time they are showing how simple it

will be for poll workers everywhere to check voter ID's the way it is required by law in several states.

Each State determines their own set of rules and regulations for voting. Identification in Massachusetts is required to be in possession of every voter, but it is seldom requested. As a result this means that anyone can assume the identity of any voter

and cast an illegal ballot. Anyone can Google "voter fraud" and see the thou-



elections impacted by voter fraud. As citizens we must insure the integrity of the voting process. Massachusetts laws do not prevent people from voluntarily submitting their ID when voting.

Show ID to Vote is a grassroots movement with a presence on the Internet and can be found at www. ShowIDtoVote. com, facebook/ ShowIDtoVote, as

well as on twitter. A video was recently released on youtube showing how easy it is to Show ID to Vote! The video

features Tom Weaver of Westford as a caveman voting with a touch of humor applied to a very serious threat to the basic right of a citizen to have one vote count per legal voter. The video lasts under two minutes and makes the case for proper ID's.

The Show ID folks are trying to get people involved. Show ID to Vote asks local people to take a photo holding their photo ID up to their face. The people can submit the photos by email to photo@showidtovote.com or on facebook. The photos are displayed on the facebook/ShowIDtoVote supporter page and can be "tagged" to express plans to Show ID on election day.

Show ID to Vote needs thousands of people to create a groundswell that will spread the message over the next thirty days. The message is Show ID to Vote! After the election the organization plans to continue working on vote fraud related issues.

Some of the comments that were made by the last speaker, (Jamison Tomasek) I didn't care for and I wish he was here to defend himself and he has done a good job for this city.

I love the job I do, I really do. It makes me feel good about some of the things we've accomplished over the last 12 years and sometimes people forget that because the last couple of years have been difficult. We've been going through an economic recession that we haven't seen since The Great Depression. It's been very difficult. We've had huge budget cuts on the state level and, obviously, we've had budget cuts at the city level, too. I'm not proud of that. I'm not happy about that. I know the city councilors that I work with every single day aren't happy about the budget cuts. But, those are the things you have to deal with. We are not the Federal Government. We don't get to print money to make things work. So, we are doing our best every day. I know we always don't agree all of the time, but there are many things we do agree upon. I know that by having a business on the NH border that it is important that we keep the city sales tax at 5%. I was very happy to vote against an increase in sales tax, because I do know, first hand, that business goes over the border. I also, voted against the alcohol tax, the new tax on beer, wine and liquor. I know a lot of our small package stores are suffering because of that. I think I know that it is difficult to make things work in MA sometimes. I just hope I can have your vote on November 2nd. Thank you very much."

[Editors Note: While Torrisi did vote against the budget amendments to raise the sales tax and the alcohol tax, those tax amendments passed anyway and Torrisi then voted for the entire budget with those tax hikes in it.]

Original Intent Part III

This installment of Original Intent is my third and will also serve to be my last in this series of articles. It has been a wonderful blessing for me to get into material that deals with the U.S. Constitution, and I trust these articles have been a refresher course for you as well. In this article I want to go over the principle of Separation of Powers. This is a fundamental principle of the U.S. Constitution, right up there with federalism, democracy and the rule of law and judicial review.

The basic meaning of separation of powers in its simplest terms refers to separation between the three branches of government.

Legislative: Congress, the lawmaking branch of government.

Executive: The President, who has the duty under Article 2, section 3 of the Constitution to "take Care that the laws be faithfully executed".

Judicial: The Supreme Court justices and other judges who interpret and enforce the law through courts.

Each branch should stay away from the functions of the other two branches. But there are two problems with this theory. 1. In practice, overlap between the functions of the three branches can't be entirely avoided and in some important situations, overlap is quite deliberate. 2. If each of the three branches kept religiously to its own specific functions and didn't stray into the preserve of the other branches, the branches couldn't act as checks and balances on one another. Some of the overlap between the three branches of government is the result of a genuine desire of one branch to help out another. The concept of checks and balances is in one sense a natural extension of separation of powers, but in another sense the two concepts, separation of powers and checks and balances are actually in opposition to each other. On its own, separation of powers should just mean that each branch of government would go its own merry way without interference from any other branch. But this arrangement isn't practical, because the boundaries between the three branches of government aren't clear-cut. Plus, the Framers deliberately introduced overlaps

between the functions of the three branches so that they could act as checks and balances on one another. James Madison said in the Federalist Papers in support of separation of powers;

"The accumulation of all powers, legislative, executive, and judiciary, in the same hands whether of one, a few, or many, and whether hereditary, self appointed, or elective, may justly be pronounced the very definition of tyranny."

Madison and other Framers considered separation of powers essential in order to avoid "tyranny". But the Constitution went much further than the mere separation of powers; it also established an elaborate system of checks and balances.

Having now set the foundation of this fundamental principle of separation of powers lets apply it to what we see happening in the City of Lawrence. I find myself asking questions like where is the separation of power in Lawrence. We have a Mayor, The Executive, who in my humbled opinion doing just about anything he wants. Next we have the City Council, The Legislature, doing just about everything the Mayor wants. Then there is the Lawrence City Charter which serves as the local "Rule of Law" along with City Attorneys acting as its guardians functioning as The Judicial. They are supposed to represent the best interest of the City. But unfortunately they have demonstrated that they are better in representing the Mayor and his interest rather what is best for the City. Now what does this look like to you?

Before you answer, what about the Lawrence School Committee? We have two city employees who work for the Mayor on the Committee. After years of debate on this issue of City Employees holding elected office simultaneously, the City Council who took an oath to carry out the City Charter finally have taken action and have sent a Homeroom Petition to Boston to end this practice. So it is very encouraging to see the separation of powers, (the check and balances), working in the peoples favor in removing the obvious conflict of interest!

Next we have a City Charter Review that is finally happening in this year of 2010. There have been Charter Review

Patrick Blanchette fined \$20,000 for taking money from campaign

The State Office of Campaign Finance (OCPF) has fined former Lawrence City Council President Patrick Blanchette

\$20,000 for taking money from his city council campaign account going back to 2006 among other violations.

Blanchette has admitted to OCPF that he wrote checks to himself from his campaign account totaling \$12,985 "with no supporting records on how the money was used for campaign purposes."

Blanchette was the city council president in Lawrence for six years and was appointed by

Governor Deval Patrick as a conciliator in the State Office of Industrial Accidents while still on the city council. Blanchette was a candidate for mayor at the time. The Internal Revenue Service currently has a tax lien on Blanchette for failing to pay taxes during the same time frame he was writing checks to himself from his campaign account. Blanchette has been a supporter of Governor Patrick through his 'close personal friendship with Lt. Governor Tim Murray who appeared at a Blanchette fundraiser last year.'

While the city council president, Blanchette refused to set a tax rate in 2009 and held up Mayor Sullivan's budget causing a budget deficit that ballooned from \$9.5 million to \$24.5 million after he refused to send out the city's property tax bills. Last month, the Lawrence City Council voted to confirm Mayor Lantigua's appointment of Blanchette as the city's Economic Development Director despite his tax liens and financial mismanagement of the city's budget from 2006-2009. The city council voted 8-1 to confirm Blanchette with only Marc LaPlante

voting against him.

The report by OCPF released last month, stated that Blanchette accepted contributions from corporations and individuals, failed to report cash expenditures and donations and refused to disclose donations and expenditures, accepted donations that were not deposited into his campaign account and cannot be accounted for, failed to keep records of donations and expenditures, accepted campaign contributions in

excess of the \$500 legal limit, accepted illegal money orders, used campaign funds for personal use, and expenditures made with cash.

According to the report, Blanchette tried to blame his bank for shoddy record keeping and discrepancies, "Furthermore, the candidate repeatedly expressed his concern to OCPF regarding the accuracy of bank records provided by the bank of record."

Blanchette is now ordered to pay \$6,000 immediately in fines and penalties, \$6,000 to be paid no later tan January 1, 2011, \$4,000 to be paid no later than May 31, 2011, and another \$4,000 fine by September 30, 2011. Failure by Blanchette to make any of the above payments could result in a criminal penalties and an investigation by the Attorney General.

Somber Gold Star Event Shines

In a city hall filled with appointed officials who are unqualified, incompetent, shirkers, and layabouts, one person stands out as a testament to what public service is all about – Lawrence veterans Agent Francisco Urena. A decorated U.S. Marine Corps veteran, Mr. Urena has demonstrated time after time a level of true professionalism that is sorely lacking throughout the rest of 200 Common Street. Whether through the vast improvements he has made to the Veterans office in the bowels of city hall or the numerous events he puts on honoring local veterans throughout the year, Mr. Urena is a glittering gem hidden amongst a barrel full of rotten apples.

Nothing brought this out more clearly than the recent Gold Star Mothers event held at the Lawrence Airport on Sunday, September 26. With the sound of bagpipes in the air, a couple of hundred attendees heard key note speaker, United States Senator Scott Brown, speak of how honored he felt to be amongst the mothers and fathers who had children that made the ultimate sacrifice in the service of their country. The morning demonstrated acalm, inspiring reverence for our recent and not so recent war dead that should make every one think each day of the men and women who have given their lives in defense of our freedoms, most of whom voluntarily chose to do so. 

Baker: I will put Lawrence into receivership

Baker says if elected, Lantigua will not manage city finances

Charlie Baker, Republican candidate for governor spoke at a Tea Party Rally in North Andover recently.

Earlier this year, Lawrence Mayor Willie Lantigua partitioned the state legislature to borrow \$35Mil claiming there was a \$24Mil deficit in the city's budget. Governor Deval Patrick wrote House Bill 4421 to do just that and the legislature approved the borrowing measure. Immediately after receiving the borrowed money, Mayor Lantigua gave raises to people in city hall, laid off 24 firefighters and 25 police officers and spent \$10,000 on new curtains for his office among other frills.

State Representatives Barry Finegold and David Torrisi voted to give Lantigua the money without any financial controls, without receivership and without a finance control board.

Charlie Baker was asked to address the financial mess in Lawrence and what he would do about it if he was elected

"I have said and I will say it again, we have to have receivership or a control board in the City of Lawrence or we will never straighten this out.

A \$25MIL deficit, \$35MIL of everybody's money invested in the city and the governor, I believe for political reasons, chose not to go with a control board and decided to hand the keys over to the newly elected mayor... who, by the way, didn't think he needed to be the mayor 24-7, 365 days a year. Remember that? He actually thought he could continue to be the State Rep. at the same time. That should have been the warning bell to everybody that this guy didn't understand the size and significance of the problem that Lawrence

faces.

So here we are, six months down the road and all that has happened is what everybody who wanted a control board or receivership said was going to happen; it's gotten worse in Lawrence.

We still need receivership in Lawrence and we need it now. We needed it yesterday, and we need it tomorrow. And I still expect that people in this administration are going to fiddle with this one and try to play it through until after the election.

Well, the problem that's going to create is, all those other communities that are expected to step up and provide mutual aide and provide fire protection and police protection for the citizens of Lawrence, they're not going to be able to do it.

The problem here is that the Governor, Deval Patrick, should have taken ownership and responsibility for this and made the proactive decision months ago to do the right thing. He didn't do that and as it sits today we still need receivership or a control board in Lawrence. We still need some sort of aggressive, independent review board for the city and we don't

decisions. That is what we need in Lawrence. We don't have it, we desperately need it and I really hope that at some point the governor is going to wake up on this issue because what's going on right now isn't fair to anyone who lives in Lawrence.

It certainly isn't fair to the surrounding communities like North Andover, Andover, Methuen and others who have to send in your public safety officials to the city, leaving your citizens less protected.

I have said all along on this one that Governor Deval Patrick has been kicking this can down the road hoping he can avoid the Lawrence problem till after the election. He's hoping we can keep Lawrence off the front page and let them continue in the direction they are going in and that's just not acceptable. Let's face it folks, Governor Deval Patrick has been the governor for the last four years while the financial problems in Lawrence have festered and gotten out of control.

He is just as much a part of the problem here than anyone else. On his watch, Deval

Karyn Polito tours North Andover, addresses Torrisi attacks

We caught up with Karyn Polito touring North Andover last month where Valley Patriot editor Tom Duggan asked her about the viscous personal attack Rep. David Torrisi launched against her in Lawrence during the Mount Vernon Neighborhood Association debate.

Tom Duggan: State Rep Dave Torrisi after you left the Mount Vernon neighborhood today, attacked you saying that you've been in the pension system for the last 10 years and that you've recently found religion on not taking a pension. I was just wondering if you could address that.

Karyn Polito: Sure, yes I make contributions to the public pension system and I

said that I am not taking a public pension. The point is that a public pension system is unsustainable and the tax payers are paying \$1.4 billion each year to prop it up. I have filed bills to reform it, and the Beacon Hill leadership is not capable of making the reforms that are necessary to keep the promise of the pension, to the hard working civil servants, our police, our fire, our teachers. Instead, you have politicians that are gaming the system, double and triple dipping and putting the system more at risk. I am taking the lead, unlike Representative Torrisi and I am telling everyone "Get the state elected officials out of the pension system, because they are the ones that are making decisions that

benefit themselves. If you take the politics and the conflicts of interest out, then we can get to the real reform for the next generation of public workers coming in to service. Then we can keep the promise of our pension to those civil servants

that are earning it and I hope that Representative Torrisi will follow my lead and do the right thing.

Tom Duggan: What do you think of a guy running for reelection as a State Representative attacking a candidate for Treasurer? Why do you think he's attacking you?

Karyn Polito: Well, it's all politics, that's the problem on Beacon Hill. You've got too many legislators that are in there



Jim McKenna urges AG Martha Coakley to enforce the law on illegal aliens

According to the Boston Herald, Governor Deval Patrick has ignored requests to disclose how many illegal immigrants are receiving health insurance, which has been pending since early September.

"On Sept. 10, the Herald requested a schedule of benefits for illegal immigrants enrolled in MassHealth Limited as

well as coverage information for legal non-citizens. According to the nonprofit Mass-Resources.org, non-citizens ages 18-64 who do not meet the eligibility requirements for MassHealth but qualify for the Massachusetts Refugee Resettlement Program have access for eight months to MassHealth Standard - a more comprehensive plan than some

Bruce Arnold: A Merrimack Valley Radio Legend

When you think of Merrimack Valley Radio, the name Bruce Arnold most likely comes to mind.

With a career that spans more than fifty years in both the radio and television industry, Bruce Arnold remains part of our daily lives. At WCCM in Lawrence, he continues to entertain local residents with his warmth and charm every weekday. And according to Arnold, he is grateful for the opportunity to speak to thousands of people across the Merrimack Valley.

On Thursday, September 16th, 2010, Arnold was inducted into the Massachusetts Broadcasters Hall of Fame. The event, which was held at the Boston Marriott Hotel in Quincy, brought out the entire WCCM family, including Tom Zappala, host of the Sicilian Corner Radio Show. When asked about how he felt about Bruce's induction, Zappala responded "You kidding me? Bruce is a pleasure to work with. And he has the largest heart out there. He's so humble."

I had an opportunity to sit down with the living legend about a week before the induction ceremony, and his drive and passion for this business is as strong as it was the day he began his career.

"There hasn't been a morning where I didn't want to come into work," said Arnold. "Yes, there have been lots of changes to the industry, but I have been able to keep up with the time. And I'll tell you, it's always been exciting."

Humble beginnings - Born Bruce Arnold Salvucci, the Lynn native began his career in 1955 while he was still in Army. Arnold was stationed at the former Fort Devens base in Aver, where he helped to produce training films. When he officially began his radio career at WCCM, going on the air, according to Arnold, was not sweat. "When I came to WCCM (in 1959). I had been making training films for the Army at Devens, and I just fell in love with radio. I still love it to this day."

From there on forward. Arnold became synonymous with local radio. He also filled in for Boston radio legends such as Larry Glick, and has even mentored such modern day broadcasters like WBZ-TV and radio sportscaster Dan Roche. In fact, many credit Arnold with being a mentor to many up-and-coming broadcasters. But he doesn't like to take credit for other people's successes.

"They say that I opened the door for these guys," mentioned Arnold. "But the truth is, is that they opened the door for themselves. Never the less, it makes me feel so good to see these kids making it in the industry."

The radio and television field can be very cutthroat, with many consequences and repercussions that come with the experience of the industry. Arnold feels that broadcasting is a team sport and that nobody is better than anyone else.

"One of the things that I learned from the Army is that you can be the boss. But you have to work together no matter what the rank," said Arnold.

"I always say to the kids, 'you drop a pen, and I'll pick it up. You guys would do the same.' They always love that story (laughs)."

Man of the people - In addition to being a team player behind the scenes, Arnold has always maintained a strong relationship with the local listeners, including longtime fan Bob Hilgendorf of Methuen. Hilgendorf, along with his wife

TOM DUGGAN'S NOTEBOOK

LAWRENCE – As is the case in every election, Lawrence Mayor Willie Lantigua has a slate of candidates he is supporting. Right out of the gate, the number one candidate on Willie's dance card is State Rep. Barry Finegold who is not running for reelection, but is seeking to replace Sue Tucker in the State Senate. On primary day Lantigua had his campaign supporters out holding signs and corralling voters to the polls, handing out little cards with Lantigua's preferred candidates on it. On Lantigua's list was Governor Deval Patrick who wrote House Bill 4421 giving Lantigua the authority to borrow \$35MIL. Finegold testified and voted for the borrowing measure as did State Rep. David (Where-is-he) Torrisi. Willie is also supporting his good friends Secretary of State Bill Galvin, and Attorney General Martha Coakley.

LAWRENCE – Speaking of Deval Patrick, I interviewed the governor last December and asked him about the financial mess in Lawrence. The governor told me, on the record, on tape that "the help we give Lawrence will not be an infusion of capital." At the time I was conducting the interview Deval had already written House Bill 4421 to let Willie Lantigua borrow \$35Mil. He also lobbied hard against any financial controls being imposed by the legislature. When State Reps. and Senators proposed a receiver or financial control board the governor and



his supporters on the hill killed the measure.

METHUEN-One of the more interesting races in The Valley this election season is the state rep. Race in Methuen where incumbent Linda Dean Campbell (a former Valley Patriot of the Month) is facing

ANDOVER/LAWRENCE - In the race to replace Barry Finegold Democrat Pat Comaine is facing Republican Paul Adams and it looks as though Adams is the front runner. Adams defeated Sal Tabit in the republican primary and did very well

in Lawrence as well as Andover and Tewksbury. Comaine and Adams are both first time candidates and neither of them have the political machine that most candidates have at this stage of the game.

Comaine is a state worker who says she

wants to streamline state services and consolidate departments. Adams is running as a Tea Party candidate who supports lower taxes, opposes casinos, and running as the fiscally conservative candidate. Neither candidates have a lot of money to spend and with all the attention being paid to the bigger races (governor, senate, etc) this race is under everyone's radar screen

ANDOVER – I wish I could express how disappointed I am in Andover School Committee Chairman

Deb Silberstein who recently was defeated

Finegold, saying he didn't care about his constituents, criticizing him for voting to give Willie Lantigua a \$35MIL bailout loan and went out of her way to make the election about the shortcomings of Barry Finegold. Now that Finegold has won the primary however, Silberstein did what far too many politicians do today, she sold out and endorsed Finegold. I can respect any candidate who disagrees with me on issues, but I have no respect for politicians who think more about their own political future or being afraid to anger members of their political party than doing the right thing. Silberstein knows Barry Finegold has been mailing it in for the last four years or more and she also knows he doesn't deserve to be rewarded by getting elected to the senate. 

The "Quiet Man's cottage"

"The Quiet Man" Visit to Counties Galway and Mayo:

During ten weeks in the summer of 1951 Hollywood descended on the old-world Irish village of Cong to film a movie (the village had its first electric power installed that year). John Wayne, Maureen O'Hara and other Hollywood stars were trundled down narrow Irish roads while townsfolk looked on in curiosity. The Quiet Man film project must have been underwritten by a higher power because miraculously there was not a drop of rain that Irish summer to spoil the shooting schedule.

If you don't already know, and if you care a bottle cap about 1950s-era John Wayne films, "The Quiet Man," is based on Maurice Walsh's short story, "Green Rushes." It is set in rural Ireland of the 1930s. According to Robert Osborne of American Movie Classics, the film was the only movie produced by Republic Studios (mostly known for westerns) that was ever nominated for the academy award for best picture. Here's a synopsis: a prizefighter from Pittsburgh (played by John Wayne) killed a man in the ring so he retreats to the land of his roots and seeks out a quiet existence in his old family homestead, a thatched, whitewashed cottage called "White O' Morn" outside of a fictitious town called Innesfree

The famous director, John Ford, claimed he was born Sean Aloysius O'Fearna in a postage-stamp-sized coastal town west of Galway City. I read that this family history has been disputed, or even disproved. John Ford was able to bargain the use of Ashford Castle in Cong to house the actors and crew for the movie. The movie was filmed in Technicolor on locations all over Counties Galway and Mayo. Scenes were shot in view of the low hills called "The Twelve Pins" and as far away as the seaside of Clew Bay. The movie towns of Innesfree and Castletown were invented from scenes shot in real life Cong. John Ford took home the best director Oscar for 1952 (it also won best color cinematography - here are all the 1952 Oscar nominees and winners).

Ford bought the rights to "The Green Rushes" as early as 1937 (he spent \$10 for the rights), but couldn't get backing for a venture that required expensive Technicolor and on-location shooting in Ireland. Even with Wayne, O'Hara and Barry Fitzgerald committed to do the film, Ford couldn't secure a backer. Republic agreed to finance the film if Ford and his leading actors for the project would first shoot a black-and-white western, the profits from which were expected to offset any loss from the Quiet Man project. In fact, both films, the western "Rio Grande" and the Quiet Man were profitable for Republic

What's in Ireland Left from the Movie?
Besides some small tourist attractions there are not many obvious landmarks remaining from "The Quiet Man." Several shops in Galway City have photographs depicting the actors being outfitted in country tweeds to play their roles. Galway City is the local county seat, with a colorful main street lined with pubs and stores. The salty smell of the bay infects lunchtime appetites and drives travelers to the oyster and seafood restaurants along the pier and the High Street. Galway is a big town in this part of the world, and the motion of its traffic seems to be in a curious balance with an overriding Irish languor in the atmosphere.

To the north of Galway City, on the other side of Loch Corrib, the village of Cong is small and contented. Cong is perhaps more self conscious that it was in the days before it was chosen by Hollywood to represent a postcard image of rural Ireland. Cong has two major intersecting streets that conform to the path of the trout stream that gives the village its name. This glass-clear stream runs along the south edge of the village and the main street rolls down a hill to the stone cross that serves as the central roundabout. Many of the local business run on the lingering fumes of the Quiet Man movie. Reminiscence of 1951 is almost a cottage industry amongst the Cong

Some of the Cong villagers have written accounts of the filming, many of which are still found in Cong shops. If you want to find old filming landmarks you need some local guidance. It's useful to buy a copy of "The

Complete Tour Guide to The Quiet Man Locations" written under government permit by Lisa Collins, an enterprising young Cong woman who apparently operated Quiet Man tours for years. This pamphlet-sized publication is widely available at local tourist shops in Cong. Paddy Rock, a local tour guide and festival organizer who dropped me an e-mail after spotting this page, reports that he charges 150 euros per day per couple for personalized Quiet Man tours. I've not met Paddy in person, nor taken his tour, but he takes an earnest delight in the movie, as well some other local peculiarities, like his involvement in the quest to find County Mayo's heaviest person (here's a link to Paddy's enthusiastic Quiet Man Movie Club website).

Tracking down the movie landmarks takes you conveniently over some of the most scenic countryside in the region. The Castletown train station depicted in the film is virtually intact, but it is in fact 20 miles away from Cong in the real life town of Ballyglunin. Similarly, Leam Bridge exists just outside of Oughterard in a condition almost identical to 1951 (here are some nice images from the region). This is the bridge where Sean Thornton dreams of his youth in the opening scenes of the movie and hears his dead mother's voice describing White O'Morn cottage. The beach where John Ford filmed horseracing scenes is in the costal town of Renvyle in view of Lettergesh Post

Within the town of Cong there is the richest assortment of movie landmarks. Ashford Castle, where the crew and actors lived during filming, is just south of town. Nowadays it is a luxury castle hotel with crenellated towers and a moat. Ashford Castle has only a small role in the actual movie. It is shown as a backdrop to the opening credits. However, the surrounding golf course was used in several scenes, including the climactic sequence when John Wayne drags his movie wife back from the Castletown train station to return her to her family. The fairways are strewn with sheep manure and I doubt Maureen O'Hara was able to rescue her movie costume from that day of filming.

The most obvious movie feature remaining in town is Cohan's Bar, depicted in several scenes. Actually, Cohan's Bar is a shop, not a bar. A sign reading "Cohan's Bar" was put on the exterior of the shop for filming and it is still in place (the interior scenes of the bar were shot on a Hollywood sound stage). The location is much the same as it was at the time of filming. In the center of the intersection in front of Cohan's Bar is a stone cross and roundabout that is depicted in several shots.

Of course, the big tourist draw from the filming of the movie is the actual cottage, White O'Morn, which is the centerpiece for the movie plot. There is a reproduction of the cottage in nearby Maam Cross that is open to tourists. With a bit of research, and a bit of mucky, off-road snooping around, one can find the original cottage near Maam Bridge along the Failmore River. The cottage is next to a single-family house that was built since the filming of the movie, but the house has since been abandoned. The original White O'Morn cottage is in a state of ruin. All that remains on this tufted patch of earth is shaped pile of housing stones. The thatch appears to have gone first, after which water seeped into the 18-inch-thick stone walls and washed out the mortar, peeling off the whitewash as the breakdown progressed season by season. During a visit in July of 2001 there was rumblings that the original cottage would be restored and made into some kind of tourist attraction. However, as recently as June 2003 it was still found crumbling to the ground with no evidence of any construction project. The word is that a Californian has owned the property for 22 years and remains unmoved by requests to sell so the cottage can be restored.

From the Desk of Mayor William Manzi

Debunking Eagle Tribune editorial on early retirement- it does save money

An editorial in the Eagle~Tribune last month called into question the real savings to taxpayers that would come from Methuen's adoption of the early retirement law that the legislature passed as part of the municipal relief package. The editorial is interesting in that it makes some assumptions, and then asks a rhetorical question:

"The retired workers, meanwhile, would be collecting pensions for the rest of their lives — at least three years longer than they would have otherwise. Is that being figured into the projected savings?"

While the editorial does not explicitly say so it appears to assume that the extra three years have not been figured in. And they start the editorial this way:

"So local residents should be skeptical of the claim by Methuen Mayor William Manzi that the city could save \$1.7 million if 39 employees who have expressed interest in early retirement follow through and leave by Nov. 1.

I have attached the same spreadsheet on my website that I provided to the Tribune, so let us now review actual numbers, to see if the editorial skepticism is warranted. Let me first explain what the spreadsheet represents.

The law mandates that I conduct a "survey" of employees to see who might be interested in "early retirement". The spreadsheet represents the total amount of their current salaries, what their pensions would be if they retired standardly, and what the increase is to their pension by

virtue of "early retirement". The spreadsheet shows the aggregate amount of pension benefit. It is important to note that any employee opting for early retirement must pay over to the retirement system all accruals they would have coming under

existing law.(vacation, pension) That number, since it is not yet defined, is not shown on the spreadsheet, but is a major offset to the cost of the increased pension benefit. Another number to consider is the so called "30% rule", which allows the city to replace 30% of the salaries saved through early retirement in the first year after adoption.

So what are we looking at in terms of making the judgement? Lets look at the numbers.

For the purposes of this exercise let us just look at the city side numbers. These are full year numbers. The City would save, in the year of adoption, \$1,705,333.91 in salaries. (Based on those returning the survey). The increase in pension benefit for those opting in would be \$124,768.81. And that increased benefit, in year 1, would likely be entirely



wiped out by the forced givebacks of accruals. So on that basis the early retirement numbers are a no-brainer. But lets look at the numbers in a more comprehensive way. The new "retirees' would be collecting aggregate pen-

sions of \$1,166,605.26. Under the terms of the Tribune reasoning this three year cost to the retirement system would be \$3,499,815. Now that number must be reduced by the overall cost of foregone unemployment (Tribune editorial notes this potential savings) and by the amount of the accruals that the employees would have to give over. Although difficult to quantify here let us assume that the year 1 savings would be \$500,000,(conservative estimate) driving the total three year cost down to about \$2,999,815. The three year savings to the City budget (based on the \$1,705,333 annual salary savings) is \$5,116,002. Hmmmm. Where I come from that is a savings of over \$2 million dollars (American).

What has been left out? Have my numbers been cooked? Should we be skeptical? Aha you say! Mr. Mayor you

have not figured in the 30% allowed under law for the City to "replace" retired salaries!!! Great point. Lets look at that. The law "allows" such replacement, but does not mandate it. I have represented to City Council, per the law, that if replacement did occur, it would only come in the first year after implementation. What that means is that the replacement salaries would only exist for two of the three years in question. Since everyone agrees that one of the benefits to the law is that cities are trying to avoid layoffs and the costs associated with them, it is hard to see how any Mayor would be in a position to utilize the full percentages allowed by the law. I know that I do not intend to do so. But using that 30% number of \$511,600 and assuming the very worst you multiply that by two and you get \$1,022,000, which would then be deducted from the earlier savings shown of \$2 million, and you still get a savings of over \$1 million dollars.

The numbers, I realize, can make your head spin. And the Tribune editorial, I believe, relies on the fact that earlier "municipal early retirement" packages were in fact not great deals for the taxpayers. This package is indeed different, and the numbers show exactly that. Methuen taxpayers are substantially better off by adoption of this legislation, and our implementation of it will prove that.





people that supported us in the primary. I was born on Andover Street (Lawrence), we moved to Howe Road. In 3rd grade, we moved to the corner of Brookfield and Chester St. and that's where I grew up. I graduated from St. Patrick's, graduated from Lawrence High in 1970. I was going to go to Harvard, but at the very last minute, I was accepted to Trinidad State Junior College in Colorado, thank God (laughter)...

In January 1981 I went into the insurance business and that's what I've been doing. Since that day I've never taken a paycheck. 100% of the money that I've earned has been commission dollars. So, I know a little bit about running a business, making mistakes, fixing the mistakes, making the decisions that will hopefully, take you in the right direction.

My fear is that most of the people on Beacon Hill have never done that, (they) have never been in that situation. So, there are things that are going on in this state and as a businessman I say "Look, we've made a lot of mistakes, let's not look back, let's not try to lay blame." In a business situation, you find out who made the mistake, you fire him or her, you wish them well and you move forward, you immediately move forward.

Take the situation in Lawrence, again, don't lay blame on that... (they) made a mistake. Security. So, I think the problems that are haunting the pensions right now are; some of the older people who are in the system have too long been paying 4-5% into the system and that's what is causing the major structural imbalances. The people like myself that are paying 11% and actually, there are some teachers that pay 14% of their salary into the pension system, so those people are actually supporting themselves on that.

Audience Question: On that 11%, are they matching you on any of that?

Torrisi: There is an appropriation from the state budget, yes, but like Social Security...

Audience: But how much are they matching?

Torrisi: I don't know what the exact number is, but (crowd laughing and heckling)

Audience: You've been in for 12 years and you don't know?

Torrisi: No, I don't (crowd laughing and cat calling).. I don't know, but I would like to just say that in Social Security, there is an employee match, like 6.25% and the employer pays the other 6.25%

Changes in the law and possible changes

A short time ago, I wrote in this newspaper that there could be a change in the law in regards to the Natural Accumulation Snow and Ice. Under the law before the case of "Papadopoulas et al Vs. Target Corporation et al, the "natural accumulation rule" which had been recognized since 1883, plaintiffs" (people bringing the suit) were prohibited from suing defendants (people who are sued) for injuries caused by untouched snow and ice on their property. The Supreme Judicial Court held in the above case, that property owners can now be found liable for failing to keep their land free of dangerous snow and ice regardless of whether the condition resulted from natural or unnatural causes.

Judge Gants of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts wrote the opinion for the court which reversed the decision of Superior Court Judge Merita A. Hopkins who had allowed motions of summary judgment saying and relying on the previous case law that held a property owner does not violate the duty of reasonable care by failing to remove natural accumulation of snow and ice and therefore, Judge Hopkins found the plaintiff could not prevail on his negligence

In reversing Judge Hopkins, Judge Gants said the Supreme Judicial Court had decided to do away with natural and unnatural accumulation analysis of snow and ice in premises liability cases. He said "We now abolish the distinction between natural and unnatural accumulations of snow and ice and apply to all hazards arising from snow and ice the same obligation of reasonable care that a property owner owes to lawful visitors regarding all other hazards." The Judge said that the ruling does not place any special burdens on property owners.

"If a property owner knows or reasonably should know of a dangerous condition on its property, whether arising from an accumulation of snow or ice or rust on a railing or a discarded banana peel, the property owners owes a duty to lawful visitors to make reasonable efforts to protect lawful visitors against the danger" he said.

Gants also said the Supreme Court ruling that was handed down would not impose unreasonable maintenance burdens on land owners but instead it would clarify a law that had spawned confusion and conflict in the past. The Court was in fact trying to make these cases easier to understand. As people know, the law was built on cases that took place in the past and a ruling was handed down. They made the law at that the time. As time goes on, case law changes for the good or bad and those earlier cases are modified, overruled, etc.

The Court by Judge Gants went on to say "the snow removal reasonably expected of a property owner will depend on the amount of foot traffic to be anticipated on the property, the magnitude of the risk reasonably feared and burden and expense of ice removal. Therefore, while an owner of a single family home, an apartment home owner or store owner and a nursing home operator each owe lawful visitors to their property a duty of reasonable care what constitutes reasonable snow removal may

vary amount them.

This writer will continue to show in future articles the new cases in the law or how courts apply existing case law.

There are matters which could change law and/or open up a Pandora's Box. Recently, I read an article in a national newspaper where they were talking about an attorney from a New York law firm who turned 70 and worked four decades for the firm was stripped of his financial stake under a policy designed to encourage older partners to retire. Most of the big law firms have some sort of policy similar to said. They seem to be saying this is necessary to make room for younger partners to advance. These firms are worried as industry competition intensifies that younger members are more productive then the older

These mandatory retirements have stood for many years without being challenged. This is starting a debate which is starting to heat up as to how you deal with aging lawyers who want to keep working. We must remember that many years ago, people wanted to retire as life spans were less that they are today. Today, people want to work and do not want to retire. Cases have started and there will be more. One case, the U.S. Equal Opportunity Commission settled a case against a large law firm and the firm had to pay 32 partners \$27.5 million, which many of whom the EEOC said were demoted because of age. The above case of the 70 year old lawyer is in suit accusing the law firm of violating age discrimination laws.

These cases involving lawyers, could be carried over to the large public accounting firms who at earlier ages (i.e. 55 or 65) are told that they must step down from their positions or possibly leave the firm.

Another possible change could be opening up where the Florida Supreme Court has attacked the single member LLC (Limited Liability Company.) In the case, the defendant had several LLC's but only one member. The Eleventh Circuit certified in this case the following question: "Whether pursuant to FLA Stat. ss 608.433 (4) a court may order a judgment –debtors to surrender all right, title and interest in the debtor's single member limited liability company to satisfy an outstanding judgment. This writer is not going to go into the facts of the case but basically open up an area which could change the way we treat Limited Liability Companies at least as far as the sole member company. This case could go across the county and have an impact on other LLC's beyond the sole member. Once you open the door to a case the hole gets bigger. The Court said, "We hold that a court may order a judgment debtor to surrender all right, title and interest in the debtor's single member LLC to satisfy an outstanding judgment". This case was not a unanimous decision as there was opposing opinion however, only time will tell when this case is expanded to include not only sole member Limited Liability Companies. This writer will keep you up to date.

Q – We are reading in the paper that a new reverse mortgage program from HUD called the HECM Saver is now available for seniors. What is that? Peter, Salem NH

A – The HECM Saver was announced late last month by the U.S. Department of Housing and Development (HUD). It will shortly be added to the list of popular Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) products available to senior homeowners 62 years of age and older. The complete product line now includes HECM Standard, HECM Saver, and HECM for Purchase.

The new HECM Saver provides for a major reduction in the upfront mandatory FHA Mortgage Insurance premium.. always the largest cost in upfront HECM fees. This fee, paid directly to FHA, usually equals 50% of overall upfront costs or as much as \$12,500 depending on your appraised home value. Under the new HECM Saver program just announced by HUD, the upfront fee will be reduced to no more than \$62.50. Borrowers will still pay ordinary 3rd party closing costs such as appraisal, title insurance, attorney fees, etc. but the HECM Saver represents a major reduction in overall upfront fees

As with most things, there is a price to pay for the reduced cost. All HECM loans also mandate a mortgage insurance additional fee be paid monthly to FHA. Under HECM Standard reverse mortgage loans, that fee is .5% (.05) added to your mortgage interest rate. HECM Saver loans with the drastically reduced upfront costs will require payment of 1.25% (.0125) added to the mortgage interest rate for FHA mortgage insurance.

Finally, the amount of money borrowers qualify for under the new HECM Saver program is about 15% less than the amount they qualify for under the HECM Standard program.

"I would like to thank Congressman Tsongas and the federal government for providing Methuen with this important grant," Manzi said. "Public safety is of great importance to me and this grant will insure that we have enough officers protecting our city even in these difficult financial times."

The federal funds will provide 100 percent of the approved salary and benefits for entry level officer positions over a three year period.

The funds can be put towards full-time sworn officer positions (including filling existing unfunded vacancies) or for rehired officers who have been laid off, or are scheduled to be laid off on a future date, as a result of budget cuts.

Congressman Tsongas is a strong proponent of the COPS program because of the overwhelming evidence in her district, and across the country, illustrating that it is a program that works and is worthy of receiving federal support.

"COPS has been and continues to be a critical means by which the federal government can provide desperately needed resources to local law enforcement, hiring new police officers, purchasing new technologies, hiring school resource officers to protect our children at school, and building better relationships between law enforcement and our communities," Tsongas added.

"My thanks to former Chief Kathi Lavigne, who oversaw the development and filing of this very competitive grant. I'm grateful to Congressman Tsongas, who has worked time and again to deliver federal resources to Methuen," Mayor Manzi said.

Dracut's Mainstream Media Lost its Integrity and Its Audience

Perhaps the title of this column should be, "The Importance of Studying Several Different Sources Before Making a Decision", but I just found it fascinating at this past June Town Meeting how Dracut's various media outlets and Internet blogs handled a certain warrant article, which I felt should've been given a heck of a lot more publicity prior to the first Monday of June. Warrant Article 20, basically asked Dracut voters if they wished to continue having stipend elected officials eligible to enroll on the Town employees' health insurance coverage as prescribed in Massachusetts General Law 32b. M.G.L. 32b allows individual cities and communities in the State the option of whether it wants to maintain this perk for its stipend elected officials or just eliminate it. In the past couple of years, for example, both Tyngsboro and Chelmsford eliminated this perk for its stipended elected officials. Dracut officials refuse to allow voters a choice, one way or another, on this particular

Reportedly, there are at least three individuals (two current Selectmen and one "retired" Selectman enrolled in this health insurance coverage) exploiting our Town's family health insurance collectively for about \$72,000 per year (\$18,000 per enrollee). This is quite a generous perk for a supposedly voluntary community service, wouldn't you say? Also, the three individuals in question here are probably more financially wealthy than at least 90 percent of Dracut residents. I don't believe any one of them would break a sweat if they had to purchase their family's health insurance coverage privately. Instead, the lowly Dracut taxpayers get stuck footing the bill on this perk for these high-and-mighty privileged politicians. Can you blame them for taking advantage of this perk when the special interests who dominate Dracut Town meeting hand it to

Now, from what I've described thus far, wouldn't you assume that the local media and Internet blogs would get all over this like a snake on you-know-what? Unfortunately, that just wasn't the case.

I hate to toot my own horn, but this issue was the subject of my May column in this

same newspaper. It also got fairly good coverage on the Internet message board, "Dracut After Dark", as well as the local access TV show, "Inside Dracut Politics". Aside from these three entities, this controversial warrant article in that June Town Meeting was one of the best kept secrets in town.

Incidentally, this past June Town Meeting had just barely had a quorum with approximately 250 people in attendance. There was a push to eliminate the elected pols' stipends in an earlier warrant article, which would've automatically killed the perk because that's a requirement to M.G.L. 32b, but that failed because most of the crowd felt that our Selectmen, School Committee members, and Town Moderator were all deserving at least of some financial compensation for their public service. Article 20, however, was taken off the Town Warrant because our Town Attorney claimed that it was illegal. Both Chelmsford and Tyngsboro successfully managed to remove this perk from any of its stipend elected officials to exploit while Dracut, for whatever reason, is stuck with it. Incredible!

Getting back to the media coverage of this warrant article (or lack thereof), The Lowell Sun had to be the most disappointing. Arguably, still the number one source for news and information in Dracut, The Sun did absolutely nothing to promote the importance of this warrant article, or any other aspect surrounding this annual event, for at least 3-4 weeks prior to the June 7th date.

A couple weeks prior to the June Town Meeting, The Sun wrote two different editorials pertaining to Dracut – one calling for the resignation of an elected official, and another pushing for the termination of two town employees – the timeliness of both those commentaries could've easily waited till at least late August since neither one of them were appropriately addressed until months after that Town Meeting. On the weekend just prior to the June Town Meeting, The Sun published a rash of graduation articles from several of the schools in its circulation area. No disrespect to our recent graduates, but couldn't those stories have waited till a couple days afterwards? From a news perspective, where should the priority be



here?

Then, four (4) days AFTER the June Town Meeting (June 11, to be exact), The Sun FINALLY published a wonderful editorial on this issue titled, 'Dracut boards should give up insurance perk'. Funny thing, it seems whenever The Lowell Sun officially endorses a political candidate, it does it 1-2 days BEFORE the election so that the editorial can actually have some relevance and significance behind it. To publish an editorial like that four (4) days AFTER the event, just makes it totally superfluous and irrelevant.

Among the fantastic comments from this aforementioned editorial included:

"...Was the vote truly representative of what most of Dracut's about 31,000 residents want in regard to this issue? We're not convinced. However, if the vote is not a fair representation of residents' wishes, they have only themselves to blame for failing to attend Town Meeting..."

Personally, I would just add to that statement that if Dracut's local newspaper of record – The Lowell Sun – had adequately reported on this particular issue 2-3 times within about a week BEFORE that June Town Meeting took place, there might've been enough people to have shown up and voted to eliminate this perk from ever being an option again. Granted, a lot

of folks are aware that Dracut's annual Town Meetings are scheduled the first Mondays of June and November every year, but unless they know of a passionate, controversial issue(s) that's scheduled to be addressed, they probably won't bother showing up.

I am extremely thankful that we still live in a society, which if one doesn't like the final outcome in most public forums, they can always pursue an appeal to a higher court. In this particular case, the 'higher court' (or next logical step of progression) would be, a referendum ballot question in an upcoming local or statewide election. The way I figure it, at least 20 percent of the registered voters making their decision in a private booth would produce a much better reflection on how Dracut truly feels about this issue as opposed to the just barely one (1) percent who had to literally shout out their vote at this past June Town Meeting. Don't expect the Dracut pols to let this happen.

As for The Lowell Sun, if its coverage of this particular Town Meeting warrant article was a typical example of its best news reporting, then how the heck can anybody – especially the folks of Dracut – take that publication seriously any more?

Author Says: Westford Knight Should Be Preserved

The author of a new book on the Westford Knight warns that the Merrimack Valley could lose its unique piece of Western history if more is not done to protect the rock carving some say proves Scotsmen arrived in the New World a century before Christopher Columbus.

"It is part of the tapestry of history and culture that comprises the Westford community," Haverhill native David Goudsward writes in the preface to his book, The Westford Knight and Henry Sinclair: Evidence of a 14th Century Scottish Voyage to North America. "Yet, there is no attempt to protect the carving from the ravages of time and New England weather.

"Be it Native American, Medieval or even a Gestalt reification, the carved rock ledge off Depot Road has contributed to the historical identity of Westford," Goudsward continues in the book, set for publication in October. "And for that reason alone it should be preserved and cherished as a local landmark."

While under threat by nature, Goudsward argues in his book that the Westford Knight has become so burdened with stories about the mysterious Knights Templar and other Middle Age cults since the Da Vinci Code craze that the exciting true history it may represent has been, sadly, overshadowed.

"This book is an attempt to sweep through the claims and counter claims and present a brief survey of the Westford carving's history and how it went from a local curiosity to controversial evidence of Scottish explorers and how the carving was twisted into 'proof' of secret societies and sacred relics hiding in North America," Goudsward writes.

In what will become the standard text on the history of the Westford Knight, Goudsward recounts the evidence showing that Scottish lord Henry Sinclair led an expedition to Nova Scotia and found his way onto the Merrimack River where one of his company died near what is now Depot Road in Westford.

"The explorers came to the hilltop in Westford where they would leave a full-size effigy of a knight in armor carved on the ledge, a memorial to a fallen comrade from the Gunn Clan," he writes.

Goudsward provides a carefully detailed account of the rediscovery of the Westford Knight in the 1950s, and how in succeeding years, authors strayed from the thoughtful findings of objective researchers into the land of myths.

Goudsward is the author of several books on New England's pre-Columbus European history, including an objective



look at "America's Stonehenge" in New Hampshire and the book titled, "Ancient Stone Sites in New England," an exploration of various rock carving sites around New England indicative of pre-Columbus explorations by Europeans.

They came to Honor Pangi

Last month hundreds of friends supporters and elected officials gathered at the Meadow Creek Golf Club in Dracut to honor the outgoing State Senator Steve Panagiotakos who announced earlier this year that he would not be seeking reelection after 21 consecutive years as an elected official.

Flanked by State Rep. Tommy Golden, Senator Steve Baddour, former Senate President's Tom Birmingham and Robert Travaglini, Lowell City Councilor and former Mayor Rita Mercier, Mayor Ed Bud Caulfield, and dozens of others, Panagiotakos thanked the crowd and talked about the importance of public service.

On November 17, 1978 Panagiotakos' uncle, Lowell Police Officer Christos G Rouses

was killed in the line of duty answering a call at Limby's Drug Store at the corner of Middlesex ad Branch Street. McMahon was the dispatcher who sent Rouses to the call on that dark day.

Panagiotakos accepted the photo and hugged it for a moment before thanking McMahon.

Craig Floyd, President of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington DC flew in special for the event to honor Panagiotakos for his life long dedication to law enforcement. The memorial in our nations capital has the name of every police officer who has ever been killed in the line of duty engraved on two semi-circular walls.

Portions of the proceeds from the event went to the building of the National Law Enforcement Officers Museum.

Floyd said that Law enforcement had no greater friend in the Massachusetts State Senate than Steve Panagiotakos.

"Let me just say that I've had the privilege of serving for ten years as a legislative assistant to US Representative Mario Biaggi. I understand the value of having people in state and national offices who

> care and support our Law enforcement officers. Having someone like [Senator Panagiotakos] in the legislature means a great difference. Because, those men and women are out there putting their lives at risk for our safety and protection, and we need to take care of them. And this State Senator has done that. We are going to miss him here in Massachusetts and this nation needs more people like him who care about the law enforcement professionals in our nation."

Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington DC.



Instead many of them feel alone as if they are the only one. These kids are not alone and they need to know that.

I know from FaceBook, MySpace, Twitter and BylliCrayone.com that I have many gay fans worldwide. I always interact with all my fans and I listen to what they have to say. I gave her my cell number, she called and we talked. She said I was the only one that she felt comfortable with talking to. She's not the only one, many fans of mine hit me up online asking for advice or just need someone to talk to. I have never turned away anyone or ignored anyone. Holding Celebrity status comes with responsibility. I cater to my fans wether it be granting an autograph request or lending an ear to listen to what they have to say. Making records is not the only thing I do. Not the only thing I am known for. I am someone who cares, someone who's been there.

As I sit here writing this, to all the young people I know and love, to all the teens I've never met, to all those in pain, in need of something, some kind of shelter, to all of you who feel terrorized, who feel bullied, who are scared and considering taking your own lives to escape this madness and fear, STOP now and talk to some one anyone, a teacher your Mom and Dad a friend, email ME on any of the above mentioned websites, Let us take your hand, let us help you remember that

YOU are NOT powerless, not helpless that you don't have to be a victim of anyone or anything not even yourself. What makes you different makes you special beautiful it makes you - you. It doesn't matter if you're gay, straight, fat, skinny, tall, short, if you're a jock, geek, brain, cheerleader, in the end you are human, and you are loved.

Suicide is a permanent solution to a temporary problem, Life goes on after high school, and it gets better. But in the mean time ending your life does not end the pain the pain lives on with those you leave behind, those who love you who treasure you as sons, daughters, brothers,

IF you are the target of hate and violence TALK, SPEAK up, we ARE here for you, if you can't tell your parents tell a teacher a cop a councilor you have the right to live without fear, without pain and violence, you have the right to life and love. There ARE people who can and will help you, you do not deserve to be terrorized because of who you are, who you love.

So, please PLEASE reach out to someone...we are listening.

I also have my own SAY NOW (Fan Club) phone line, You can call and talk to me there and/or talk with others who may experience the same thing you are growing through.

And to those of you who use hate and violence against others, are you truly so small, so pathetic and weak that attacking those different from you is the only way you can forget your own insecurity, your own pain. No one in this world is ANY better than ANYONE else. This is a lesson best learned now before you enter a world that will cram this fact down your throat, that who you thought was so great in school means nothing, not a thing in the real world. To the parents and teachers to the media who raise this generation on hate and bigotry take a good long look in the mirror, or better yet take a look at your own child....now imagine them in a 5'6" pine box, see the blood pool they left behind, imagine never seeing them again because some one who hates LIKE YOU, decided your child had no right to live... how does that feel? Tell me....still feel

My heart and prayers go out to the families of the teens who took their lives. Life is a gift from God and no one should be judging anyone, under any circumstance. As the late Tupac Shakur once said "Only God Can Judge Me".

Landing in London

Imagine landing in London's Heathrow airport with a box full of baby chicks, opening up said box and letting the chicks go. That was my experience this summer when I took a small group of students to London in July. In April of 2009, I took a group to Mexico to visit the Mayan ruins of Tulum and Chichen Itza. This summer we were off to Europe to see the areas my students studied while learning about the Middle Ages. Call me crazy, but this is what I do on

There were eight of us in all, two high school freshmen girls I had the previous year, one of their mothers, three boys who just finished eighth grade, my wife and myself. I had never been to London and was very excited to share the experience with my students and wife.

my unpaid vacations.

Our first day was nothing but a blur. We arrived in London about 6:30 a.m. London time, 1:30 a.m. U.S. time. None of us were able to get any sleep on the flight because the seats have been cut down to a miniscule size that even I, a 5-foot tall woman, was uncomfortable. I can't imagine what my 14 year old, six foot three student was subjected to. Once settled into our hotel, we went on a whirlwind foot tour of the city: the Strand, Trafalgar Square, Leicester Square and Covent Garden. In this day of gender equality, people are surprised to hear that I, as a woman, think only men should be priests in the Catholic Church. I am even surprised at times, since I used to be a stereotypical women's libber who thought women should be allowed to do anything men can do. From the theological perspective, one might argue that women can be priests because Jesus was simply following the cultural and religious norms of His time, going along with only men being in leadership positions, not intending His choice to be definitive. Evidence, however, shows that this is not true. In fact, Jesus did just the opposite in matters of justice.

He was countercultural when He needed to be. For example, He ate and socialized with sinners and tax collectors (Mark 2:13-17); He talked in public to the Samaritan woman at the well (John 4:4-42); He healed people on the Sabbath (Mark 3:1-6); and He and His disciples ate without washing their hands (Matthew 15:2). Back then, these acts were forbidden and unheard of, but Jesus performed them anyway.

Therefore, it is not reasonable to conclude that Jesus simply restricted Himself to cultural and religious norms when He instituted the priesthood. No, He had other reasons for choosing men instead of

Some of those reasons can be deduced from looking at the Mass, which is the primary form of worship in the Catholic Church. In the Mass, we believe the bread and wine are changed into the Real Body and the Real Blood of Jesus Christ. It is called Transubstantiation, and it is the remembrance of the Last Supper. It is also the remembrance of Jesus dying on the cross followed by His Resurrection. "This is my body which will be given up for you..." "This is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you...Do this in memory of me." This remembrance is known as a memorial in the Jewish community. (Jesus was Jewish.) In a memorial, t is believed that the event of the past is made present with the event of today. All time exists simultaneously and eternity is accessed. The people in the event today are joined with the people in the event from the past. This means that at each Mass, the priest literally joins Jesus at the Last Supper, on the cross at Calvary, and at His Resurrection. He becomes "another Christ" for his congregation.

It follows, then, that since Jesus was a man, the priest would be a man as well.

Of course, one might argue that this is not necessarily true, because God can supersede gender. We as Catholics, however, believe our bodies are sacred and our genders are purposeful in God's plan here on earth and thereafter. So that argument would not be viable.

Further evidence supports the belief that Jesus did not intend women to be priests. As seen previously, He instituted the priesthood with men even when it was in His power to include women. He also had many women followers and supporters, but He never appointed one of them to be one of the twelve Apostles, who were the first priests. Then there were the many women who assisted the Apostles themselves, but none were ever ordained as priests. Lastly, there was Mary, the mother of Jesus, the Blessed Virgin. She is and has always been considered higher in stature than any man on earth, but Jesus never conferred the priesthood upon her. She was Queen of the Apostles, but she was not one of them.

It is this type of evidence that leads the Catholic Church to conclude that God, not man, mandated an all-male priesthood. Because God mandated it, man cannot change it, and that is one reason why the Church says it is not in Her power to ordain women into the priesthood.

This does not mean that men have all the power in the Catholic Church, or that women are less than. On the contrary, Jesus taught that all roles are equal because they are all meant to be roles of service, not power. The only power involved is the power of God, not the power of an individual or group.

Having said that, I imagine there are duties currently held by priests that women should be carrying out. Those changes need to be made. The core role of the priest, however, which is to be "another Christ" in celebrating the sacraments, should always remain with only men who have been ordained as priests.

Christianity vs. Humanism: A review

I went to a debate the other night between Humanists and Christians sponsored by the Chesterton Society of Worcester on the question of which offers the greater hope for humanity. I was impressed by the good will displayed between both groups, but it wasn't too long before I realized those representing Secular Humanism were not debating Christianity, but rather distortions of it. They rattled off several fundamentalist ideas they found unreasonable, such as hostility to the environment, the vengeful attitude displayed after 9/11, the world being 6000 years old, and everyone going to hell who doesn't explicitly believe in Jesus. A lady in the audience also brought up the Calvinist claim that everything is pre-determined including one's eternal destiny. But those representing Christianity that night were Catholics and would also reject those things. I have often found that those who reject the Catholic Church usually aren't rejecting Catholicism at all, but a false image or representation of it.

I came to realize the difference between the two sides was not these common misconceptions, but something more basic. One side respected reason as a way to attain truth and so did the other. One side had a love for the scientific method and so did the other. But one side recognized something more than these two avenues to the truth. For the Christian, faith is added. Faith in authority, which is common to all people, is extended to the ultimate Authority who has revealed Himself to restore our relationship. The humanists would readily trust human authorities but were not willing to look to any transcendent Source. This is a considerable difference.

The Garden of Eden story in Genesis speaks of a great rebellion at the beginning of history called original sin where personified evil in the form of a serpent offered man his ultimate seduction: Reject God and become your own ultimate authorities. That seduction echoes throughout history and although it leads to death secular humanism embraces it.

The Humanists considered their position to be the humble non-elitist one because they claim not to have received any special revelation from above. But I would challenge that on two counts:

1. They were certain that supernatural claims are make-believe. But how could someone know this, for such knowledge would transcend the limits of reason and science? It is like a fish claiming to be certain there is no reality outside of his experience of ocean life. A foolish claim.

2. Secular humanism claims man to be his own ultimate authority, his own god; that he can create his own truth according to his liking (as we have seen with the definition of marriage and the beginning of life). This seems considerably less humble than recognizing and submitting to One higher than oneself.

So why do Christians believe that this supernatural realm does exist? The onus would actually be on Humanism to prove that it doesn't. Religion and language are two universal traits that separate humans from all the other animals. They are "hardwired" into human nature signifying an immaterial spiritual component to the human person that can grasp immaterial things like thoughts and ideas. Children and primitive tribes have always had the sense of the supernatural and an innate propensity for symbolic language. We

On Probation in Massachusetts: a lethal mix of ideology and corruption

But for the involvement of a passerby, Debbie (not her real name) would most likely have died from the stab wounds.

She counted 26 in all, including 17 in her neck. One ear was left dangling, and her hands were shredded, but she lived. She lived to work and marry and have children and to campaign for victims' rights and to do what she can to prevent a repeat of what happened to her.

That is getting harder all the time.

Her attacker, Richard Potter, has moved to a place called Bullhead City, on the Arizona side of its junction with Nevada and California. If you want to check out his picture and profile, Arizona maintains an online database of ex-convicts such as Potter, deemed Level 3 High Risk for his crimes in Massachusetts.

It's something, if not perfect. In the space where inquiring minds would go to find out where Potter was convicted, it says, "Norfold County," instead of Norfolk, which could be a problem down the road.

In any event, Debbie is worried for Bullhead City. "He likes the knife," she told us in a recent telephone interview. "Someone out there is going to die, because he has about 30 years of pent-up rage, and there's nothing to stop him from letting it out."

While she is glad to have the distance between them, Debbie is just as concerned that an unsuspecting community might be next. It is a frighteningly common theme, Massachusetts exporting its once-wanted unwanteds, only to read about them later.

Even as sex abuse experts acknowledge that rehabilitation is a dream-based objective, and that re-offending is a matter of time, the state's criminal recording system is re-jiggered to the point where people convicted of violent crimes are lumped in with people who smoked a joint or forgot to pay a fine.

Meanwhile, the Sex Offender Registry Board is forever playing catch-up with its job of locating and classifying all deserving candidates, a number in the thousands, including many who list their addresses as homeless.

One high risk offender, Ralph Goodwin, made headlines recently for winning the right to not wear a GPS because his crime (child kidnapping and rape) pre-dated the technology. But Ralph was his own worst enemy. He got lugged back in a possible violation of his probation, which means now they might be able to skip the bracelet and get him right back into jail. We'll see. It won't help him that a media horde is likely to attend his surrender hearing.

Another cautionary tale is told in the story of Michael Houle, the 30-year old Chicopee man who got caught downloading child pornography at the public library, received probation for his crime in June, and while on probation grabbed and raped a neighbor's child in the woods.

It has gotten to the point these days, with so many violent sex offenders out on the street, that sex offender neighborhoods are popping up, areas that conform to probationary terms by being a safe distance from schools and libraries, near other men with similar backgrounds.

Concentrations of registered Level 3 sex offenders can be gleaned from a cursory survey of websites maintained by police departments, which show disproportionate populations in Lowell and Brockton, for example, compared to similarly-sized cities nearby.





State foreclosure law improvement is focus of MBA task force

Boston, MA – The Massachusetts Bar Association announces the formation of the Joint Foreclosure Legislation Task Force, which strives to improve both the state's foreclosure law and borrowers' access to assistance in the foreclosure process. A collaboration among bar associations, legal services, real estate attorneys and banker's associations, the task force plans to draft a legislative proposal to modernize foreclosure law in Massachusetts and ensure a fair and efficient foreclosure process.

"The development of this task force comes at a critical time when many Massachusetts residents are struggling to stay in their homes," MBA President Denise Squillante said. "The MBA hopes this new effort will result in a more streamlined foreclosure process in Massachusetts — making it easier for both homeowners and their attorneys to navigate the system."

The task force includes representatives from the MBA's Property Law and Access to Justice sections, as well as the Real Estate Bar Association of Massachusetts, the Mass. Bankers Association, the Mass. Mortgage Bankers Association, Western Massachusetts Legal Services, and other real estate practitioners.

"Piecemeal changes to the state's mortgage foreclosure laws over the years have created a foreclosure process that is incomprehensible to borrowers and disruptive to lenders trying to comply with the law," said Beth Barton, task force chair and vice chair of the MBA's Property Law Section. "The task force strives to build a clear, open and understandable foreclosure process, from the ground up, which will benefit both homeowners and lenders."

In conjunction with the task force, the MBA has formed the Foreclosure Education Committee to teach attorneys how to counsel and advocate for individuals facing foreclosure. The free education program will kick off on Oct. 28 with a seminar covering changes in foreclosure laws. The program will also be available via MBA On Demand, an innovative approach to continuing legal education that allows users to watch programming from the comfort of their home or office. Seminars to follow will cover topics that include HAMP Loan Modifications, Alternatives to Foreclosure and others.

The task force will be led by: Chair Elizabeth J. Barton, Vice chair of the MBA Property law Section Council,

Osteoporosis... Part II

Last month we learned about causes, risk factors and symptoms of osteoporosis.

In this brief presentation we continue our discussion sharing available testing and treatment finishing with some pearls on how to prevent the disease.

It's highly recommended to be prepared for your doctor's appointment by having questions to ask, prepared list of medications and listing any symptoms or some recent health changes.

Your doctor may ask:

- -Have you experienced any fractures or
- broken bones? -Have you noticed a loss of height? -How is your diet? Do you think you get
- enough calcium? Vitamin D? -Do you take any vitamins or supple-
- ments?
- -How often do you exercise?
- -Did you exercise more or less in the past? -Does anyone in your family have osteo-
- -Have you taken corticosteroid medications (prednisone, cortisone) as pills, injections, suppositories or creams?

* Bone Density Test:

Doctors commonly diagnose osteoporosis by measuring bone density. The best screening test is dual energy X-ray absorptiometry (DXA). This procedure is quick, simple, painless and gives accurate

It measures the density of bones in your spine, hip and wrist — the areas most likely to be affected by osteoporosis and it's used to accurately follow changes in these bones over time.

* Treatments and drugs

Treatment for osteoporosis focuses on slowing down or stopping the mineral loss, increasing bone density, preventing bone fractures, and controlling the pain associated with the disease.

Some 40% of women will experience a broken bone (fracture) due to osteoporosis during their lifetime. In those who have

a vertebral fracture (in their back), one in five will suffer another vertebral fracture within one year. This condition potentially leads to more fractures. The goal of treatment is to prevent fractures.

Diet: Young adults should be encouraged to achieve normal peak bone mass by getting enough calcium (1,000 mg daily) in their diet (drinking milk or calcium-fortified orange juice and eating foods high in calcium such as salmon), performing weight-bearing exercise such as walking or aerobics (swimming is aerobic but not weight-bearing), and maintaining normal body weight.

Exercise: Lifestyle modification should also be incorporated into your treatment. Regular exercise can reduce the likelihood of bone fractures associated with osteopo-

Studies show that exercises requiring muscle to pull on bones causes the bones to retain, and perhaps even gain, density.

Researchers found that women who walk a mile a day have four to seven more vears of bone in reserve than women who don't.

Some of the recommended exercises include weight-bearing exercise, riding stationary bicycles, using rowing machines, walking, and jogging.

Before beginning any exercise program, make sure to review your plan with your doctor.

MEDICATIONS:

A number of medications are available to help slow bone loss and maintain bone mass, including:

* Bisphosphonates. Much like estrogen,

Treatment for Degenerative Discs and Spinal Disc Herniation

Non-Surgical Spinal Decompression is a revolutionary new technology used primarily to treat disc injuries in the neck and in the low back. This treatment option is very safe and utilizes FDA cleared equipment to apply distraction forces to spinal structures in a precise and graduated manner. Distraction is offset by cycles of partial relaxation. This technique of spinal decompression therapy, that is, unloading due to distraction and positioning, has shown the ability to gently separate the vertebrae from each other, creating a vacuum inside the discs that we are targeting. This "vacuum effect" is also known as negative intra-discal pressure.

The negative pressure may induce the retraction of the herniated or bulging disc into the inside of the disc, and off the nerve root, thecal sac, or both. It happens only microscopically each time, but cumulatively, over six to eight weeks, the results are quite dramatic.

The cycles of decompression and partial relaxation, over a series of visits, promote the diffusion of 1. water 2. oxygen and 3. nutrient-rich fluids from the outside of the discs to the inside. These nutrients enable the torn and degenerated disc fibers to begin to heal.

For the low back, the patient lies com-

fortably on his/her back or stomach on the decompression table, with a set of nicely padded straps snug around the waist and another set around the lower chest. For the neck, the patient lies comfortably on his/ her back with a pair of soft rubber pads behind the neck. Many patients enjoy the treatment, as it is usually quite comfortable and well tolerated.

Non-Surgical Spinal Decompression is very effective at treating bulging discs, herniated discs, pinched nerves, sciatica, radiating arm pain, degenerative disc disease, leg pain, and facet syndromes. Proper patient screening is imperative and only the best candidates are accepted for

Fall... the other season of sneezing is here!

When most people think of allergies the first thoughts that usually come to mind is either springtime or end of summer ragweed season. But Fall truly is the OTHER allergy season.

October is the month in New England when the temperatures will cool off and leaves turn colors. But make no mistake about it: while fall is the time when we think of Halloween pumpkins and Thanksgiving turkeys it is also when seasonal allergies begin to act up.

The major culprit of sneezing and itchy eyes, noses and ears is weed pollen, particularly lingering ragweed pollen. Mold spores are also often at their highest levels. There are some things you can do to relieve fall allergies, but keep in mind that some allergies are simply genetics. If you or you're child have severe allergies this season, keep in mind that heredity is a key factor in the development of allergies. If you or your spouse have seasonal allergies, chances are good that your children will, too.

A Few Tips for Those Who Suffer From Fall Allergies:

Know Before Going-Check your area's pollen count daily. You can do this through many TV stations and online. You can also check at New England Allergy's website, http://newenglandallergy. com/levels.php, which is updated every day with pollen and mold counts. Stay inside on dry windy days as the count is usually considerably higher.

Delegate Work To Others -Leave the yard work to others. Have someone do your weeding and landscaping chores for you so there is no standing water, as mold spores can also cause problems. If you must do yard work or if your garden brings you joy, be sure to wear a mask while outdoors. Change clothes immediately after coming inside and shower immediately to remove any pollen that may



have attached while outdoors.

Keep It Inside-Minimize the exchange between inside and outside air. You can do this by keeping windows and doors closed, and use air conditioning or heat to keep temperatures comfortable. Avoid using whole house fans that pull air from outside.

Control the Cause- You can't control what's outside but you can control the pollen count indoors. Continuous filtration of your air with a high efficiency particle arresting air purifier can greatly reduce the amount of airborne pollen in your home. Because this type of filtration is also designed to remove airborne particulates that are extremely small, it will also take out other allergy triggers such as dust, mold spores and pet dander.

Consult your local physician for more on how to prevent fall allergies and how to be prepared for this allergy season.



State school board loses independence

In November 2006, Governor Romney appointed me to the nine-member Massachusetts Board of Education. In January 2008, the Legislature passed Gov. Deval Patrick's bill establishing a cabinetlevel secretary of education position and expanding the board to eleven members. The bill specifically shortened my term, but three-and-a-half years were enough to discern the effects of the 2008 changes.

In 2003, in testimony against the creation of a similar cabinet-level education position, Paul Reville, then director of the Center for Education Research and Policy at MassINC, warned that an education secretariat...seems to create "three masters" for the commissioner of education: the governor, the secretary of education, and the board of education.

How wrong he was. The secretary position, to which Gov. Patrick appointed Reville, did not create confusion. It instead created one boss for the commissioner: the secretary, who oversees the budgets and policies of the three state education agencies. The secretary is also a voting member of the boards of early education and care, elementary and secondary education, and higher education.

The expansion of the K-12 board included in the 2008 law was the key to minimizing independent thinking because it altered the terms of existing members and allowed Patrick to make appointments that gave him immediate control of

To avert potential power struggles between a new secretary and the board chair (whom the governor already had the power to appoint), Gov. Patrick appointed someone who could make meetings run on time but was without political ambitions. Indeed, Reville's position at board meetings came to symbolize his role; Commissioner Mitchell Chester was sandwiched between him and the chair, Maura Banta, at the head table. The board's union representative was on the other side of Banta. Not much wiggle room for the commissioner.

The first clear sign that the governor's office, not the board, was the commissioner's boss was Chester's 2008 appointment of former Lowell Superintendent Karla Baehr as a second deputy commissioner. Baehr was the Patrick administration's choice for commissioner when the board for other reasons chose Chester.

Since spring 2008, the board has voted on few significant policies. Indeed, when asked to note for the 2009 summer retreat what important decisions they had made in the previous year, hardly anyone could think of one. Meeting agendas have largely been determined by the secretary and commissioner, with no board input desired. At the 2008 summer retreat, Secretary Reville told the board directly that meetings would be too long if every topic members wanted discussed was added to the agenda.

Because administration control of the board was so complete, policy discussion was minimal. Reville didn't need to ask many questions; Banta usually asked

Even when the board finally did consider a significant issue - whether to adopt still-evolving national standards - there was little discussion. Board members knew they would vote to adopt them no matter what condition they were in. The draft copy of the standards included in an appendix of the commonwealth's January application for federal funds was so inferior it had to be completely revised before it could be released for public comment. The chair was the only board member who saw that application before it was sent, and no questions were raised about it after my request for a copy and hard copies were then sent to all board members.

With Patrick's June 2010 decision not to reappoint Tom Fortmann and me, the two remaining Romney appointees, the board has become little more than a facade to satisfy the statute requiring a citizen board to oversee the department of education.

The ostensible results of the 2008 legislation have been exactly as intended - complete control of the state's educational agenda by the Executive Office of Education, with minimal public discus-

By appointing a board with a strong commitment to the governor but little understanding of K-12 education, the administration has prevented not just the public but its own officials from learning about flaws in their policies. The next bill for that hubris comes due when Massachusetts begins to implement the inferior national standards and high school students deemed "college-ready" by state tests based on those standards fail their college courses.

Get Rid of Calculators

In my experience teaching college freshmen, my sense is that the average level of academic rigor in our public schools has fallen significantly

Even in wealthy communities, only a fraction of parents are aware of the academic failure of their children. There are numerous examples of this decline: From the elimination of the study of grammar in English and proof-based geometry to the introduction of inquiry-based learning in science and the ubiquitous use

over the past five decades.

of calculators. Today, all but the most elite colleges and universities have been forced to make a major commitment to remedial programs for entering freshmen in both mathematics and the language arts. Many, if not most, students who are in need of such help fall by the wayside despite such commitments.

Tutoring is the parental response to this failure. There are very few Kumon or Sylvan learning centers in poor areas. Even in wealthy communities, only a fraction of parents are aware of the academic failure of their children – at least partially because of rampant grade inflation.

The problem stems from a lack of competition in education. The inability of parents and students to vote with their feet -- and

> dollars -- makes them prisoners of policies that have steadily ratcheted up to serve the educational institutions rather than the children.

My prescription for improving mathematics education would include eliminating the use of calculators, ensuring that elementary math teachers are truly proficient in mathematics through Algebra II, requiring students to demonstrate proficiency in the core

mathematics disciplines before moving into non-core topics like statistics, and returning to proof-based geometry.

Ultimately, the solution to the problem rests on the introduction of choice and competition in education. And, if schools can offer higher quality education to their students, then parents will not have to turn to tutoring.

Afghanistan.... What Infrastructure?

I used to own a factory in Afghanistan in the 1970's. I co-incidentally happened to be in Kabul at the Then Sheraton Hotel when the rebel army backed by the Russian Regular forces rolled into town at about 6:00AM. They drove their tanks onto the streets and that was what woke us (the hotel residents) up – the roar of the metal belts of the tanks on the paved roads in Downtown Kabul. I got a call from my partner, an Afghani guy named Mohammed Bhaktari. He suggested that I immediately leave the Sheraton Hotel and move in with him and his family outside the city as the rebels were going to be very aggressive and he did not want them to find an American Citizen, namely me, in the Sheraton.

Across the hallway resided a French journalist who was writing about ancient artifacts and antiquities. He was extremely afraid about what was transpiring, so I decided to take him along with me as well. The next four days were not good at all. We were self imprisoned and we were extremely unhappy. However the news was not good about what was going on

in Kabul and so we hunkered down and stayed put. We heard that Doud (the then President of Afghanistan) and his family were all executed to the last member, an 18 months old.

On the fifth morning Bhaktari came with great news - Pan Am had scheduled a flight to New Delhi, and I was a Pan Am ticket holder! There was one glitch though as is often the case. We had a 40 mile ride to the airport and there would be armed check posts that we would have to pass through. I sported a French beard and shoulder length hair and could pass for a Muslim. The Frenchman however was dithering with a serious does of honest fear. Anyway we proceeded to the airport. We passed two check posts that were manned by armed men with AK-47 Assault rifles that looked uneducated and crazed. At the first road block, they wanted to know who the white man was I understand Pashto but don't speak it. They checked his passport and then turned to me and asked the driver (Bhaktari), "who is this guy"? He said he is from India and was visiting from New Delhi. One of the militia talked to me in Urdu and I replied in fluent Urdu, which satisfied them and we proceeded "PHEW"!

We finally made it to the airport and

there was a huge sigh of relief. I told Bhaktari to stay till the flight took off, in case we needed a ride back to his house. We proceed to the authorities and now I was a bit nervous as to what they would say when they saw my U. S. passport. However, the authorities were afghan rebels and not the civil servants that usually run airport services. They asked us to fill the forms (which we found out very soon, they could not read) and then looked at it and handed it back to us – what a joke! I put my departure papers in the inside pocket of my navy Yves St. Laurent Blazer and proceeded to the gate without showing them my passport – man! That was the only time in my life, I was overjoyed by complete incompetence.

Aboard the Boeing 747 the Pilot advised all the passengers not to celebrate till we left Afghan airspace. This was because there was a possibility that we would not take-off or be even commanded to return after take-off. So needless to say, the mood was very sober. After we crossed the Kandahar mountain range we left Afghan airspace and there was pure jubilation on board that aircraft!

The reason I narrated that story was for credibility. I have made numerous trips to Afghanistan and know the region and the culture fairly well. I want to state unequivocally that Afghanistan never had any infrastructure other than some rudimentary Roads, an archaic Post & Telegraph system, running water and electricity in very few urban areas etc.

Now when Hamid Karzai was made the president of Afghanistan (actually just Mayor of Kabul for all intents and purposes) one of the first things the US Government did was allot an initial 8.5 billion dollars to re-build Afghanistan's infrastructure that was destroyed by the US bombing. I ask this simple question: "What infrastructure"? 





How to make your Outdoor Cat a Happy Indoor Cat

With the long winter days nearly upon us, come the cold breezes, snow falling and below zero nights. Living in the Merrimack Valley we all know how cold, cold can truly be. As we all cuddle up by our fire places or snuggle under one of our favorite blankets, let's not forget our little furry friends.

I heard from a friend of mine the other day and we had a conversation regarding how to transition cats indoors during this season. Dogs are easy, we let them out, them come back in. However, sometimes cats can be a little more of a challenge. They are very independent by nature and some think they are as durable as a lion. Beth from the Coalition to Protect and Rescue Pets, gave me this pamphlet and I asked if I could pass this along to our readers. Hopefully, these tips will help you to provide a safe and healthy winter environment for your feline.

Don't let your kitten out: She won't miss what she doesn't know. But even adult cats can adapt to the Great Indoors. The key is to provide attention, exercise, mental stimulation...and love.

Timing **The easiest time to transition your cat is during the winter, when she'd rather be inside anyway. But cats can adapt any season. Some people transition their cats gradually, bringing them in for increasingly longer stays. Others bring the cat in and shut the door for good.

TLC **The aloof feline is a myth: Domestic cats need human companionship.

An outdoor cat will welcome life indoors if she gets enough attention and play. Many also enjoy the company of a compatible cat or dog. Consider adopting another pet. Your vet or shelter can advise you on "breaking the ice."

Shake It Up **Shake a can filled with coins or marbles when your cat meows at the door. Or try a remote device so

kitty doesn't associate you with the noise that startled him.

The Fix **Spaying or neutering your cat at the appropriate age will reduce kitty's wan-

derlust—and prevent the tragedy of more unwanted, homeless cats.

Fun and Fitness **Play with your cat! Interactive toys, such as a pole and attached line with fabric or feathers at the end, are fun for your cat and provide a bonding experience for both of you.

**Hide toys around the house so your cat can hunt for "prey." Be sure they're not small enough to be swallowed.

**Paper bags (without the handles) and cardboard boxes help satisfy your cat's need to explore. Move them every few days so she can conquer new territory.

**Multilevel cat condos and trees are as much fun to climb as the backyard maple.

**Posts, corrugated cardboard or sisal rope give kitty better things to scratch than your furniture; praise him for using them. Claw caps-or just keeping claws trimmed-will help too. Or try a boundary spray that will let your cat know the area is off-limits. Don't declaw: It's amputation of the toes to the first knuckle that can cause behavioral and physical problems. (So can tenectomy, the other surgical "fix" for normal cat behavior.) If your cat ever does get out, he'll be unable to protect himself or climb to safety. How cruel is

Outside In **Providing fresh greens lets your cat graze safely instead of munching on houseplants. You can get kits complete with containers and seeds or plant



pesticide-free alfalfa, grass, or catnip in your own container. Try cooked string beans or

peas (cooled); many cats love them. **Give your cat a

bird's eye view. You can buy a comfy window seat if you want, but any access to a windowsill will do. Make sure screens

**Treat your cat to a special "kitty video" of scampering wildlife. Some cats even enjoy watching cartoons or Sesame Street. Oprah, well, not so much.

The Safe Outdoors

**An outdoor covered enclosure or run that your cat can access through a window or pet door gives her the best of both worlds: fresh air and safety. Screened porches are another option. Make the space even more fun by adding tree limbs, multilevel cat condos, hanging tires, boxes, grass and toys. You can find cat enclosures—and instructions for making one yourself-online.

Walk This Way **Consider leashtraining your cat for outdoor walks; attach the leash to a harness. She may resist at first, but most eventually will accept this. Never leave your cat outside unsupervised while on a leash. With covotes and other predators everywhere these days, that isn't a good idea for dogs either.

Litter Box Training **Confine your cat to one room, preferably without absorbent surfaces. When she is using the litter box regularly, let her out under your supervision; eventually let her explore unsupervised. Scoop the box often, or she may not want to use it. Can you blame her?

Ask the Experts **Your local shelter can provide more advice. Or ask your veterinarian for a referral to a cat behaviorist.

Don't Give Up **Some cats may develop behavioral problems if the change in routine is too abrupt. You can fix that. Keep working on your "transition plan," giving your cat TLC and praise. Be

Michael Vick: still NO HERO

It's officially football season and every Sunday and Monday night is probably blocked off on your calendar until the last weekend of January.

For some it is tailgating in parking lots, and for others it is sitting around your living room watching the game and for a few it may even be hopping on a plane to see your favorite team play away. As I did for 10yrs. A group of friends and I faithfully flew around the country to see the Patriots play in other stadiums. The year we went to Atlanta, guess who was injured? No loss actually!! I'm glad now I didn't spend my hard earned money to see "the man" who had all this hype, "the man" that was predicted to produce untouchable numbers, "the man" that was the key to winning against the Patriots. He was on the bench. No play time, no publicity, and no stats to pump up his value. Yes, I am speaking about the overly rated Michael Vick. (The Pats won that game)

Last weekend, September 26 2010, week 3 of the NFL season Michael Vick was all over the news. He pulled in some great numbers as he went 17-of-31 for 291 yards, passed for three touchdowns, rushed for 30 yards and a touchdown during the Eagles' win over the Jaguars. These statistics are nothing but the numbers that represent a player on a field. These numbers do not represent the person Michael Vick is nor do they represent the character of the person he will always be. For that we need to look at some different stats:

Note** 70 dogs were seized from Vicks property all had physical injuries and/or were emotionally traumatized.

Public Records show the following:

The federal court filings of July 2 alleged that Vick's property was used as the "main staging area for housing and training the pit bulls involved in the dog fighting venture."

July 17 indictments

On July 17, a federal grand jury indicted Vick and 3 others on multiple counts, stating that Vick and three other men spent six years

"knowingly sponsoring and exhibiting in an animal fighting venture." The grand jury also charged the men with establishing a kennel to represent dog fighting competitions, purchase and train pit bulls in dog fighting competitions and "destroying or otherwise disposing of dogs not selected to stay with the ongoing animal fighting venture."

Detention and arraignment hearing, bail conditions On July 26, all four pleaded "not guilty" to all of the charges against them during a hearing, and a trial date was set for November 26.

Vick prepared statement: Vick issued a prepared statement through his lawyer in which he proclaimed his innocence. Atlanta Falcons owner Arthur Blank stated that Vick had to give up any thoughts of playing until the case is resolved.

Vick pleads guilty: On August 20, 2007 Vick plead guilty to the federal felony dog fighting conspiracy

On August 24, 2007 it was announced that Vick had signed a plea agreement and issued a statement admitting his participation and funding of the dog fighting ring, but maintaining that he did not place any bets or take any prize money

On August 27, Vick appeared before Judge Hudson, submitted the guilty plea, and was given a sentencing date of December 10.

Sentencing: Vick was sentenced to 23 months in prison on the federal charges

on December 10, 2007.

Disposition of property

The property used in the operation, 1915 Moonlight Road, was forfeited by Vick.

Now these are some stats that will go down in history!

Ironically, the season we retired our trip, I still hopped on that plane. Although my destination was a much different location. It wasn't a stadium of football fans; it was an animal sanctuary in Kanab Utah. Yes. I went to Best Friends Animal Sanctuary to see the twenty four most victimized and traumatized dogs from Michael Vicks ring. They were brought to this facility for complete rehabilitation and with the hopes to be adopted someday. Animals of this level of abuse have a lot of challenges to over come and need specialized training and attention for their rehabilitation to be successful. (For more details please visit bestfriends.org for a list of their stories.) What I saw was unexplainable. How Michael Vick can sleep at night amazes me, how this man has a conscience surprises me, however thank God over and over for

this wonderful facility. Years later many of the dogs are still there, a few have been adopted and more are now in foster homes waiting for the right home. But it took a group of very special people with an amazing love for animals to help these dogs to learn to trust again. Having worked with abused animals and currently a proud owner of a rescue dog, I can tell you this takes many hours and a lot of patience. Trust isn't something that is taught it is earned. The staff at Best Friends worked endlessly to help these dogs be able to become dogs again. Remember, these dogs never had the life of a dog. They only lived in a crate and were thrown into the ring to fight. There were no social skills ever developed. Best Friends literally helped these dogs learn to be dogs.

As Best Friends will tell you these dogs are no longer victims of Michael Vick, they are VICTORI-OUS over him. They are now known as the "Vick-

I have to ask you all, next Sunday when Michael Vick's name is mentioned all over the news, please don't glamorize him, please remember the person behind the player and the man he truly is. He is NO HERO!



Spaying and neutering is so important

Spaying and neutering has become "the norm" for today's pet owners, but how many of you do it because it's "the right thing to do" and don't really know why it is the right thing to do? For anyone that does not know or has yet to have their dog or cat fixed, I hope this article will provide good reason.

Every day there are thousands of dogs and cats dying in shelters around the US. Spaying and Neutering not

only provides health benefi but it drastically helps to re duce the number of unwan cats and dogs that are born every year.

Did you know that dogs that are fixed will have an average life increase of 1 to 3 years and cats that are fixed have an average increase of 3 to 5 years? That alone should make the decision a simple one.

Let's discuss many of the benefits of spaying (which is for females).

First of all, if you can, get your dog spayed as early as your vet will allow; most vets will spay anytime after 8 weeks old.

If you prefer to wait a little bit, try and get it done before your dog has its first heat cycle. If your dog is spayed, there are many negatives that you will avoid. Your dog will not have a heat cycle; therefore male dogs will not be attracted to your female dog.

The dog will have less of a desire to roam, therefore keeping your dog safe. And this is the biggest one for me: the risk of mammary gland tumors. As a result of the spaying, ovarian and uterine cancer is reduced or eliminated, especially if done before the first head cycle. The facts make the correct decision clear: if you can prevent or at least reduce the risk of your dog having certain cancers, why the heck wouldn't you?

So now let's talk about neutering. Let's get one thing straight...for all the guys who read this article and have male dogs...when you get your dog neutered, you are getting your dog neutered. You are not the one on the operating table. I hate when I hear people say "it will change his personality" or "he's going to be a different

dog" or "that procedure would hurt so much". It doesn't hurt and your dog will only change for the better! His personality won't change, he's just going to be healthier in the long run. Ok, now that we have that figured out, let's talk about the benefits. Neutering your pet reduces or completely eliminates the risk of spraying or marking. We've all been witness to those male dogs and cats that lift there legs whenever they so choose. Well that behavior can stop, with a simple little snip. There is also less of a desire to roam, which

means that there is a decrease in the chance of your pet getting hit by a car, stolen, or in a fight with another animal. Even if you think that your dog will never get out or leave your sight, why take the chance? No one plans for an accident, but they happen. I have two indoor cats and they are both fixed. I never plan on them getting out, they live quite a great life in the safety of my

house, but I don't want to risk it, and I realize the significant health benefits that come along with sterilization. Another rbenefit is that the potential risk of testicular cancer is eliminated and it decreases the risk of prostate disease. Neutering also produces a decrease in aggressive behavior like dog bites. And once again, just like spaying, it reduces the number of unwanted kittens and puppies. An unaltered male cat can produce hundreds of kittens per year. Walk into any animal shelter and you will see that there is NO shortage of cats and kittens!

It is extremely frustrating to walk down the street and see an "intact" male dog walking in front of me. Not only is it disgusting to look at but it is disappointing that people are still uneducated about the benefits of spaying and neutering, and the importance of reducing the population of dogs and cats. I believe that neglecting to get your pet fixed for breeding purposes is selfish and cruel. There are just too many unwanted dogs dying every day in shelters. Be responsible. If you breed your dog, you are taking the potential homes away from dogs in shelters that have been waiting for them, and you may even be taking away their lives..

There are many low cost spay/neuter

clinics. If you can't afford to have the procedure done at your vet, look for one of these clinics. Remember, fixing your pet is a decision that responsible pet owners make. If you can not afford to have this procedure done, please think twice before getting a pet. They aren't cheap. Vet bills, food, etc. add up so make sure you have the means to provide all the necessities for your pet before you take on into your home.

Furthermore, have you ever thought about who pays for stray animals? Are you a taxpayer? Then it's you who pays! To capture, house, and eventually "destroy" a stray dog or cat costs money - billions of dollars every year. Many stray animals have rabies and other diseases. We need to make an effort to help control the number of strays on the streets.

I'm part of an online dog rescue group in which we help arrange for transport of homeless dogs. One lady's comment resonated with me. Elana said, "the day my inbox is not filled with pleas for transport and rescue from kill shelters is the day that I MIGHT believe that there is a potential shortage of shelter pets." So

remember, in addition to fixing your pets please remember to adopt, not shop. If you don't have a dog or cat but would like to help, then spread the word about how important spaying and neutering is. You can also make a donation to a local shelter, rescue or clinic and ask that the money be used to pay for a spay/neuter procedure on a homeless animal. If you are interested in contacting a clinic, just type in "low cost spay/neuter clinic in MA" in your search engine and a list will come up.

The bottom line is simple: spaying and neutering helps dogs and cats live longer, healthier lives. It is only appropriate to end with the legendary sign-off made popular by the retired Price is Right host Bob Barker: Help control the pet population. Have your pet spayed or neutered.

Reward yourself with Aztec Two-Step "The elegant folk group," at the Firehouse

NEWBURYPORT - When Rex Fowler and Neal Shulman, the critically acclaimed duo known as Aztec Two-Step, burst onto the scene in 1972 with their Elektra Records debut, they were reviewed as having the "intellectual lyricism" and "ethereal harmonies" of their legendary predecessors, Simon & Garfunkel. Jack Holzman, founder of Elektra Records called the pair "the elegant folk group" and insisted they join the recording company's impressive stable of rock legends.

Now, elegance arrives at the Firehouse Center for the Arts, Market Square, Newburyport, MA on Friday, October 15 at 8pm when Aztec Two-Step, one of acoustic music's most respected and enduring acts, will perform. Tickets are \$32 for Students, Seniors and Members and \$34 for Adults and may be purchased at the Box Office by calling 978/462-7336 or online at www.firehouse.org.

In the years that followed their musical debut, Aztec Two-Step recorded 16 CDs, became the subject a documentary DVD about their story and created a loyal fanbase whose numbers have swelled over the last four decades of the duo's career. Their first album, along with their subsequent albums for RCA Records, was a staple of progressive FM and college radio.

After a chance meeting during an open mic session at a Boston coffee house, the Stone Phoenix, in 1971 Fowler and Shulman formed their band and chose the moniker Aztec Two-Step after a line from the poem "A Coney Island of the Mind" by Lawrence Ferlinghetti, a self-described bohemian who published Beat poets. Subsequently the duo would go on to write and record the first song ever written about Jack Kerouac's iconic American novel, On the Road. It is no wonder that the band has been described as the bridge to The Beat Generation. In addition, they are renowned for bringing the folk/rock music of the 60's into the 70's and beyond and for more than thirty-five years, Rex Fowler and Neal Shulman have been writing and performing songs that helped make their generation's musical memories, all the while inspiring future generations of young singer/songwriters.

As their recording career continued, so did the critical acclaim. In 1987 Living in America, received the New York Music Award for Best Folk Album and was named in Billboard's year-end critic's poll. They have been praised in countless major US newspapers and magazines, including Rolling Stone, and have appeared on numerous TV and radio shows, such as the David Letterman Show, the King Biscuit Flour Hour, and World Café Live. In 1999 they were the subjects of the documentary, No Hit Wonder, which was aired on PBS.

While the duo possesses a rich musical legacy of their own, it only makes sense that they would choose to interpret and perform the timeless songs of Simon & Garfunkel and in this special performance at the Firehouse you will hear beloved Aztec Two-Step songs as well as the intricate harmonies of classic Simon and Garfunkel hits. The original euphonious style of Fowler and Shulman adds another dimension to the classic Simon and Gar-

funkel arrangements and allows the lyrics of some of our all-time favorite songs to shine again during a live performance.

David Lavalley, Director of The Center for Arts (TCAN) in Natick, MA has said "Much more than a night of nostalgia, Aztec Two-Step invite you into their living room for a personal retrospective on the music that influenced them - and an entire generation.

The new owner David Geffin had a different vision for the label and perhaps it was a lack of support during the phase when all artists need nurturing that ultimately would result in such talent getting overlooked. Pete Fornatale, the disc jockey of WNEW and "Mixed Bag" fame and always a huge fan of Aztec Two-Step was "personally disappointed" that the duo never made it to the top of the charts. But in his opinion, even though they did not make the charts, they were out there in the culture. They were a "qualitative success" and "if success is measured by the mark they left on the hearts and minds of listeners they touched then 'Yes,' they were most definitely a success" explains Fornatale, although not necessarily by the standards that the music industry usually employs.

To help put Aztec Two-Step's place in musical history into better perspective it helps to know another music professional's view of the group. Dean Sciarra, music journalist, creator/former owner of indie record label 7Records, and President/Owner of ItsAboutMusic.com, an E-Label with more than 300 exceptional independent artists; says:

"1972 was a remarkable year in the history of rock. It stands out as my personal favorite year just because of the sheer volume of magic that was released on vinyl by artists such as Poco, The Eagles, Crosby & Nash, Loggins & Messina, Van Morrison, Paul Simon, Dan Fogelberg... The Hollies, Peter Frampton, Seals & Crofts, Fleetwood Mac, Rick Nelson and the list goes on to include the first album by Jackson Browne and more.

But there was one album released that year that defines the time for me more than any other record - the debut of Aztec Two-Step. Please reward yourself

When I first saw the trailer for this movie, I was so excited. Scratch that, I was so excited up to the point where it

> biggest problem in this movie is it's just not scary. You can tell it's trying to be scary though, which makes it borderline insulting. Just to make matters worse, this is some of the most stiff, wooden acting I've seen in a while. And the

fact that this is a bottleneck movie makes the acting seem even worse. Because it's such a small, forced perspective you need something to entertain you, so you're basically relying on the performances.

All of the Shyamalan trademarks are here, from the plot holes to the lame twist at the end (which you saw coming), to M. Night's favorite: extremely lazy writing. she said it was a way to become a more outgoing, confident person.

"In the acting world, I think before the Zohan, Fashion House is the first pilot that I ever tried out for," said Feldman. "My agent said to me, pilot season is coming up, and can I send you out, and I was just kind of laughing, because living in Los Angeles, you always get business cards from all kinds of people trying to discover you."

Growing up in California, Feldman thought being an actress wasn't realistic because she didn't have an interest in it at the time

"We filmed 65 episodes in 13 weeks, and that was kind of like acting boot camp to me," said Feldman. "It was really hard to film that much three months, but I think I can do anything now at this point."

Getting involved in the show biz came a feeding frenzy of press. Feldman had a layout with Stuff Magazine as Adam Sandler saw the Feldman name.

What victims and their advocates learned a long time ago is that sex offenders operate in networks, a much more communal affair than the stereo-typical image of a loner who stays in his elderly mother's basement apartment at the end of a cul-de-sac in a house with the shades always drawn.

These networks grow from jail and from treatment centers such as Bridgewater, from organizations such as NAMBLA and the black market for hard core porn. Offenders know one another, they know who to hire to maintain their innocence and who will testify as to their dangerousness, or lack thereof

In no time they know the system inside and out, not just the courts and the jails, but the prosecutors and judges whose focus on justice seems sharper for the guy who runs over a duck than for the guy who rapes the child who is too young to testify.

It complicates things for victims and others who advocate for greater public safety that so many people are in jail who shouldn't be. You never know whether rampant public corruption or intellectual progressivism is to blame for the tragedy of the moment.

Thus, victims often take it upon themselves to fight the fight, as with Debbie and her political activism.

Her memories of 1976 are never far away. It was her 16th year, the same year Elton John had the hit song Someone Saved My Life Tonight, as if she is walking proof, her neck scars, various disfigurements, and the recurring mental images of a horror show that began with a walk in the woods on a hot summer day, taking a shortcut to a swimming hole...his hand over her mouth, the other one grabbing her body and then slashing, stabbing, molesting and assaulting and slashing some more until her screams were heard.

But for the involvement of the passerby, a stranger just walking along, who heard the screams and responded immediately, Debbie could have become another Kitty Genovese, the Queens, NY, woman whose middle-of-the-March-night, 1964 abduction, murder, robbery and rape, in that order, was witnessed at various times by a

multitude of people, as many as 38, who did nothing to help.

It gave rise to the notion of a "bystander effect," a response explained by social scientists on a "diffusion of responsibility."

In a sense, this same "diffusion of responsibility" haunts Debbie as well, although she survived her attacker, and no longer fears him because of her age.

Twelve years after Genovese's murder, and 250 miles to the north, an anonymous hero responded to Debbie's screams by pulling Potter off of her, by luring him away and enabling her to run to a nearby house, over a rock wall, to the front step where a resident opened the door, took one look at her, slammed it shut and walked

Which was somewhere between unforgiveable and understandable; here was a 16-year old girl hunched in the doorway panting and crying, dirty, in shock and disheveled, bleeding from everywhere and trying to stanch her dangling ear, not exactly primped for Picture Day at school.

She banged until it reopened. Police arrived. She spent three weeks in the hospital. Potter spent five years in jail. Then he got out and attacked another young girl. Did more time in jail.

Got sent to Bridgewater. On release, got picked up by another Level Three sex offender with whom he lived until finding a place of his own.

Moved out to Bullhead City.

Google him, see the house on the edge of the desert, the deserted side of a dense neighborhood full of families, a bike ride from Potter's house to two other states.



come into the world with a propensity to speak and to believe in something higher than what the five senses can experience; beyond what could ever be known empirically. Religious belief remains until or unless we are persuaded out of it; and this usually occurs today at the time of adolescence when the loud voice of cynicism in the media and academia make their pitch.

Every human propensity has an external object that satisfies it: hunger is a sign that there is food for the body, thirst that there is water, a mind that thinks and conceives ideas points to an immaterial dimension to the world, a heart that seeks perfect love is a sign there is a perfect Lover that will fulfill it, and hope for a happily-ever-after found in literature throughout history is a sign that there is a heaven. All of these desires are common and universal springing innately from human nature, and each points to an external reality that satisfies them.

Let's look at the debate's main question: Which holds the greater hope for humanity? Secular humanism claims that we can create a better and more peaceful existence without God. Let's see if this deems true. They would claim that religion has been the cause of many wars. I would say people are the cause of wars and religion has often been used as an excuse. Humanist utopias have been tried and failed, and in the past century the humanist mancentered movements of Communism and Nazism created the greatest number of killings in human history.

On the smaller scale secular humanists

would live their lives for ordinary goals that everyone does - developing talents, cultivating friends, loving one's spouse, caring for children, contributing to the community, etc. Mixed in with all this is the usual tragedy, heartbreak, sickness, suffering, and death. If we're lucky we may have eight or nine decades of this before we die. Then our body decays and within a couple of generations no one on earth will remember us.

Christian hope on the other hand is tied to eternity and eternity is tied to time. Life would be meaningless otherwise. It recognizes God who wants to help us through the injustice and pain we have caused ourselves so that those innate desires can be fully satisfied in a never-ending joy. The New Testament reminds us that all things work for good for those who love God; and that eye has not seen nor ear has heard the wonders that God has on store for those who love Him... where every tear will be wiped away and there will be no more death or mourning, weeping or pain, for this old order will have passed away.

So which of the two worldviews offers the greater hope? You make the call.

this group of drugs can inhibit bone breakdown, preserve bone mass, and even increase bone density in your spine and hip, reducing the risk of fractures. Examples of these medications include alendronate (Fosamax), Boniva, risedronate (Actonel) and Reclast.

Bisphosphonates may be especially beneficial for men, young adults and people with steroid-induced osteoporosis. They're also used to prevent osteoporosis in people who require long-term steroid treatment for a disease such as asthma or arthritis.

Side effects, which can be severe, include nausea, abdominal pain, difficulty swallowing and the risk of an inflamed esophagus or esophageal ulcers. Bisphosphonates that can be taken once a week or once a month may cause fewer stomach problems. If you can't tolerate oral bisphosphonates, your doctor may recommend periodic intravenous infusions of bisphosphonate preparations.

There have also been reports of serious side effects with bisphosphonates, such as osteonecrosis of the jaw, irregular heartbeats and visual disturbances. Discuss the potentials risks and benefits of these medications with your doctor.

* Raloxifene (Evista). This medication mimics estrogen's beneficial effects on bone density in postmenopausal women, without some of the risks associated with estrogen, such as increased risk of uterine cancer and, possibly, breast cancer. Hot flashes are a common side effect of raloxifene, and you shouldn't use this drug if you have a history of blood clots. This drug isn't currently recommended for use in men, though a small study found that it may also be helpful for preserving bone density in men.

* Calcitonin. A hormone produced by your thyroid gland, calcitonin reduces bone resorption and may slow bone loss. It may also prevent spine fractures, and may even provide some pain relief from compression fractures. It's usually administered as a nasal spray and may cause nasal irritation in some people who use it, but it's also available as an injection. Because calcitonin isn't as potent as bisphosphonates, it's normally reserved for people who can't take other drugs.

* Calcium: Calcium and vitamin D are needed to increase bone mass in addition to estrogen replacement therapy.

A daily intake of 1,200-1,500 mg (through diet and supplements) is recommended. Take calcium supplements in doses of less than 600 mg. Your body can only absorb so much at one time. The best way may be to take one supplement with breakfast and another with dinner.

A daily intake of 800-1,000 IU of vitamin D is needed to increase bone mass.

* Hormone therapy

Estrogen, especially when started soon after menopause, can help maintain bone density. However, the use of hormone therapy can increase your risk of blood clots, endometrial cancer, breast cancer and possibly heart disease. Because of concerns about its safety and because other treatments are available, hormone therapy is generally not a first-choice treatment anymore.

* Physical therapy

In addition to medications or hormones, physical therapy programs may help you build bone strength and improve your posture, balance and muscle strength, making falls less likely.

* Prevention

Building strong bones during childhood and adolescence can be the best defense against developing osteoporosis later. The average woman has acquired 98% of her skeletal mass by 30 years of age.

There are four steps to prevent osteoporosis. No one step alone is enough to prevent osteoporosis:

- 1- Eat a balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D.
- 2- Engage in weight-bearing exercise.
- 3- Adopt a healthy lifestyle with no smoking or excessive alcohol intake.
- 4- Take medication to improve bone density when appropriate.
